A commitment to diversity is an integral part of the University of Georgia's educational mission. As expressed in the institution's mission statement, the university "seeks to foster the understanding of and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened and educated citizenry." The Fact Book 2007 cover honors three courageous pioneers and their contributions to diversity at the University of Georgia.

In January 1961, Hamilton E. Holmes became the first African-American man admitted to the University of Georgia. He graduated cum laude with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1963, and became the first African American admitted to the Emory University School of Medicine. Dr. Holmes had an esteemed medical career, including serving as Associate Dean of the Emory University School of Medicine and culminating as the head of orthopedic surgery at Grady Memorial Hospital. He was an ardent supporter of the university and was the first African-American member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Georgia Foundation at the time of his death in 1995. In 1999, Dr. Holmes became the first African American to have an endowed professorship at UGA established in his name.

In January 1961, Charlayne Hunter (now Hunter-Gault) became the first African-American woman admitted to the University of Georgia. After graduating in 1963, Hunter-Gault went on to become an award-winning journalist, respected for her work in television and print with such major outlets as CNN, NPR and *The New York Times*. Among other honors, she is a two-time winner of the prestigious Peabody Award for broadcast excellence. She has returned to UGA numerous times, including serving as a commencement speaker in 1998. UGA's Grady College of Journalism and Mass Communication created a Distinguished Writer in Residence program in her honor.


In May 1961, Mary Frances Early transferred her graduate work from the University of Michigan to UGA. On August 16, 1962, she became the first African American to graduate from the University of Georgia, earning a master's degree in music education. Early had a lengthy and distinguished career as a music teacher and administrator in Atlanta public schools and colleges. She was the first African-American President of the Georgia Music Educators Association and received their Distinguished Educator Award. UGA's College of Education created an endowed professorship in her name and the Graduate and Professional Scholars organization holds an annual lecture in her honor.

The building depicted behind the Arch was renamed the Holmes/Hunter Academic Building on January 9, 2001, as part of the 40th Anniversary commemoration of the desegregation of the university. Holmes and Hunter walked past the historic Arch and into this building to register for classes. The courage and fortitude displayed by these students and their families paved the way for others to follow.

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
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


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General Information





ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

History and Location: Chartered by the Georgia General Assembly on January 27, 1785, the University of Georgia is the nation's first state-chartered university. In 1872, the University of Georgia was designated the state's land-grant institution and in 1980 was accorded sea-grant college status. The University's main campus is located in Athens-Clarke County, Georgia, approximately 60 miles northeast of the state capital of Atlanta.

Academic Schools and Colleges: The University is comprised of sixteen schools and colleges: Agricultural and Environmental Sciences; Arts and Sciences; Business; Ecology; Education; Environment and Design; Family and Consumer Sciences; Forestry and Natural Resources; Graduate School; Journalism and Mass Communication; Law; Pharmacy; Public Health; Public and International Affairs; Social Work; and Veterinary Medicine.

Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred: The University of Georgia is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as well as a variety of discipline-specific accrediting agencies. Academic offerings include 22 bachelor's degrees in over 140 major fields, 30 master's degrees in 124 major fields, the specialist in education degree in 19 major fields, 4 doctoral degrees in 87 major fields, and professional degrees in Law, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine. During the 2006-07 fiscal year, the University awarded 6,203 bachelor's degrees, 1,627 master's and specialist degrees, 388 doctoral degrees, and 470 professional degrees.

Faculty: Full-time professorial faculty for the fall 2007 totaled 1,733. 95% of the full-time faculty were tenured or tenure-track and 96% hold the doctorate or other terminal degree. Average salaries for the fiscal year 2007 were \$99,900 for professors, \$71,000 for associate professors, and \$65,000 for assistant professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2007 enrollment totaled 33,831, which included 25,335 undergraduates, 6,947 graduate students, and 1,549 first professional students. 92% of undergraduates and 69% of graduate and professional students were enrolled on a full-time basis. The undergraduate student body was 42% male and 18% minority. 907 undergraduate and 1,213 graduate and professional students were from 127 foreign countries

Admissions/Retention: 4,710 first-time freshmen enrolled for the fall 2007. 55% of all admitted freshmen enrolled and 28% of all freshman applicants enrolled. The average total SAT score for entering freshmen was 1233. 3,931 or 84% of new freshmen attended 398 Georgia high schools. On average, 92% of first-time full-time freshmen return for their sophomore year. 42% of all undergraduate transfer applicants were accepted and 1,135 enrolled for the fall 2007. 62% of accepted new graduate students enrolled in the fall 2007.

Costs: Academic year 2007-08 tuition and fees were \$5,622 for new resident undergraduates and \$20,726 for new nonresident undergraduates. Total 2007-08 estimated cost of attendance for resident undergraduates was \$16,054. This amount included tuition and mandatory fees, books and supplies, room and board, and other expenses.

Finance: For fiscal year 2007, total revenues exceeded \$1.31 billion, and included \$437 million from state appropriations. 19% of total operating expenditures were designated for instruction and 24.7% for research. Sponsored awards for fiscal year 2007 totaled \$220,908,940.

Physical Facilities: The University occupies and maintains over 18 million square feet of space. The main campus includes 379 buildings for a total of 14,157,640 square feet. Eight major building projects were completed during 2007 for a total cost of over \$41.7 million. The University's fall 2007 land holdings totaled 42,247 acres in 32 Georgia counties.



THE MISSION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

The University of Georgia, a land-grant and sea-grant university with statewide commitments and responsibilities, is the state's flagship institution of higher education. It is also the state's oldest, most comprehensive and most diversified institution of higher education. Its motto, "to teach, to serve, and to inquire into the nature of things," reflects the University's integral and unique role in the conservation and enhancement of the state's and nation's intellectual, cultural, and environmental heritage.

The University of Georgia shares with the other research universities of the University System of Georgia the following core characteristics:

- a statewide responsibility and commitment to excellence and academic achievements having national and international recognition;
- a commitment to excellence in a teaching/learning environment dedicated to serve a diverse and well-prepared student body, to promote high levels of student achievement, and to provide appropriate academic support services;
- a commitment to excellence in research, scholarship, and creative endeavors that are focused on
 organized programs to create, maintain, and apply new knowledge and theories; that promote
 instructional quality and effectiveness; and that enhance institutionally relevant faculty
 qualifications;
- a commitment to excellence in public service, economic development, and technical assistance
 activities designed to address the strategic needs of the State of Georgia along with a
 comprehensive offering of continuing education designed to meet the needs of Georgia's citizens in
 life-long learning and professional education;
- a wide range of academic and professional programming at the baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral levels.

With its statewide mission and core characteristics, the University of Georgia endeavors to prepare the University community and the State for full participation in the global society of the twenty-first century. Through its programs and practices, it seeks to foster the understanding of and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened and educated citizenry. It further provides for cultural, ethnic, gender, and racial diversity in the faculty, staff, and student body. The University is committed to preparing the University community to appreciate the critical importance of a quality environment to an interdependent global society.

As a comprehensive land-grant—sea-grant institution, the University of Georgia offers baccalaureate, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees in the arts, humanities, social sciences, biological sciences, physical sciences, agricultural and environmental sciences, business, environmental design, family and consumer sciences, forest resources, journalism and mass communication, education, law, pharmacy, social work, and veterinary medicine.

The University attracts students nationally and internationally as well as from within Georgia. It offers the state's broadest array of possibilities in graduate and professional education, and thus a large minority of the student body is postbaccalaureate. The predominantly Georgian undergraduate student body is a mix of highly qualified students originally admitted as freshmen and selected transfer students principally from other University System institutions.

With original scholarship, basic and applied research, and creative activities constituting an essential core from which to draw, the impact of the land-grant—sea-grant mission is reflected throughout the state. Cooperative extension, continuing education, public service, experiment stations, and technology transfer are all designed to enhance the well-being of the citizens of Georgia through their roles in economic, social, and community development.

As it has been historically, the University of Georgia is responsive to the evolution of the state's educational, social, and economic needs. It aspires through its strategic planning to even closer contact and interaction with public and private institutions throughout the state as well as with the citizens it serves.

- A leading outreach program to extend knowledge and expertise to the people of the State and beyond



- an institutional communications and marketing plan that outlines how these plans should be articulated to public and key constituencies, both internal and external


In order to achieve its vision for the future, the University of Georgia is engaging three strategic directions to be carried out at the institutional, college, and unit levels:



OCTOBER 2007













Figure 5 DISTRIBUTION OF TOTAL ENROLLMENT BY STATE OF ORIGIN **FALL 2007** Washington





FISCAL YEAR 2006-07





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

ENTERING COHORTS 1998-2006




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













Figure 15 SCHOLARSHIP ATHLETES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA FALL TERMS 2003 - 2007









FALL TERMS 2002 - 2006











FISCAL YEAR 2006-07



FISCAL YEARS 2002-03 THROUGH 2006-07






