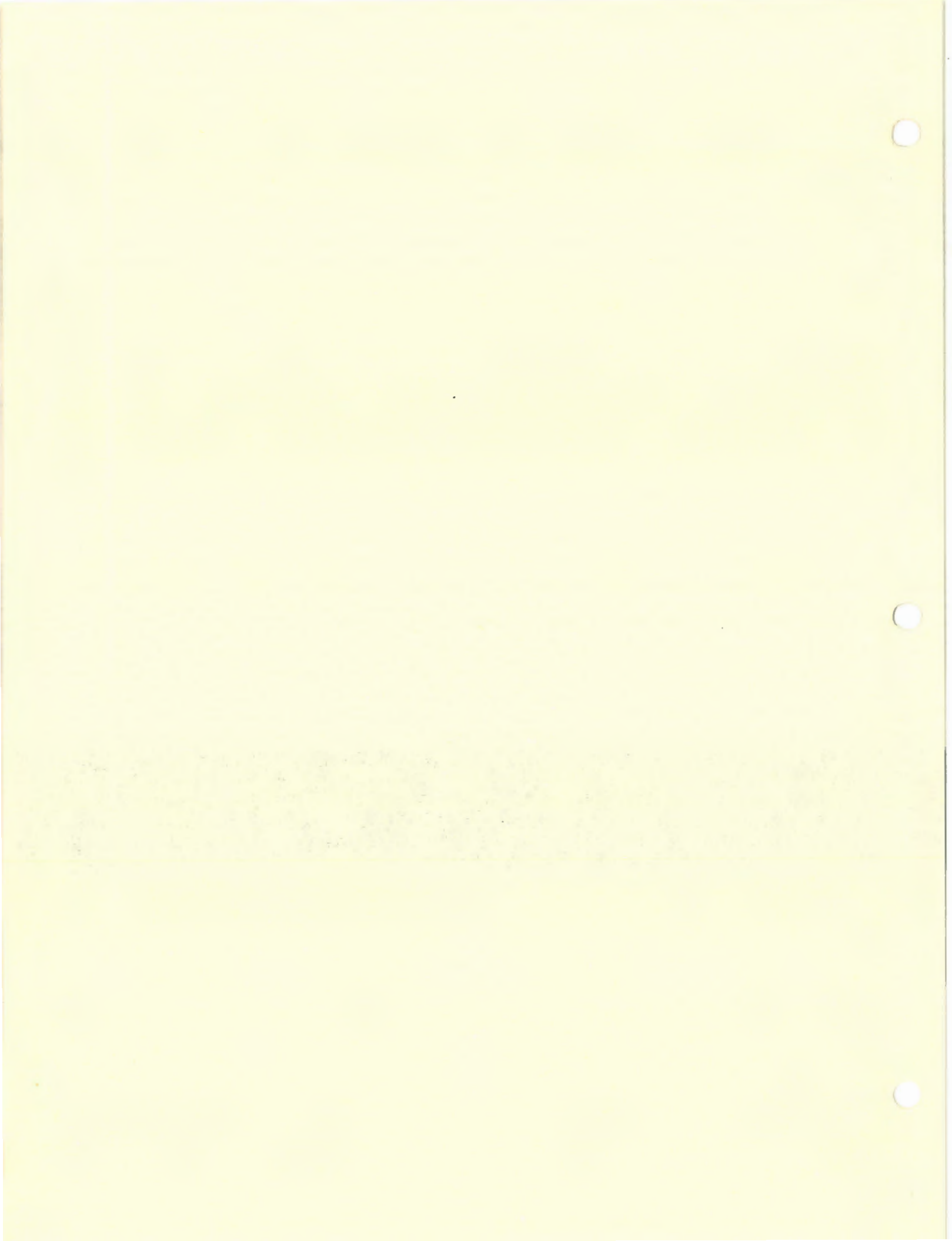



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GENERAL INFORMATION

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA PERSPECTIVE

Just after the close of the American Revolution, the Georgia legislature, made up of bold and far-seeing men, took a step that soon was to start another revolution — this one in the history of higher education.

In 1785 the legislature granted a charter to The University of Georgia, the nation's first state university charter and the first public recognition that a state has a duty to provide for the higher education of its citizens.

The infant university, with no campus, no money, no faculty, and in fact no students, existed for 16 years on paper only. It was not until 1801 that a site was selected for the campus and the first few students began to trickle into the newly-formed town of Athens, then at the edge of the frontier.

The faculty that first year consisted of one man, Josiah Meigs, the college president. As often as not, classes were conducted under the trees or in the president's house, while the University waited for its first building to be raised.

From such a small beginning the University has grown to more than 21,000 students. A new campus and 12 schools and colleges have been added to the original Franklin College, the nucleus of the University and now the Franklin College of Arts and Sciences. More than 200 major buildings have been added to the University plant; the campus, including forestry and agriculture areas, consists of some 33,600 acres. Off-campus centers and agricultural experiment stations take university services to all parts of the state.

But growth and time have not altered everything at Georgia. The tree-shaded campus is rich in tradition. Reminders of the University's early beginnings are Old College, the Arch at the campus entrance, the 140-year-old Chapel. The same Chapel bell that called students to classes more than a century ago is still the chief herald of athletic victories of the "Bulldogs."

The long and interesting history of The University of Georgia cannot be summarized easily. For a more detailed history, E.M. Coulter's history, *College Life in the Old South; A Historical Sketch of the University of Georgia*, by A.L. Hull; and H.C. Tuck's *Four Years at the University of Georgia, 1877-1881* are available in the Special Collections Room in the Ilah Dunlap Little Memorial Library.

Despite the difficulty of expressing the dynamics of the modern-day university in a quantitative summary such as this, it is hoped that *Fact Book 1978* has captured in a statistical way the qualitative growth, vitality, and excellence characteristic of The University of Georgia.

PURPOSE

The University of Georgia is the State's oldest, most comprehensive, and most diversified institution of education. As the capstone of the University System of Georgia, its influence permeates the entire structure and organization of education in the State of Georgia, and it serves practically all the educational needs of the State's increasingly complex and technologically oriented society. A vital aspect of the University's role is that of leadership in creating a pace of achievement and a climate of intellectual and cultural development relative to all other units in the University System of Georgia and the entire State as well.

Teaching is historically the oldest function of the University and continues to be its primary purpose and responsibility. Through its various degree programs the University makes its greatest single contribution to the State and region. The teaching programs of the University seek to provide the broadest possible educational opportunities for the youth of the State and to prepare them for a variety of careers and professions.

The special strength of the University in meeting this responsibility lies in the scope and diversity of the programs it offers at all levels of higher education. On the undergraduate level the University offers 18 baccalaureate degree programs, with major concentrations available in approximately 250 different fields through the framework of 115 different academic departments. On the graduate level the University offers work toward 19 master's degrees in approximately 125 areas of concentration, and 3 doctoral degrees (Ph.D., Ed.D., D.P.A.) in approximately 73 areas of concentration. Professional degree programs are offered in the School of Law, the College of Veterinary Medicine, the School of Pharmacy, the School of Social Work, and the School of Forest Resources. In addition a variety of credit and noncredit programs are offered through the Georgia Center for Continuing Education in cooperation with the 13 schools and colleges comprising the University.

An important responsibility of The University of Georgia is to provide special programs of excellence for the State's academically superior students. The State's most talented youth are among its most valuable resources, and it is not necessary for them to leave the State of Georgia to seek opportunities for the fullest development of their talents.

As the capstone of the University System and of higher education in the State of Georgia, the University must continue to be the one major institution with a diverse and comprehensive program of graduate education. One of the most important academic developments at the University during the past decade has been its emergence as a major institution of graduate education with regional and national significance. The continuing vitality of the University's graduate educational programs depends upon a strong commitment to basic and applied research in all academic disciplines. In addition the University, through its research function, must seek to expand the frontiers of knowledge to provide the expertise and resources that are necessary to cope with the difficult and complex problems facing the State and to improve the quality of human life in the State.

In its public service function the University provides opportunities for continuing education to adult Georgians and applies knowledge to the problems of society. The concept of higher education is no longer limited to students between the years of 18 and 25 seeking one of the traditional degrees. The University's many resources must be made available for the continuing education of adults and for the application of academic expertise to the resolution of societal problems.

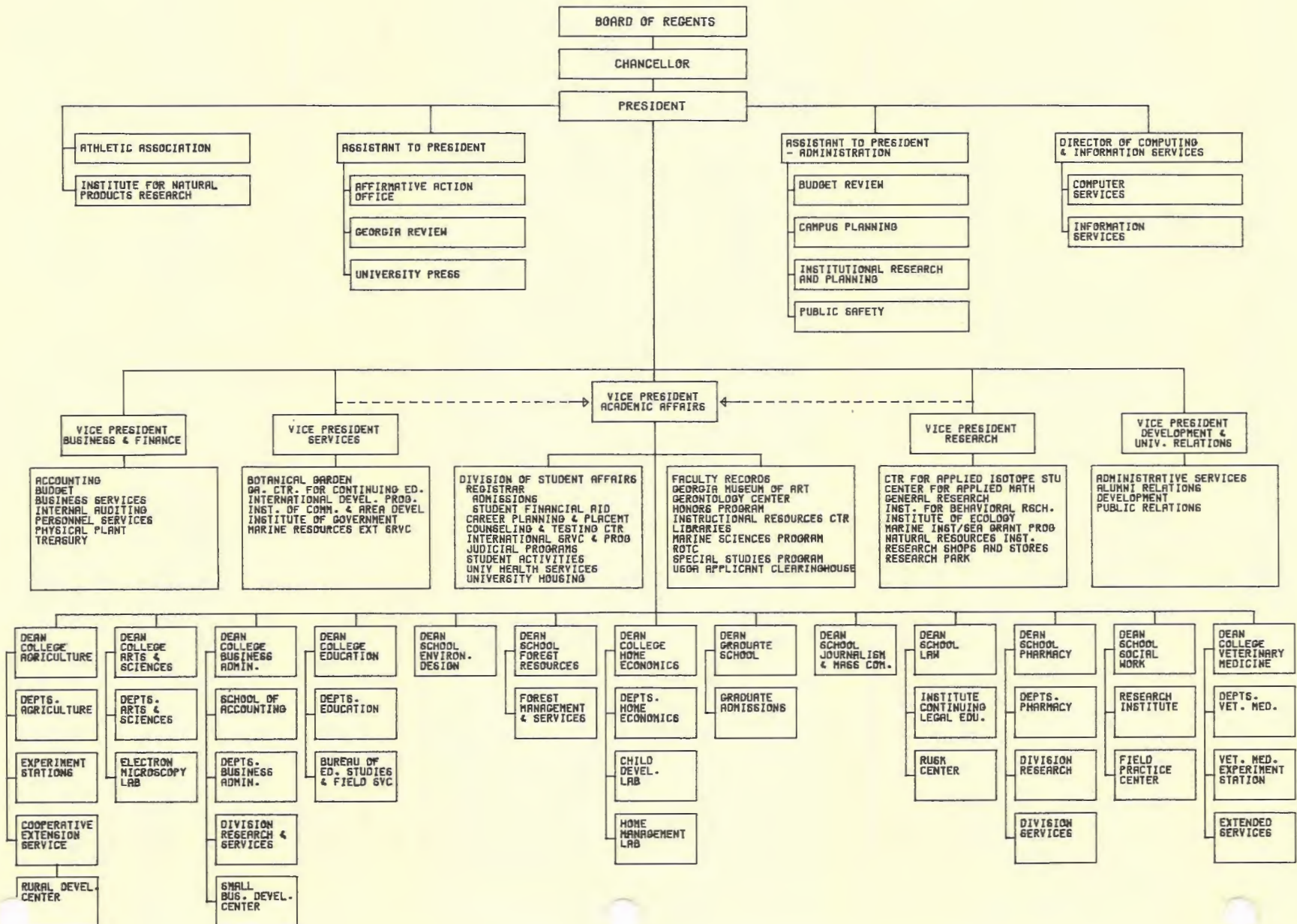

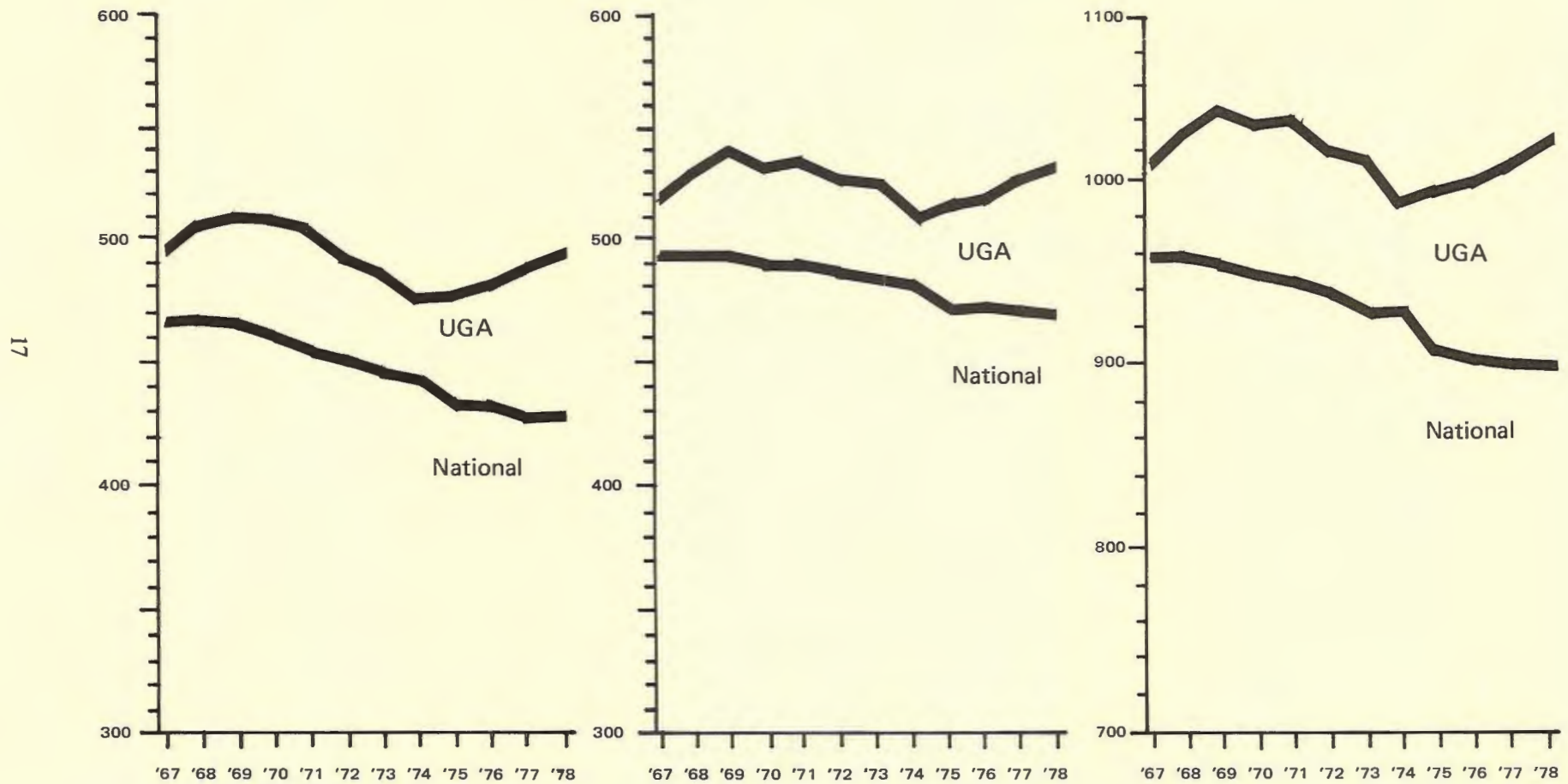

Fall Quarter 1960-1978

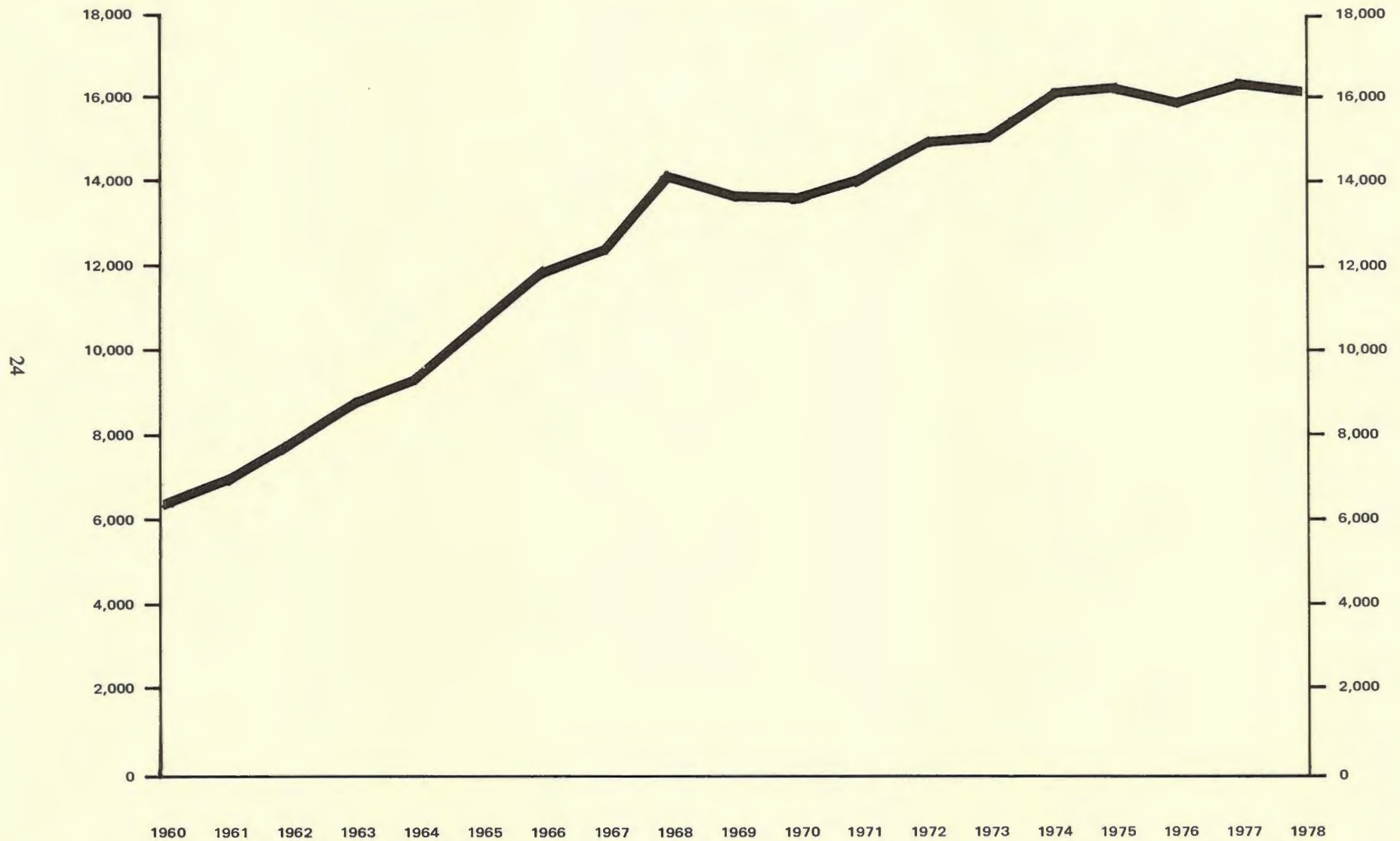
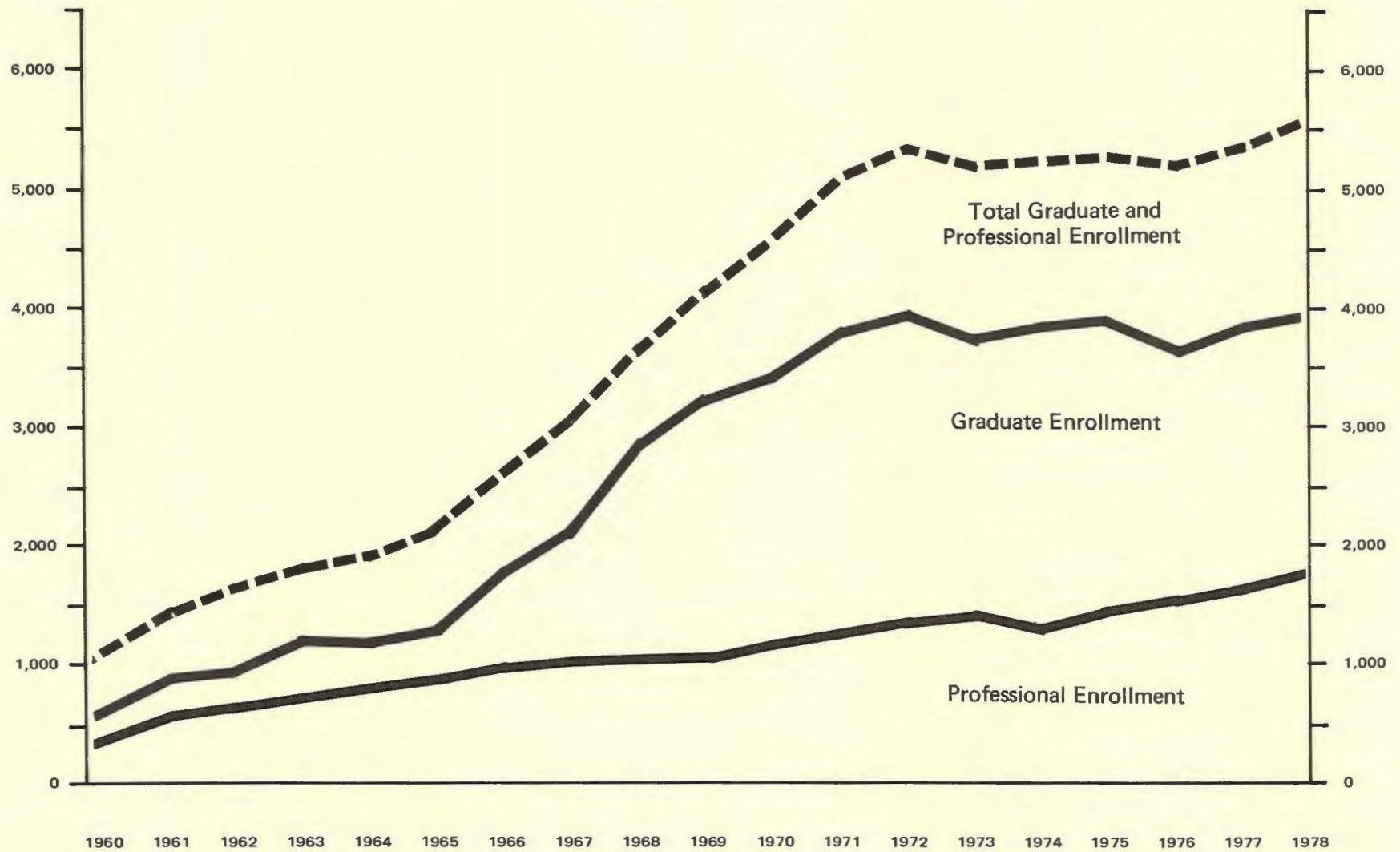

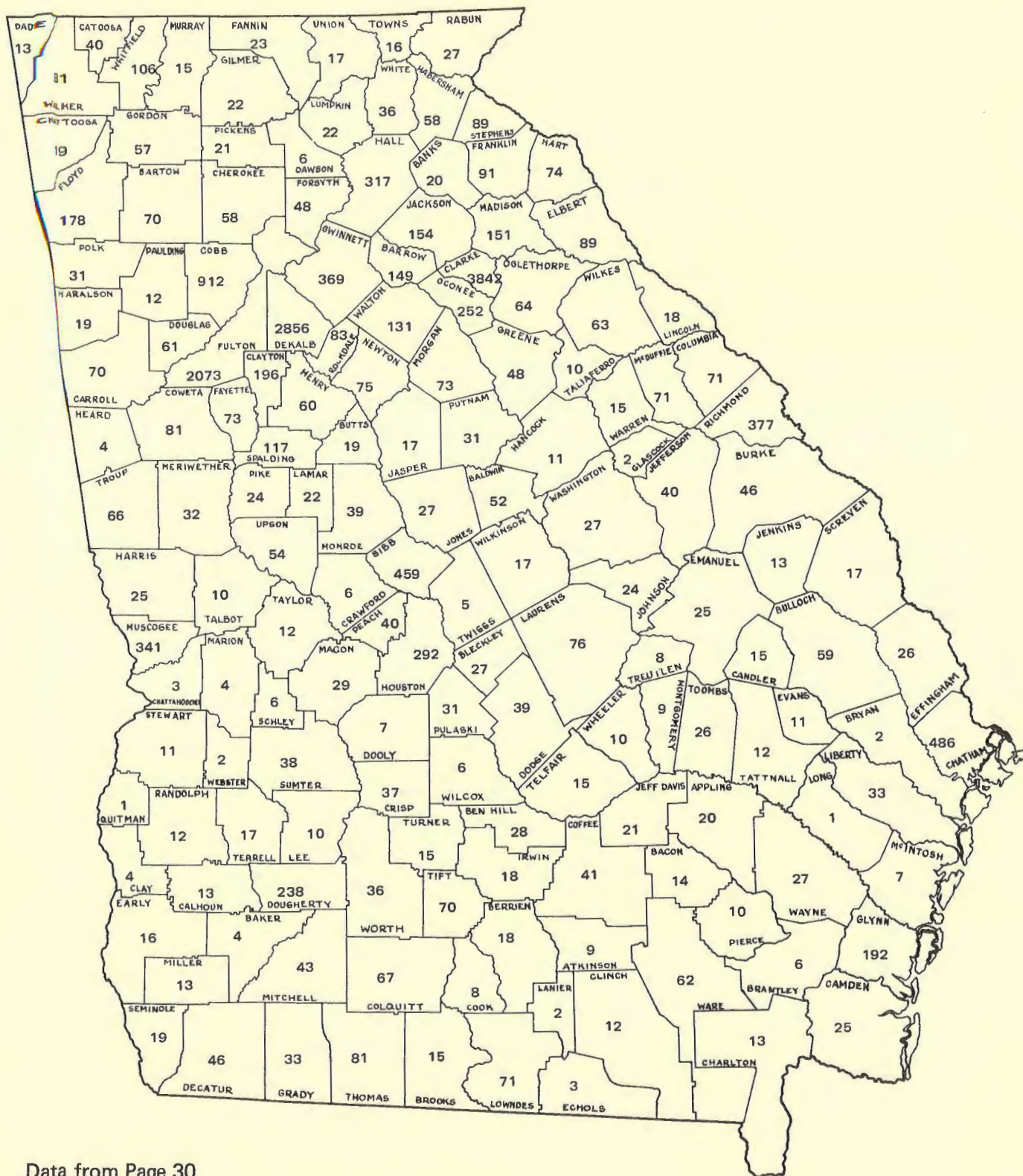

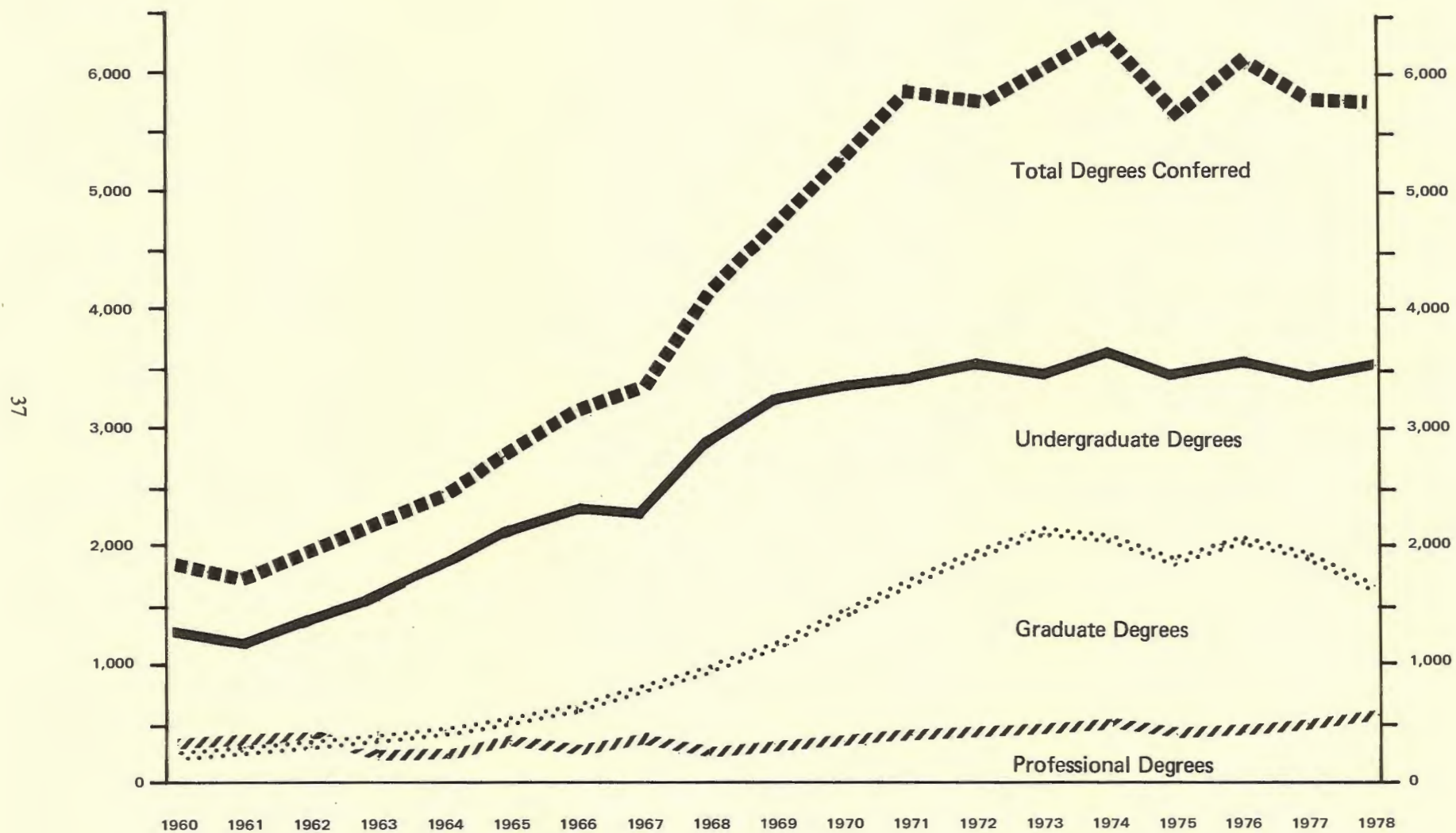

FY 1960-1978

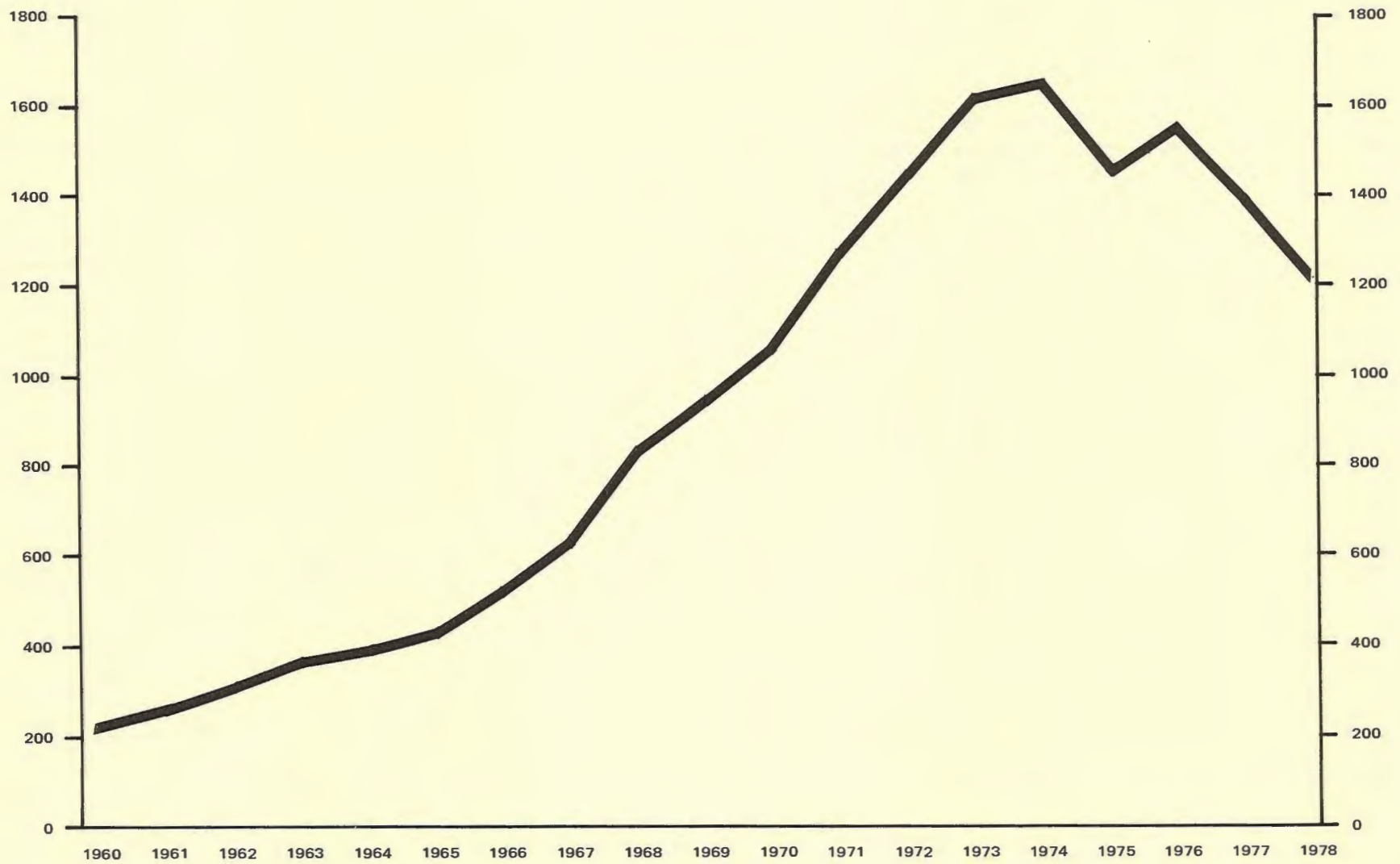

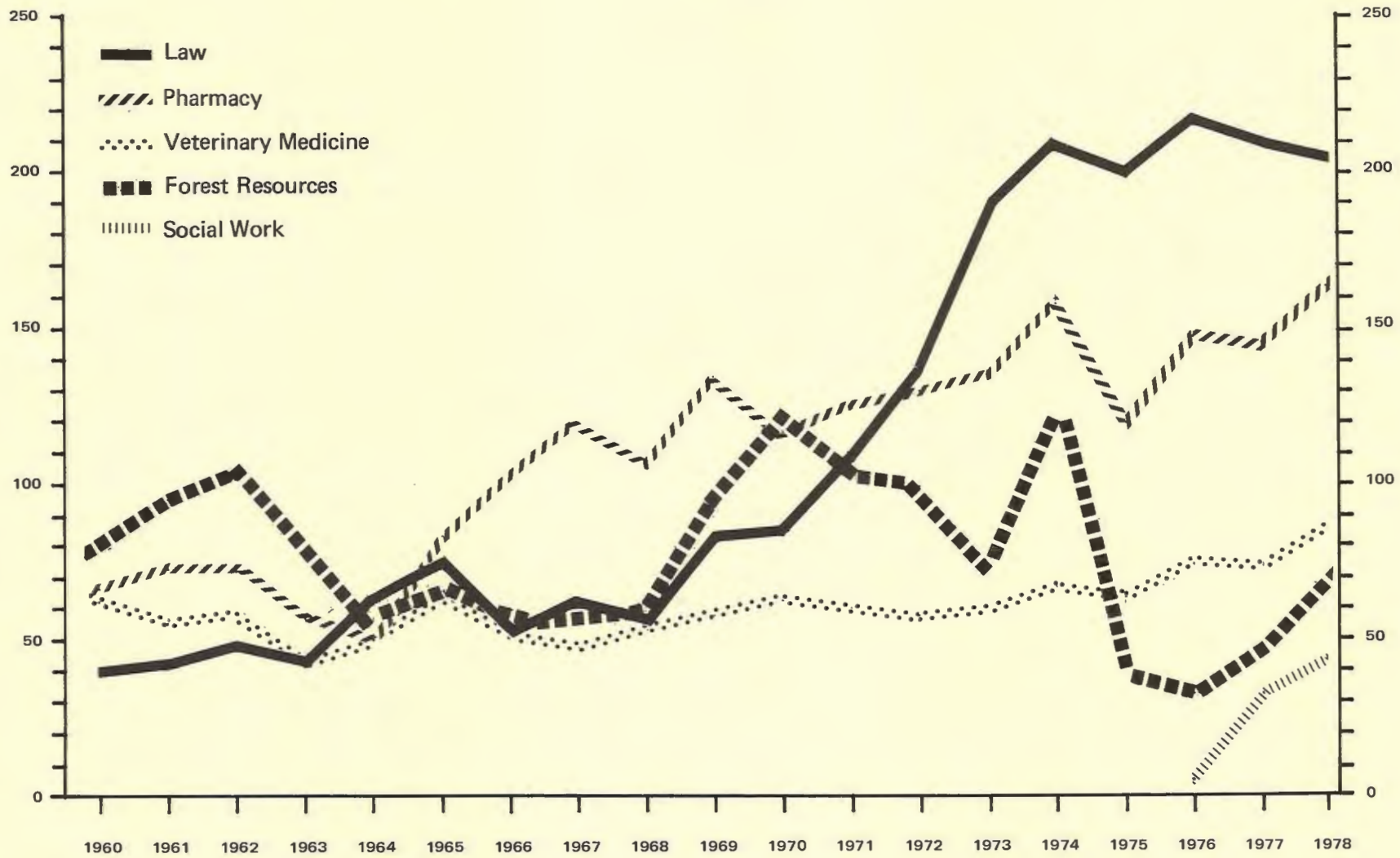

STUDENT RELATED INFORMATION

DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

Because it believes that student potential is enhanced through a systematic emphasis on individual needs, the Division of Student Affairs provides services and programs that help students (1) adjust to, understand, evaluate, and use available academic resources; (2) plan, prepare for, and pursue their life work; (3) learn to know, live with, appreciate, and enjoy others in harmony and with fulfillment and mutual respect; and (4) maintain mental and physical health and strength as they integrate personal, professional, and social values.

The Office of the Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Students provides leadership, coordination, and budgetary supervision for the ten departments within Student Affairs:

The Admissions Office advises prospective students regarding admission to the University and coordinates the University's Orientation Program for new students. This office reviews applications for admission and readmission and determines transfer credit for courses taken at other institutions.

The Career Planning and Placement Office assists students both before and after graduation to explore career options and pursue career goals. In addition, this department assists students who seek employment while attending the University, supplies information regarding professional and graduate schools, and provides comprehensive placement services.

The Counseling and Testing Center provides direction for students undecided about a major or career. Professional counselors help students define their abilities through personality and interest tests, a career library, audio-slide presentations, and taped interviews describing majors offered by the University.

The Office of International Services and Programs offers services to both foreign and American students that promote international understanding. In addition to advising foreign students on personal problems, immigration matters, finances, and housing, this office advises American students and faculty interested in work, study, or travel abroad.

The Office of Judicial Programs offers students advice and assistance in legal matters related to the University and assists in the formulation and enforcement of University policy. It further supervises the Student Judiciary System and the Defender-Advocate Society, conducts legal research, and consults with individuals regarding alleged violations of University regulations.

The Office of the Registrar maintains permanent academic records and processes class rolls and grade reports. The Registrar also publishes a quarterly Schedule of Classes, coordinates registration, provides transcript services, assists with graduation, determines residency status, and administers the program of benefits for veterans.

The Department of Student Activities contributes to students' social, cultural, recreational, and intellectual development through five programming areas: Communiversities, the Committee for Black Programs, Fraternity and Sorority Affairs, Student Clubs and Organizations, and the University Union. This department also publishes a quarterly activities calendar, processes the student I.D. card, prints and distributes the *Student/Faculty/Staff Directory* and maintains an Information Center in Memorial Hall.

The Student Financial Aid Office administers the University's financial aid programs and provides financial counseling and assistance in the form of loans, scholarships, grants, and work/study opportunities for qualified students.

Cont'd: DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

The University Health Services maintains a professional staff of physicians, nurses, counselors, and technicians to provide students with comprehensive physical and mental health services on an outpatient and inpatient basis. Its services include physical therapy, laboratory and x-ray facilities, specialty clinics, a pharmacy, and a voluntary accident/sickness insurance policy for students.

The Department of University Housing provides residence hall and family housing accommodations for students; it also serves as a liaison between the University and those fraternity and sorority corporations with houses on University property. The department sponsors a variety of recreational and educational programs and maintains a student and professional staff whose efforts are directed to promoting students' personal, social and scholastic development.

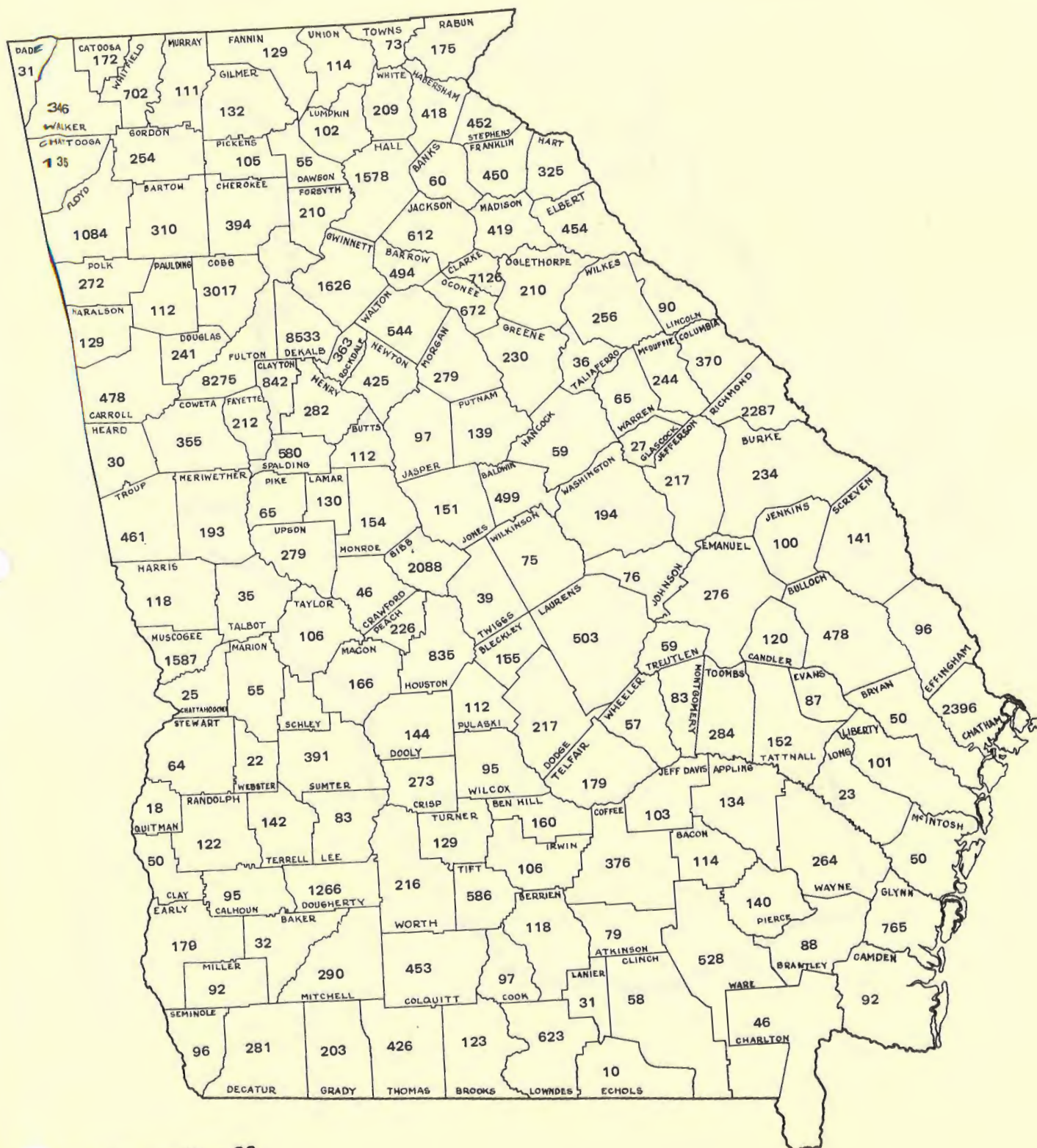

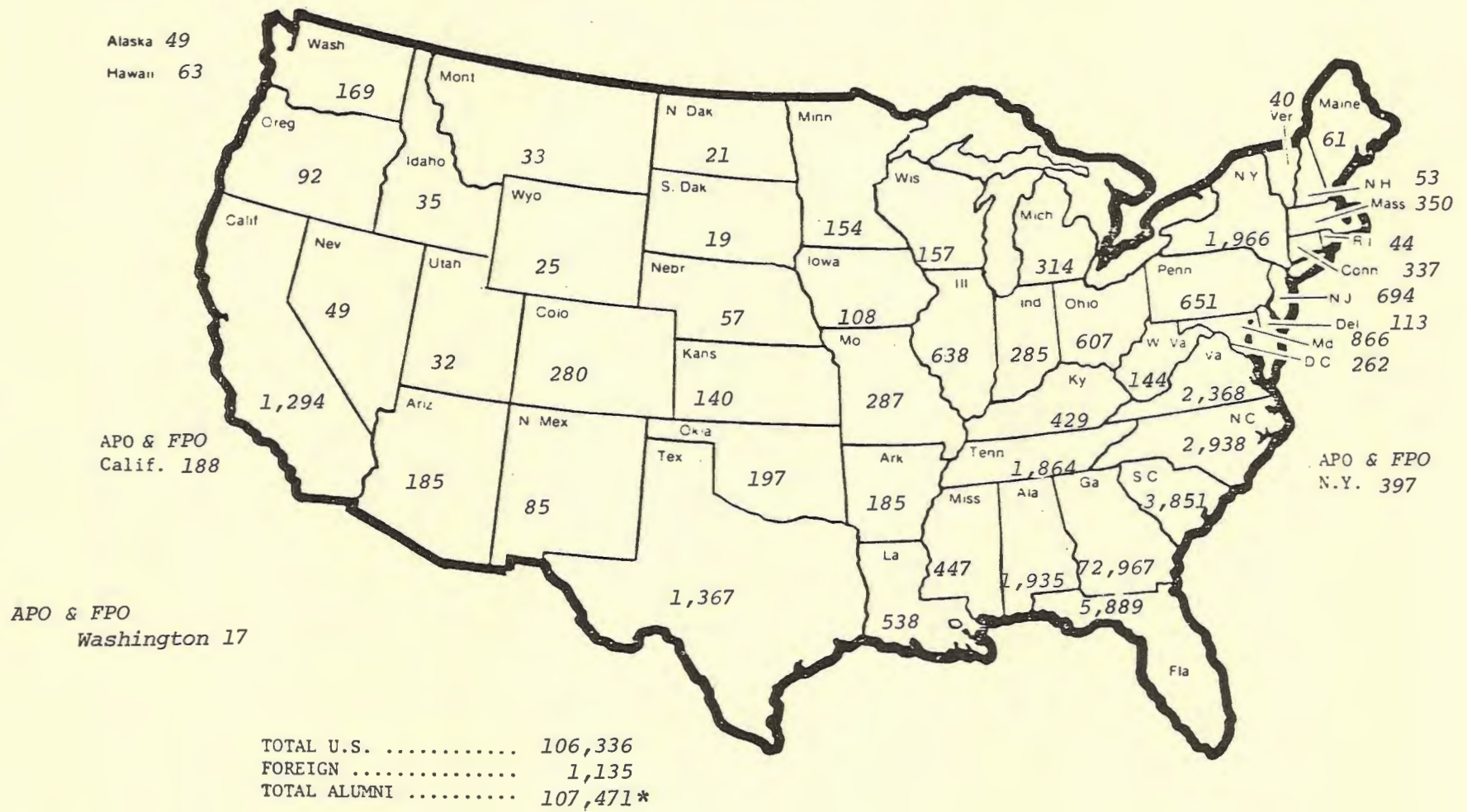

RESEARCH, SERVICE, AND
AUXILIARY AND ADMINISTRATIVE UNITS

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATIONS

The responsibility of the Agricultural Experiment Stations is to seek, and verify through scientific research, new knowledge concerning agricultural pursuits in the broadest sense of the word. Research projects are conducted in agricultural economics, agricultural engineering, agronomy, animal and dairy science, entomology, food science, forest resources, home economics, horticulture, plant pathology and genetics, and poultry science.

AUXILIARY AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The University Bookstore, Campus Transit System, Food Services, University Golf Course, Printing Department, and the ROTC Uniform Store are Auxiliary Services supported by income generated from the sale of merchandise and services to students, faculty, and staff. Financially self-supporting, these units are related to the educational objectives of the University. Campus Mail, Central Duplicating, Office Machine Maintenance, and Records Management are Administrative Service Units which provide services to University Departments.

University Bookstore. The University Bookstore, a retail facility specializing in textbooks, paperback books, educational supplies, art supplies, and UGA monogrammed novelties, is located at the corner of Sanford Drive and Baxter Street Extension.

University Food Services. The objective of University Food Services is to satisfy the food service needs of students, faculty, and staff through the efficient service of a wide variety of wholesome foods served at reasonable prices in a pleasant atmosphere.

Three dining facilities, Bolton Hall, Snelling Hall, and the Bulldog Room, are maintained by the University Food Services for its customers. In addition, the McWhorter Dining Hall serves participants in athletic programs. The University Food Services also provides banquet services and catering for University groups.

University Printing Department. Quality printing services are provided to departments or units listed in the University or Student Chart of Accounts by the University Printing Department. The printing plant, located in its new facility on Green Street, offers type setting, offset printing, letterpress printing, binding, and a full range of related services.

University of Georgia Golf Course. A teaching and recreational facility available to students, faculty, staff, alumni, and their dependents, plus conferees, the University of Georgia Golf Course is located on Milledge Avenue Extension. The 18 hole championship course, designed by Robert Trent Jones, also includes driving range, putting greens and chipping green, with "golfing weather" hours Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. until sundown, and weekends and holidays from 7:30 a.m. until sundown. The Pro Shop carries a complete line of golfing equipment and supplies.

Central Duplicating. Two completely equipped quick copy centers for camera-ready material provide pickup and delivery service and other services such as folding, binding, drilling, copy reduction, and collating. The centers are located in the basement of the Business Services Building and at the University Printing Department on Green Street. Services are available for departments and units listed in the University or Student Chart of Accounts.

Campus Transit System. A fleet of 19 buses provides campus transportation for students and staff. Seven routes are operated from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with a night route from 6:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. The Campus Transit System carried over 5.2 million persons in fiscal year 1977-78.

Office Machine Maintenance. Factory-trained technicians provide repair and maintenance service on reprographic equipment to University Departments. The office is located in Hardman Hall.

BUREAU OF EDUCATIONAL STUDIES AND FIELD SERVICES

The fundamental objective of the Bureau in accomplishing its service mission is to provide educational consultants as requested by the public schools of Georgia, the region, other colleges, and the State Department of Education. The services of the Bureau are available on a continuing basis to local school boards and other educational agencies for the analysis of problems, for the improvement of educational practices, and for continual updating of the knowledge and skills of administrative, supervisory, and teaching personnel.

CAMPUS PLANNING

The Office of Campus Planning assists the University administration in planning the physical development of The University of Georgia and its related agencies. Campus Planning serves as liaison agent between the University and the Board of Regents Office of Buildings and Grounds, as well as planning, coordinating, and implementing construction projects and related works.

CENTER FOR APPLIED ISOTOPE STUDIES

The Center for Applied Isotope Studies, an applied research group under the direct supervision of the Office of the Vice-President for Research, is located in the University's Research Park at Riverbend Research Laboratories. The primary activities of the Center are to assist the academic, scientific, and industrial community in applied and basic research. Emphasis is placed on applied research, assisted by a unique array of nuclear analytical tools, in resolving critical contemporary problems. A service laboratory is maintained for age dating, stable and radiometric analyses.

CENTER FOR APPLIED MATHEMATICS

The Center for Applied Mathematics is devoted to research in frontier problems of applied mathematics: nonlinear mathematics, stochastic systems, control and optimization theory, and computer mathematics, with an applied mathematics program available at the doctoral level. Modern applied mathematics has a strong influence on the development of the physical and biological sciences, economics, psychology, and engineering. It also provides analytical and computer methods for solutions or approaches to diverse problems. The Center is supported by state funds, governmental grants, foundations, and industry.

COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

The Extension Service acts as an educational service arm for the University, providing information and training to Georgia citizens. Staff members, representing both the University and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, present educational programs in agriculture, home economics, community and rural development, and 4-H and youth development. Programs are based on research from Experiment Stations and coordinated at the local level by County Extension Directors in response to needs articulated by local citizens.

The Rural Development Center, located at Tifton, is an educational and public service unit of the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Georgia College of Agriculture. The program of the Center is directed toward the realization of four principal objectives: the improvement of agricultural and forest production efficiency; the development of advanced marketing techniques and expanded utilization of farm and forest commodities; the realization of comprehensive community development; and the continuation of manpower training and development.

DIVISIONS OF RESEARCH AND SERVICES: COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The Research Division serves to stimulate and promote research activities by the College of Business faculty and to provide the faculty with support services such as mail surveys, outside funding information, grant preparation, editorial assistance, summer research grants, and other research aids. In addition, the Division conducts a program of State and regional economic analysis through the Center for Regional Studies and the Georgia Economic Forecasting Project. The Division of Services is charged with ascertaining the service needs of the public and developing programs to meet those needs through a planned visitation program by field representatives and close coordination with the faculty in program development.

GEORGIA CENTER FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Center for Continuing Education plans and implements educational programs in response to the diverse needs of adult Georgians, as manifested individually or through a range of government agencies, business organizations, and civic, cultural, and educational groups. The Center serves as a contact point through which University faculty, clientele groups, and Center staff work in concert to bring to adult publics the relevant resources of the University and the University System.

The Center fulfills this function by conducting conferences in Center facilities; University credit courses, held on and off campus, in the evenings and on Saturdays; non-credit courses, on and off campus; independent study or home study; and educational television broadcasts over WGTV. Other services provided by the Center include film production, cooperative programming with other higher education institutions throughout the State, film library operations, and consultation and supportive services to organizations and agencies through the Center.

GEORGIA MUSEUM OF ART

The Georgia Museum of Art, founded in 1945 by Alfred H. Holbrook, is dedicated to the concept of instructional service not only to the University but to the community and region as well. The permanent collection of the Museum now numbers over 5,000 works of art, with primary emphasis on American artists. Extensive files are maintained on each object for the benefit of the student. The Museum cooperates with various departments in scheduling exhibits of common interest.

GEORGIA REVIEW

The Georgia Review is a nationally known journal of arts and letters, published by the University since 1947. Its quarterly issues feature a rich blend of the best in contemporary thought and literature--essays, poetry, fiction, and book reviews. Intended for the informed, non-specialist reader, the *Review* appeals across disciplinary lines by drawing from a wide range of interests: literature, history, philosophy, architecture, film, and the musical and visual arts.

GERONTOLOGY CENTER

The Gerontology Center was established in 1978 to promote and coordinate instruction, research, and public service in the field of aging. The Center faculty, composed of some 50 members from more than a dozen departments/units within the University, administers a certificate program in gerontology at the graduate level. Special programs are planned to provide leadership in the systematic growth of gerontology as a multi-disciplinary study.

INSTITUTE FOR BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH

The Institute for Behavioral Research is a multidisciplinary research organization. Its purpose is to encourage a pooling of the expertise of staff members and graduate students from such departments as sociology, psychology, political science, management, economics, and educational psychology in an attack on significant social and behavioral problems.

INSTITUTE FOR NATURAL PRODUCTS RESEARCH

The Natural Products Laboratory was established in 1969 to promote research in the chemistry of naturally occurring substances of plant origin, and was reorganized by Board of Regents action in 1976 as an Institute for Natural Products Research. The purpose of the reorganization was to extend the scope of current research on alkaloids, terpenes, and synthetic methods to include a program of chemical research on plant species native to Georgia and the Southeastern region. This program involves the isolation, characterization, and elucidation of chemical structure of new compounds of possible use as drugs for the treatment of human disease, with especial attention being given to the search for compounds active against various types of cancer. It is anticipated that some of the compounds isolated will possess significant potential in basic and applied medical research.

INSTITUTE OF COMMUNITY AND AREA DEVELOPMENT

The staff of ICAD brings the resources of the University to bear on problems of Georgia's communities by providing technical assistance and consulting services to regional planning commissions, state agencies, and units of local government. A wide range of disciplines is represented, including regional land use planning, model code formulation, community health, recreation, community cultural affairs, ecology, geography, pharmacy, adult education, and public safety. ICAD's program takes many forms: consultation and technical assistance, workshops, conferences, seminars, and individually designed task force investigations.

INSTITUTE OF CONTINUING LEGAL EDUCATION IN GEORGIA

The Institute of Continuing Legal Education in Georgia represents the combined efforts of The University of Georgia School of Law, the Law Schools of Emory and Mercer Universities, and the State Bar of Georgia to provide a continuing legal education program for the Georgia lawyer. Through this continuing legal education program, the Institute provides the lawyer an excellent opportunity to keep up with the developments in his profession, to increase his own expertise, and to benefit from the knowledge of experts in various fields.

INSTITUTE OF ECOLOGY

The Institute of Ecology supports and encourages multi-disciplinary research and service activities in ecology involving faculty and graduate students from a variety of departments, schools, and research sites. The organization operates the Savannah River Ecology Laboratory for the U.S. Department of Energy at the Savannah River Plant, and supports research in marine and freshwater ecology, thermal ecology, radiation ecology, mineral cycling, tropical and temperate forests, old field dynamics, agroecosystems, granite outcrops, and swamps.

INSTITUTE OF GOVERNMENT

The Institute is responsible for an interdisciplinary program designed to improve the knowledge and skills of elected and appointed State and local public officials in Georgia. To accomplish its purposes, the Institute of Government conducts nearly 500 training programs and conferences each year, engages in an extensive publications and research program, and offers technical assistance to public officials.

INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The Institute of Higher Education provides a variety of services and resources, including a doctoral program in higher education, for the professional development of college administrators and faculty members. Its staff works primarily with two- and four-year colleges on curriculum development, program evaluation, institutional research, leadership and management support skills, and overall administrative effectiveness. Under cooperative arrangements with other agencies and institutions, the Institute is involved in the development and improvement of higher education throughout the state and surrounding region. Each year the Faculty Development in Georgia (FDIG) Program provides opportunities for a number of faculty members in Georgia colleges, public and private, to continue their graduate education at the University of Georgia.

INSTITUTE OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Institute is an interdisciplinary unit designed to synthesize relevant aspects of the biological, physical, and social sciences, as well as law and humanities, to solve complex natural resource management problems. The Institute conducts research and coordinates four University programs and activities, pertaining to (1) the development, use, and management of biological resources - fish, wildlife, forests; (2) development, use, and management of water and land resources; (3) mineral and energy resources planning and management; and (4) natural resource policy analysis. The Institute cooperates closely with other units of the University System and, upon request, acts in an advisory capacity to government and private organizations on matters relating to natural resources.

INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH AND PLANNING

The Office of Institutional Research and Planning has, as a primary responsibility, the collection, organization, and analysis of data to serve all aspects of the operation and management of the University. Student, faculty, staff and space utilization analyses, and studies related to these areas, are performed, as well as studies related to projected needs, program objectives, and efficiency and effectiveness in use of institutional resources.

INSTRUCTIONAL RESOURCES CENTER

The Instructional Resources Center provides media equipment and materials for staff use: a media library of films, slides, and audio and video tapes, as well as audio-visual and television equipment for loan; color and black and white xerox services, audio and video tape duplication, photographic services, materials for instruction (including slide-tape presentations, graphic aids, and video tape segments). IRC also operates a closed-circuit television system limited to the General Classroom Building, with a color television studio and color mobile production unit to provide the University with capabilities to record events on campus and original programs for classroom use. Though IRC was created to service the instructional needs of the University, services are available to all units on a charge basis.

MARINE SCIENCES PROGRAM

The Marine Sciences Program, established by the University in 1976, is responsible for the coordination and/or general management of the Marine Institute, Marine Extension Service, Marine Sciences Faculty, and the Georgia Sea Grant Program.

The Marine Institute, located on Sapelo Island, was established in 1953 and serves as a research facility for resident staff and for campus-based faculty members. Research has centered mainly on basic marsh ecology to provide an understanding of energy flow, cycling of minerals and nutrients through the marshes, and factors regulating the metabolism of the salt marsh ecosystem.

The Marine Extension Service helps to solve problems related to the States' marine resources. The Marine Resources Center on Skidaway Island is the major marine education facility for schools and colleges in the State. At the Brunswick Extension Station, specialists work directly with the fishing and seafood processing industry to solve problems of resource management and utilization.

The Georgia Sea Grant Program, part of the National Sea Grant College Program, was established in 1971. In an approach roughly analogous to that of the Land Grant System in working with agriculture, Sea Grant promotes the wise use of marine resources through a coordinated program of research, education, and advisory services.

OFFICE OF COMPUTING AND INFORMATION SERVICES

The Office of Computing and Information Services has three major hardware systems installed and interconnected which service not only the University of Georgia but also the University System of Georgia Network. OCIS is divided into three large functional areas to serve the broad user communities: the Office of Computing Activities (OCA), the Office of Information Systems (OIS), and the Office of Special Projects (OSP). The Office of Computing Activities is comprised of two divisions responsible for system programming, the operation of all computer and associated hardware, and the provision of assistance to all individuals who wish to use the facilities of OCIS. The Office of Information Systems consists of two divisions that develop software applications to meet the informational needs of the University Administration and provide the data and control for these systems. The Office of Special Projects manages all research grants within OCIS.

OFFICE OF DEVELOPMENT AND UNIVERSITY RELATIONS

The Vice President for Development and University Relations is responsible for the planning, coordination, and conduct of all programs involving alumni and friends of the University, including institutional public relations and fund raising. The Office of the Vice President embraces three functional units. The Office of Alumni Relations works with the Alumni Society and various school and college groups to conduct year-round programs involving alumni and friends throughout the United States. The Development staff is concerned with all aspects of fund-raising for the University and works closely with the various schools and colleges, their alumni constituents and friends. The University of Georgia Foundation, an independent incorporated group created to assist the University, handles endowments and unrestricted funds received from alumni, friends, and corporate donors. The Office of Public Relations is concerned with gathering and disseminating information about the University to members of the University community as well as to the various publics of the institution. An Office of Administrative Services supports the work of all offices under the Vice President.

OFFICE OF GENERAL RESEARCH

All non-agricultural research proposals and contracts are reviewed by the Office of General Research. The Office of General Research has the responsibility of overseeing budgets, expenditure accounting, and procedures for several State-funded units and for contracts and grants administered through the office. It also provides help in locating sources of funds and in developing faculty members' research programs.

POULTRY DISEASE RESEARCH CENTER

The Poultry Disease Research Center carries out basic and applied research programs in many of the diseases of domestic poultry which are of economic importance to the poultry industry of Georgia. Diagnostic, laboratory, and consultative services are provided to individuals and groups in all phases of poultry production.

PUBLIC SAFETY DIVISION

The Director of Public Safety administers functional, educational, and community service programs which respond to hazards of life and property arising out of activities in the University community. Crime prevention and control are carried out by the University of Georgia Police Department headed by a Chief of Police and staffed by some fifty sworn police officers with full Peace Officer authority. The UGA Police Department personnel conduct the Northeast Georgia Police Academy to provide basic, in-service, and advanced/specialized training for city, county, and state law enforcement agencies in twenty-four counties of northeast Georgia. The Traffic Safety Department provides traffic analyses and parking control.

As Biosafety Officer for the University, the Assistant Director for Environmental Safety Services administers a professional staff that addresses problems of federal, state, and local laws and regulations affecting environmental safety. This responsibility includes control measures in such areas as biohazardous agents, chemical carcinogens, toxic hazards, radioactive and nonradioactive wastes, pesticides, water and air quality, noise pollution, and food sanitation. Many faculty as well as graduate students enroll each year in the Radiation Safety Course. The Accident Prevention Control program is designed to reduce physical hazards resulting from occupational hazards and facility design. This program also provides training for employees and students in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and other life-saving techniques.

RUSK CENTER FOR INTERNATIONAL AND COMPARATIVE LAW

The Rusk Center was founded in 1977 to facilitate interactions between business and government activities, and among various government activities. The Center works closely with business and government at the local, state, federal, and international levels to (1) identify specific government-business interactions affecting international trade and investment that involve unnecessary burdens on business or governmental interests; (2) mobilize university, business, and government resources to develop theoretical and practical approaches to reduce such burdens; and (3) facilitate the implementation of such approaches by providing business and government with essential informational and manpower resources.

SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Small Business Development Center was established at The University of Georgia in 1977 to improve the economic quality of life in Georgia and the Southeast. As one of eight national centers, the SBDC has three major functions: business information services, continuing education programs, and residential instruction. The Center represents a partnership among the University, governmental agencies, and the private sector. The SBDC serves the Georgia business community at the same time that it makes a significant contribution to the national economy.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA BOTANICAL GARDEN

The Botanical Garden serves the University as an outdoor laboratory for regular and special classes of plant-oriented disciplines at the University, as well as for certain types of research. Several research projects have been completed and others are underway. Research and instructional activities permitted in the Garden are determined under guidelines decided by the Botanical Garden Board of Advisors.

The Botanical Garden's Callaway Building is available for biologically oriented conferences, meetings, short courses, and similar events. Short courses and other adult educational activities are also initiated by the staff and associates of the Botanical Garden.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA LIBRARIES

The University of Georgia Libraries include the Main (Ilah Dunlap Little) Memorial Library, the Science (South Branch) Library, the Law Library, the Georgia Center Library, and various lab collections on the UGA campus, with experiment station libraries in Griffin, Tifton, Skidaway, and Sapelo Island.

The functions of a research library include supporting undergraduate instruction, graduate instruction, professional schools, and faculty research. The usefulness of a research library's collections extends to other educational institutions, and into the practical everyday affairs of commerce, industry, and government across the entire State or region.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA PRESS

The University of Georgia Press was organized in the summer of 1938 with the stated purpose of publishing scholarly books and monographs. Its primary function is to publish the results of research and scholarship for the benefit of scholars and students and to publish readable, authentic interpretations of such material for the educated layman. The Press also publishes works which interpret and preserve the history and culture of the State and region.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA RESEARCH PARK

The University of Georgia Research Park is being developed as a center of research and development, service, educational and training facilities for University, State, federal, and private organizations which relate to the teaching, research, and service programs being conducted on campus. Activities in the Research Park are related to applied studies in animal and plant pathology, agricultural engineering, bacteriology, botany, entomology, chemistry, pharmacy, physics, geology, food science, poultry science, forest management, work utilization, water pollution, zoology, ecology, community and area development, research into performance and function of the mentally retarded together with preparation of personnel to work with them, and other areas.

VETERINARY DIAGNOSTIC ASSISTANCE LABORATORIES

The College of Veterinary Medicine operates diagnostic and investigational laboratories at Athens and Tifton, handling over 23,000 specimen submissions each year. The laboratories are staffed and equipped to give diagnostic assistance to the livestock industry and pet owners of Georgia through a policy of referral from local veterinarians.

VETERINARY MEDICAL EXPERIMENT STATION

The Veterinary Medical Experiment Station coordinates and conducts research on health problems in food and fiber producing animals, including poultry. The research programs which have applied, basic, and comparative orientation are divided broadly into four main categories: infectious diseases, non-infectious diseases, diagnostic techniques, and therapeutic procedures. Research facilities are located within the College of Veterinary Medicine at Athens, in the Poultry Disease Research Center at Athens, and in the Veterinary Diagnostic Assistance Laboratories at Athens and Tifton. Opportunities for graduate training in the biomedical sciences are provided by the Station's research programs.

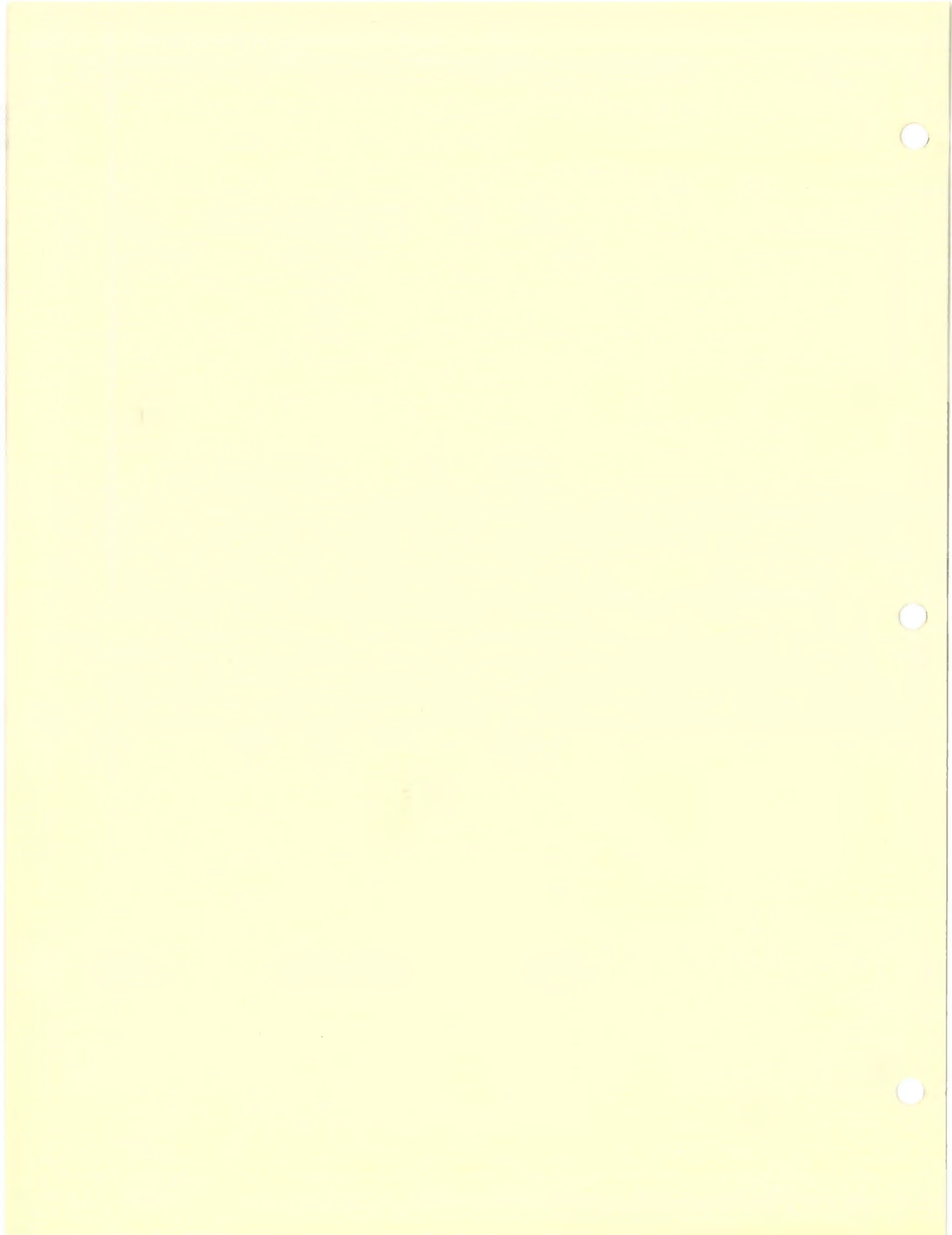
