With over 28% of graduating UGA students studying abroad, the University of Georgia looks to strengthen its rich academic tradition by providing students and faculty with an array of overseas opportunities. Perhaps most unique among UGA's overseas endeavors are its residential centers—in Oxford, England; Cortona, Italy; and San Luis, Costa Rica. These remarkable sites allow for unique educational experiences of cultural immersion and in-depth study in environments which enhance UGA's commitment to global learning. While earning resident credit and living at a UGA site abroad, students can engage with Old World educational and cultural traditions or plunge into New World ecosystems and environments, all while remaining an integral part of UGA.

The University of Oxford, whose rich academic traditions date as far back as at least the late-11th century, has been playing host to foreign students since 1190. Today, nearly 220 students a year from five of UGA's largest colleges (Arts & Sciences, Business, Journalism & Mass Communication, Public & International Affairs, and Law) live and study in this bustling, modern university city whose dreaming medieval spires recall nearly a thousand years of political intrigue, religious rebellion, civil strife and regicide, as well as innovation, education, and scientific achievement. The UGA residential center, in prosperous north Oxford, is housed in a gorgeous three-storey Victorian brick mansion that has been newly refurbished to student use; it provides the ideal base for unforgettable and uniquely rewarding academic challenges.

The Lamar Dodd School of Art's Studies Abroad Program in Cortona, Italy is now in its 38th year. It offers a three-semester, comprehensive art curriculum in a walled, medieval town an hour south of Florence. In addition it offers specialized courses in landscape architecture, Italian language, and creative writing as well as a science maymester in Biology for Medicine. In July, 2005, the John D. Kehoe Center was inaugurated which now gives UGA a 4.5 acre residential campus atop this Tuscan hill town.

The Costa Rica campus is nestled into the surrounding forest, adjacent to the Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve in the small mountain town of Alto San Luis. During the academic year, UGA Costa Rica hosts a total of sixteen UGA study abroad programs that include courses from as many disciplines, including agriculture, anthropology, art, biology, ecology, education, English, geology, landscape architecture, law, and Spanish. Many of these courses have service learning components, and UGA Costa Rica takes pride in the relationships, both local and national, that we have built within the Costa Rican community. Study abroad with UGA Costa Rica is a handson, participatory, and often life-changing experience for UGA students.

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General Information

ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

History and Location: Chartered by the Georgia General Assembly on January 27, 1785, the University of Georgia is the nation's first state-chartered university. In 1872, the University of Georgia was designated the state's land-grant institution and in 1980 was accorded sea-grant college status. The University's main campus is located in Athens-Clarke County, Georgia, approximately 60 miles northeast of the state capital of Atlanta.

Academic Schools and Colleges: The University is comprised of fifteen schools and colleges: Agricultural and Environmental Sciences; Arts and Sciences; Business; Education; Environment and Design; Family and Consumer Sciences; Forestry and Natural Resources; Graduate School; Journalism and Mass Communication; Law; Pharmacy; Public Health; Public and International Affairs; Social Work; and Veterinary Medicine.

Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred: The University of Georgia is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as well as a variety of discipline-specific accrediting agencies. Academic offerings include 22 bachelor's degrees in over 140 major fields, 29 master's degrees in 123 major fields, the specialist in education degree in 20 major fields, 3 doctoral degrees in 84 major fields, and professional degrees in Law, Pharmacy, Public Health, and Veterinary Medicine. During the 2005-06 fiscal year, the University awarded 6,060 bachelor's degrees, 1,658 master's and specialist degrees, 374 doctoral degrees, and 454 professional degrees.

Faculty: Full-time professorial faculty for the fall 2006 totaled 1,741. 95% of the full-time faculty were tenured or tenure-track and 95% hold the doctorate or other terminal degree. Average salaries for the fiscal year 2006 were \$95,900 for professors, \$67,600 for associate professors, and \$61,700 for assistant professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2006 enrollment totaled 33,959, which included 25,437 undergraduates, 6,918 graduate students, and 1,604 first professional students. 92% of undergraduates and 71% of graduate and professional students were enrolled on a full-time basis. The undergraduate student body was 43% male and 17% minority. 915 undergraduate and 1,244 graduate and professional students were from 131 foreign countries

Admissions/Retention: 5,063 first-time freshmen enrolled for the fall 2006. 55% of all admitted freshmen enrolled and 32% of all freshman applicants enrolled. The average total SAT score for entering freshmen was 1228. 4,269 or 85% of new freshmen attended 402 Georgia high schools. On average, 92% of first-time full-time freshmen return for their sophomore year. 54% of all undergraduate transfer applicants were accepted and 1,046 enrolled for the fall 2006. 61% of accepted new graduate students enrolled in the fall 2006.

Costs: Academic year 2006-07 tuition and fees were \$4,964 for new resident undergraduates and \$18,040 for new nonresident undergraduates. Total 2006-07 estimated cost of attendance for resident undergraduates was \$14,758. This amount included tuition and mandatory fees, books and supplies, room and board, and other expenses.

Finance: For fiscal year 2006, total revenues exceeded \$1.24 billion, and included \$419 million from state appropriations. 16.1% of total operating expenditures were designated for instruction and 21.6% for research. Sponsored awards for fiscal year 2006 totaled \$210,487,263.

Physical Facilities: The University occupies and maintains over 18 million square feet of space. The main campus includes 380 buildings for a total of 14,095,604 square feet. Nine major building projects were completed during 2006 for a total cost of over \$97.8 million. The University's fall 2006 land holdings totaled 42,247 acres in 32 Georgia counties.

THE MISSION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

The University of Georgia, a land-grant and sea-grant university with statewide commitments and responsibilities, is the state's flagship institution of higher education. It is also the state's oldest, most comprehensive and most diversified institution of higher education. Its motto, "to teach, to serve, and to inquire into the nature of things," reflects the University's integral and unique role in the conservation and enhancement of the state's and nation's intellectual, cultural, and environmental heritage.

The University of Georgia shares with the other research universities of the University System of Georgia the following core characteristics:

- a statewide responsibility and commitment to excellence and academic achievements having national and international recognition;
- a commitment to excellence in a teaching/learning environment dedicated to serve a diverse and well-prepared student body, to promote high levels of student achievement, and to provide appropriate academic support services;
- a commitment to excellence in research, scholarship, and creative endeavors that are focused on
 organized programs to create, maintain, and apply new knowledge and theories; that promote
 instructional quality and effectiveness; and that enhance institutionally relevant faculty
 qualifications;
- a commitment to excellence in public service, economic development, and technical assistance
 activities designed to address the strategic needs of the State of Georgia along with a
 comprehensive offering of continuing education designed to meet the needs of Georgia's citizens in
 life-long learning and professional education;
- a wide range of academic and professional programming at the baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral levels.

With its statewide mission and core characteristics, the University of Georgia endeavors to prepare the University community and the State for full participation in the global society of the twenty-first century. Through its programs and practices, it seeks to foster the understanding of and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened and educated citizenry. It further provides for cultural, ethnic, gender, and racial diversity in the faculty, staff, and student body. The University is committed to preparing the University community to appreciate the critical importance of a quality environment to an interdependent global society.

As a comprehensive land-grant—sea-grant institution, the University of Georgia offers baccalaureate, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees in the arts, humanities, social sciences, biological sciences, physical sciences, agricultural and environmental sciences, business, environmental design, family and consumer sciences, forest resources, journalism and mass communication, education, law, pharmacy, social work, and veterinary medicine.

The University attracts students nationally and internationally as well as from within Georgia. It offers the state's broadest array of possibilities in graduate and professional education, and thus a large minority of the student body is postbaccalaureate. The predominantly Georgian undergraduate student body is a mix of highly qualified students originally admitted as freshmen and selected transfer students principally from other University System institutions.

With original scholarship, basic and applied research, and creative activities constituting an essential core from which to draw, the impact of the land-grant—sea-grant mission is reflected throughout the state. Cooperative extension, continuing education, public service, experiment stations, and technology transfer are all designed to enhance the well-being of the citizens of Georgia through their roles in economic, social, and community development.

As it has been historically, the University of Georgia is responsive to the evolution of the state's educational, social, and economic needs. It aspires through its strategic planning to even closer contact and interaction with public and private institutions throughout the state as well as with the citizens it serves.

THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA STRATEGIC PLAN

The institutional goal of the University of Georgia is to provide the best possible education to its students; the best possible service to the citizens of the state of Georgia and beyond; and research, discovery and creative achievement of the highest order to benefit Georgia, the nation, and the world.

Achieving the University of Georgia's institutional goal requires the following elements:

- Comprehensive strength in undergraduate educational programs
- · Premier graduate and professional programs
- A faculty of national and international distinction
- Premier research and scholarship
- A culturally diverse and inclusive academic community
- Strong ties between the University and external constituencies
- A comprehensive learning community and a working environment of high quality
- A leading outreach program to extend knowledge and expertise to the people of the State and beyond

The University of Georgia Strategic Plan comprises the set of strategic plans which delineate plans of primary organizational units and an institutional strategic plan. The institutional plan is used as the compass by which operational plans are developed. Operational plans include:

- the academic plan, including research, outreach and public service, and student affairs;
- the physical plan, which includes plans for capital outlay, renovation, and maintenance of the University's physical plant;
- the plan for external relations, which includes plans for a capital campaign;
- an organizational and personnel plan, which includes plans for faculty and staff development;
- the financial plan for the institution; and
- an institutional communications and marketing plan that outlines how these plans should be articulated to public and key constituencies, both internal and external

In order to achieve its vision for the future, the University of Georgia is engaging three strategic directions to be carried out at the institutional, college, and unit levels:

- Investing in its research endeavors
- Competing in a global economy





FALL TERMS 1997-2006








Degrees Conferred



DEGREES CONFERRED BY SCHOOL OR COLLEGE AND DEGREE LEVEL FISCAL YEAR 2005-06



FISCAL YEAR 2005-06













DISTRIBUTION OF ALUMNI BY STATE













FALL TERMS 2001 - 2005









FISCAL YEAR 2005-06



FISCAL YEARS 2001-02 THROUGH 2005-06






