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As early as 1946, William Tate, then dean of students at UGA, expressed a need for a new student center, as the number and variety of student activities had outgrown the capacity of the current facility, Memorial Hall. It was 23 years before planning for Phase I of the center would commence and another 12 years of development before the first bits of earth were moved on the site adjacent to Sanford Stadium.

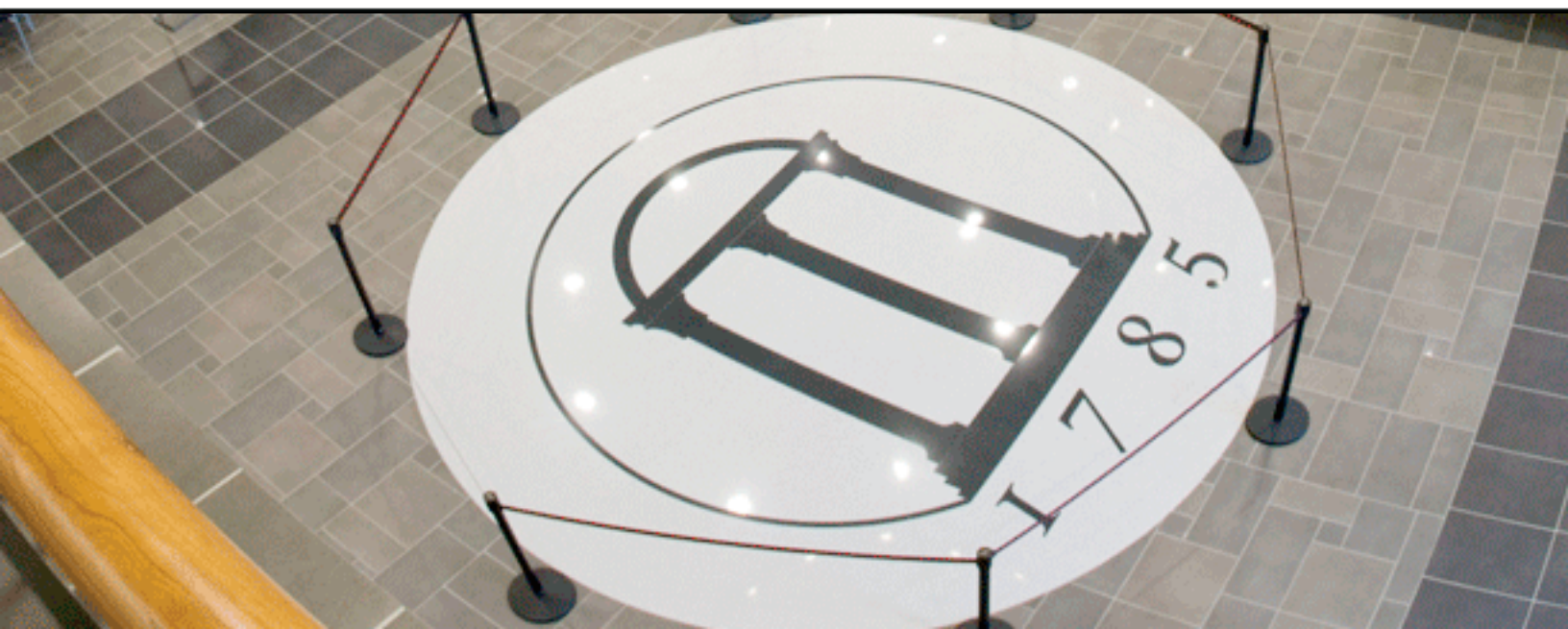
On January 28, 1981, a crowd of administrators, staff, students, and visiting dignitaries were present as UGA President Fred C. Davison led the groundbreaking ceremony. University officials, in consultation with the Board of Regents, decided that the new center would be named in memory of the beloved administrator who had first conceived it, and on October 20, 1983, the Dean William Tate Student Center was dedicated and officially opened. Dean Tate had passed away the year before.

The student center quickly became the “heart” of student activity on campus. For more than two decades, the many programs and services housed within Tate have been designed to meet the social, cultural, and recreational needs of UGA’s student body. During spring semester 2005, the student body approved via referendum vote, a \$25-per-semester activity fee increase to provide funding for a \$58-million expansion and renovation of the center.

The Tate Student Center Expansion opened its doors to the University community on June 1, 2009. Incoming first-year students and their parents were among the first to see the new facility as part of orientation. On August 20, 2009 UGA President Michael F. Adams led a gathering of faculty, staff, administrators, and students in cutting the ribbon, officially dedicating the expanded facility.

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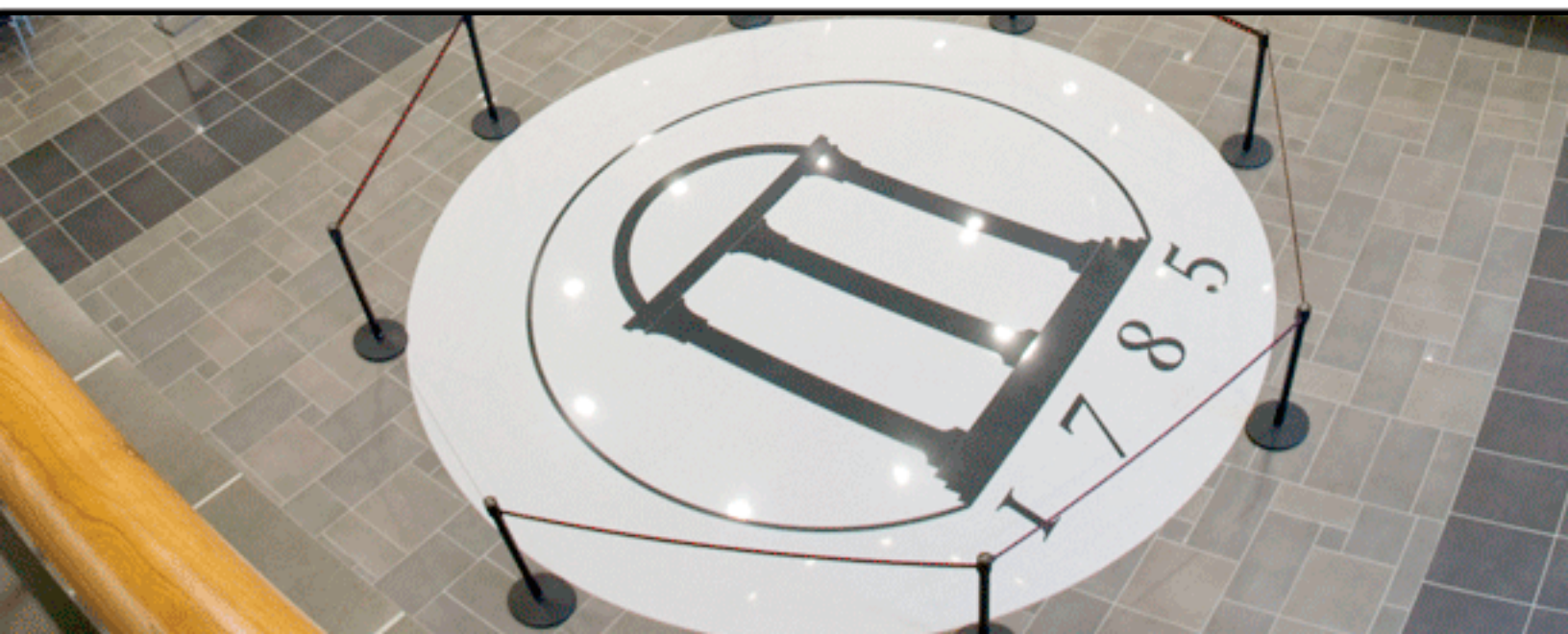


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General Information





ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

History and Location: Chartered by the Georgia General Assembly on January 27, 1785, the University of Georgia is the nation's first state-chartered university. In 1872, the University of Georgia was designated the state's land-grant institution and in 1980 was accorded sea-grant college status. The University's main campus is located in Athens-Clarke County, Georgia, approximately 60 miles northeast of the state capital of Atlanta.

Academic Schools and Colleges: The University is comprised of sixteen schools and colleges: Agricultural and Environmental Sciences; Arts and Sciences; Business; Ecology; Education; Environment and Design; Family and Consumer Sciences; Forestry and Natural Resources; Graduate School; Journalism and Mass Communication; Law; Pharmacy; Public Health; Public and International Affairs; Social Work; and Veterinary Medicine.

Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred: The University of Georgia is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as well as a variety of discipline-specific accrediting agencies. Academic offerings include 22 bachelor's degrees in over 140 major fields, 34 master's degrees in 124 major fields, the specialist in education degree in 19 major fields, 4 doctoral degrees in 91 major fields, and professional degrees in Law, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine. During the 2008-09 fiscal year, the University awarded 6,316 bachelor's degrees, 1,781 master's and specialist degrees, 459 doctoral degrees, and 438 professional degrees.

Faculty: Full-time professorial faculty for the fall 2009 totaled 1,725. 96% of the full-time faculty were tenured or tenure-track and 96% hold the doctorate or other terminal degree. Average salaries for the fiscal year 2009 were \$107,100 for professors, \$77,900 for associate professors, and \$71,300 for assistant professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2009 enrollment totaled 34,885, which included 26,142 undergraduates, 7,136 graduate students, and 1,607 first professional students. 94% of undergraduates and 73% of graduate and professional students were enrolled on a full-time basis. The undergraduate student body was 45% male and 19% minority. 938 undergraduate and 1,243 graduate and professional students were from 133 foreign countries

Admissions/Retention: 4,686 first-time freshmen enrolled for the fall 2009. 49% of all admitted freshmen enrolled and 26% of all freshman applicants enrolled. The average total SAT score for entering freshmen was 1242. 4,099 or 87% of new freshmen attended 396 Georgia high schools. On average, 93% of first-time full-time freshmen return for their sophomore year. 59% of all undergraduate transfer applicants were accepted and 1,355 enrolled for the fall 2009. 59% of accepted new graduate students enrolled in the fall 2009.

Costs: Academic year 2009-10 tuition and fees totaled \$7,530 for new resident undergraduates and \$25,740 for new nonresident undergraduates. Academic year 2009-10 estimated cost of attendance for resident undergraduates totaled \$18,000. This amount included tuition and mandatory fees, books and supplies, room and board, and other expenses.

Finance: For fiscal year 2009, total revenues exceeded \$1.22 billion, and included \$445 million from state appropriations. 19.4% of total operating expenditures were designated for instruction and 23.8% for research. Sponsored awards for fiscal year 2009 totaled \$246,735,291.

Physical Facilities: The University occupies and maintains over 19 million square feet of space. The main campus includes 388 buildings for a total of 15,015,263 square feet. Thirteen major building projects were completed during 2009 for a total cost of over \$175 million. The University's fall 2009 land holdings totaled approximately 39,000 acres in 30 Georgia counties.



THE MISSION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

The University of Georgia, a land-grant and sea-grant university with statewide commitments and responsibilities, is the state's flagship institution of higher education. It is also the state's oldest, most comprehensive and most diversified institution of higher education. Its motto, "to teach, to serve, and to inquire into the nature of things," reflects the University's integral and unique role in the conservation and enhancement of the state's and nation's intellectual, cultural, and environmental heritage.

The University of Georgia shares with the other research universities of the University System of Georgia the following core characteristics:

- a statewide responsibility and commitment to excellence and academic achievements having national and international recognition;
- a commitment to excellence in a teaching/learning environment dedicated to serve a diverse and well-prepared student body, to promote high levels of student achievement, and to provide appropriate academic support services;
- a commitment to excellence in research, scholarship, and creative endeavors that are focused on organized programs to create, maintain, and apply new knowledge and theories; that promote instructional quality and effectiveness; and that enhance institutionally relevant faculty qualifications;
- a commitment to excellence in public service, economic development, and technical assistance activities designed to address the strategic needs of the State of Georgia along with a comprehensive offering of continuing education designed to meet the needs of Georgia's citizens in life-long learning and professional education;
- a wide range of academic and professional programming at the baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral levels.

With its statewide mission and core characteristics, the University of Georgia endeavors to prepare the University community and the State for full participation in the global society of the twenty-first century. Through its programs and practices, it seeks to foster the understanding of and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened and educated citizenry. It further provides for cultural, ethnic, gender, and racial diversity in the faculty, staff, and student body. The University is committed to preparing the University community to appreciate the critical importance of a quality environment to an interdependent global society.

As a comprehensive land-grant—sea-grant institution, the University of Georgia offers baccalaureate, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees in the arts, humanities, social sciences, biological sciences, physical sciences, agricultural and environmental sciences, business, environmental design, family and consumer sciences, forest resources, journalism and mass communication, education, law, pharmacy, social work, and veterinary medicine.

The University attracts students nationally and internationally as well as from within Georgia. It offers the state's broadest array of possibilities in graduate and professional education, and thus a large minority of the student body is postbaccalaureate. The predominantly Georgian undergraduate student body is a mix of highly qualified students originally admitted as freshmen and selected transfer students principally from other University System institutions.

With original scholarship, basic and applied research, and creative activities constituting an essential core from which to draw, the impact of the land-grant—sea-grant mission is reflected throughout the state. Cooperative extension, continuing education, public service, experiment stations, and technology transfer are all designed to enhance the well-being of the citizens of Georgia through their roles in economic, social, and community development.

As it has been historically, the University of Georgia is responsive to the evolution of the state's educational, social, and economic needs. It aspires through its strategic planning to even closer contact and interaction with public and private institutions throughout the state as well as with the citizens it serves.

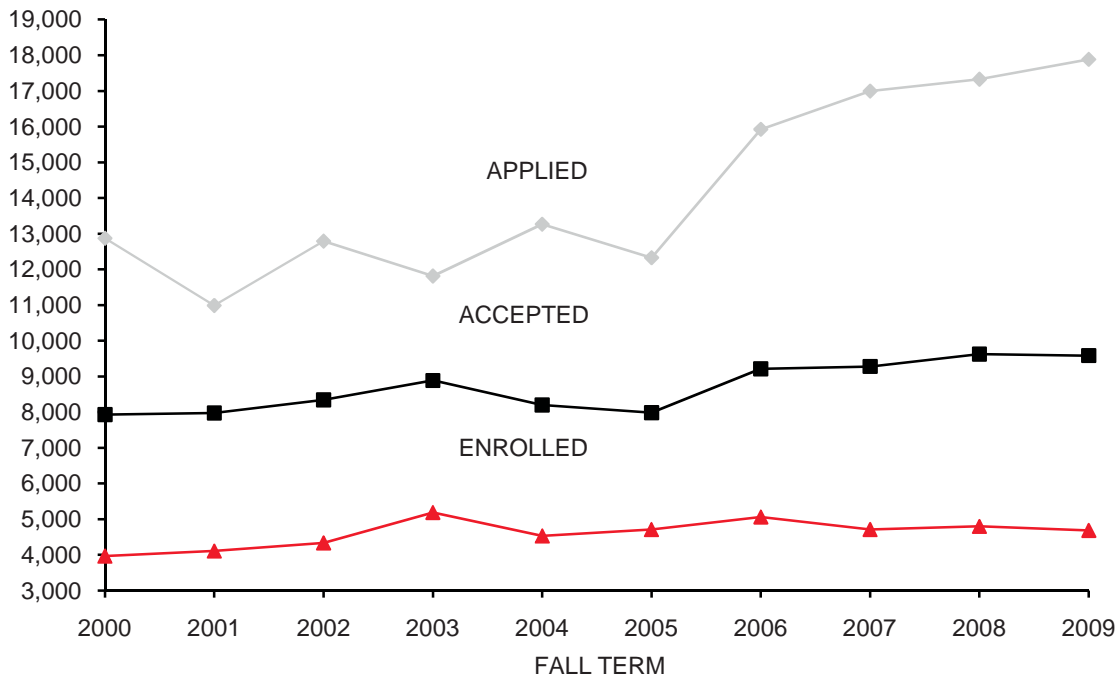

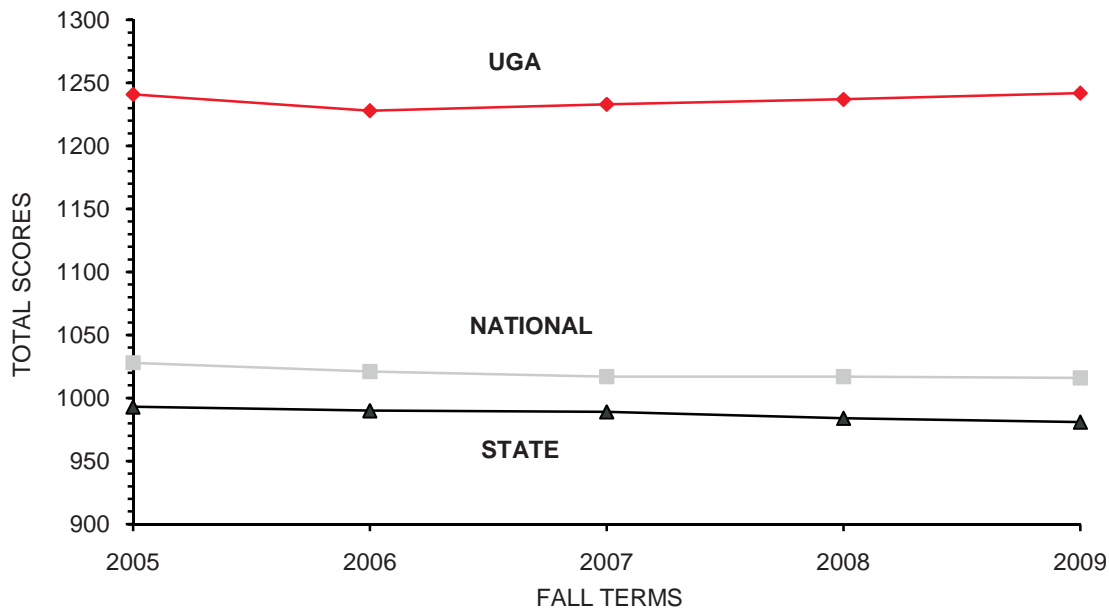

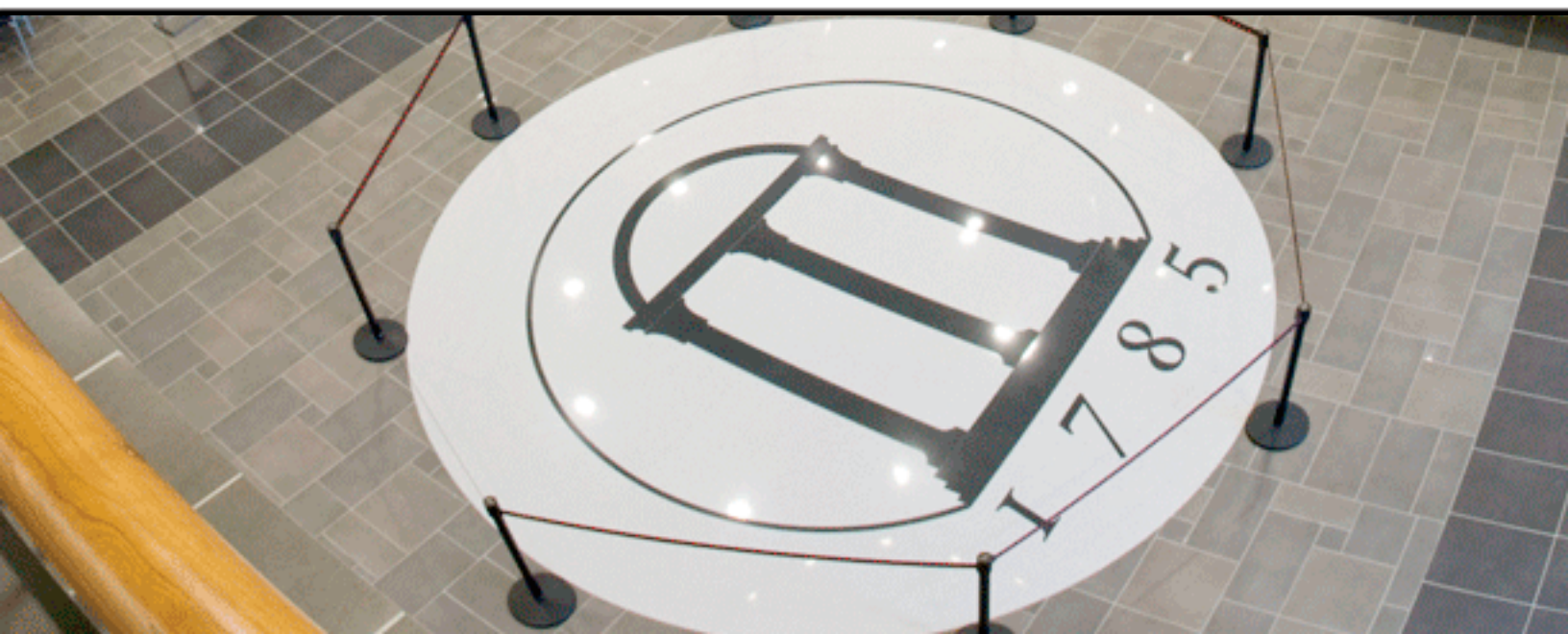

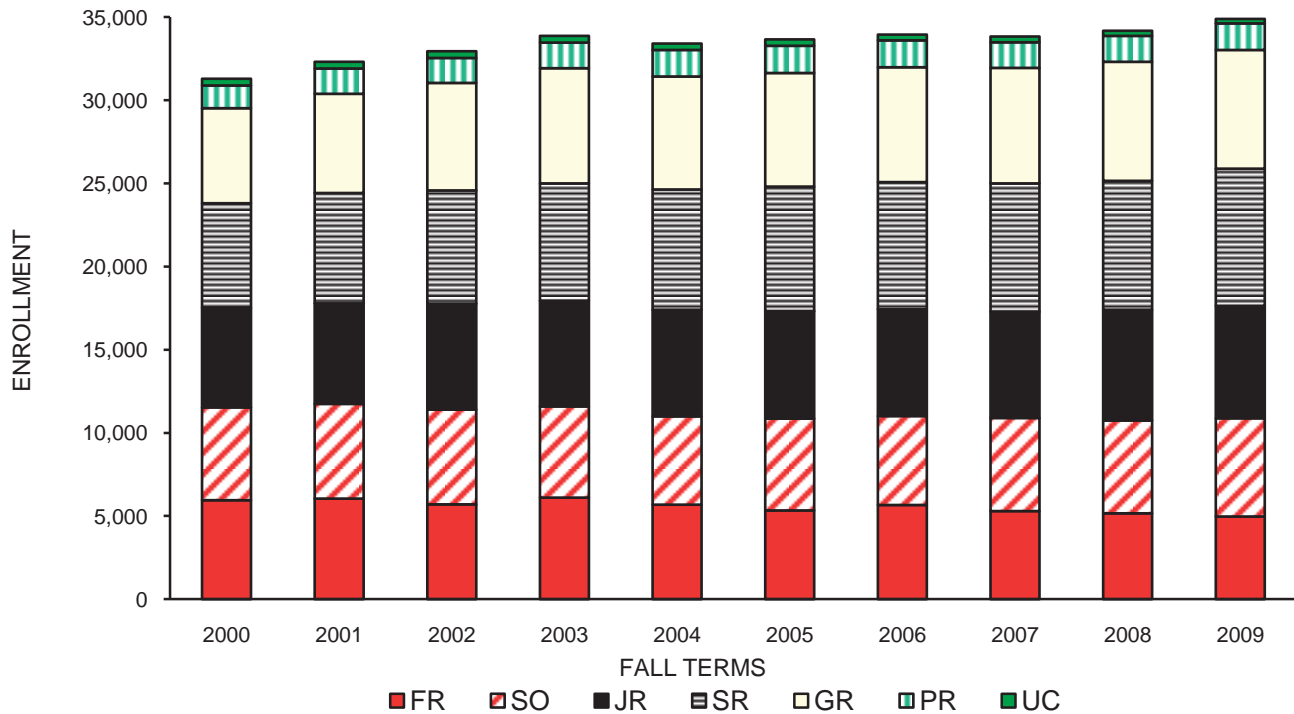

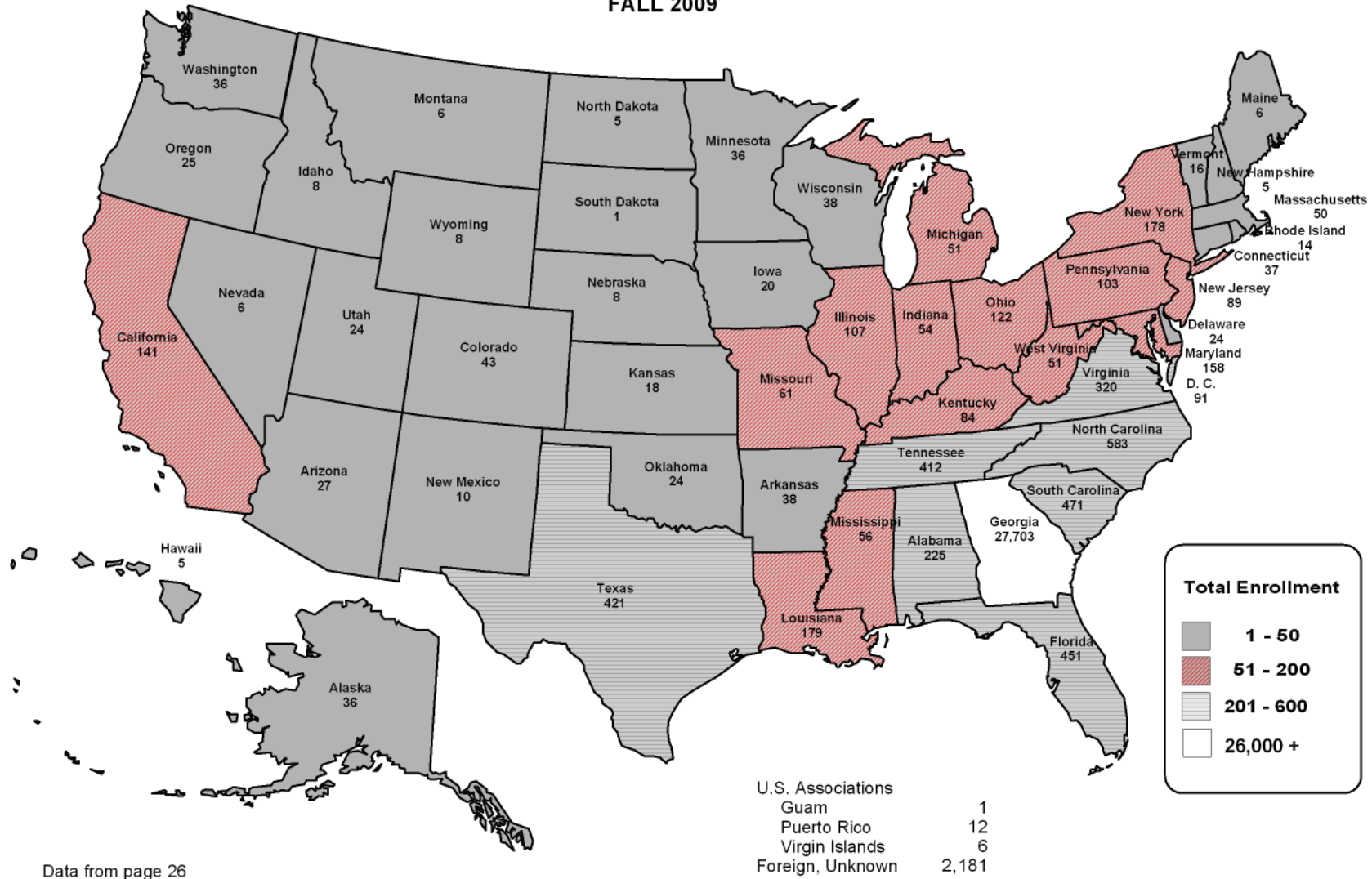

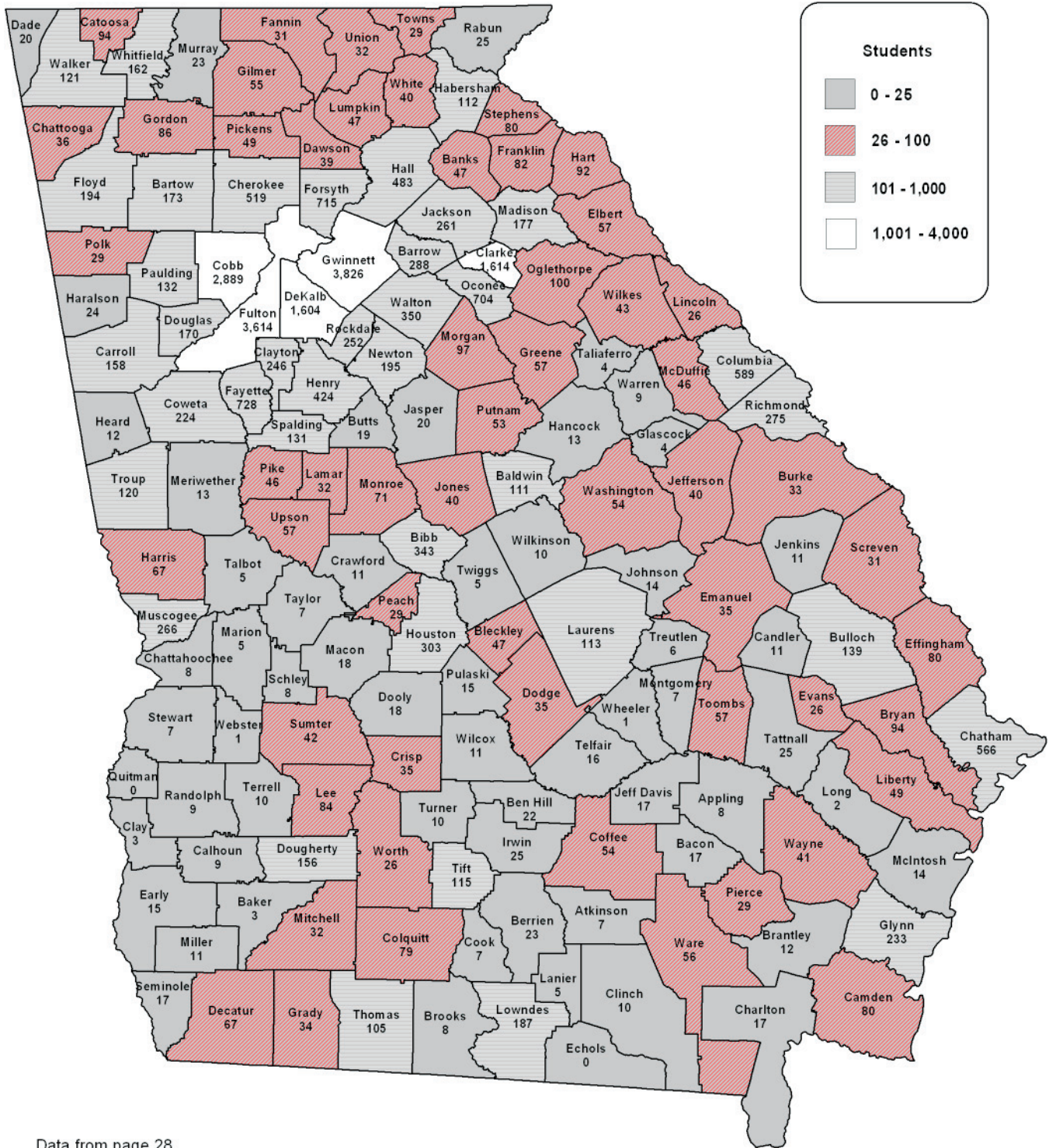

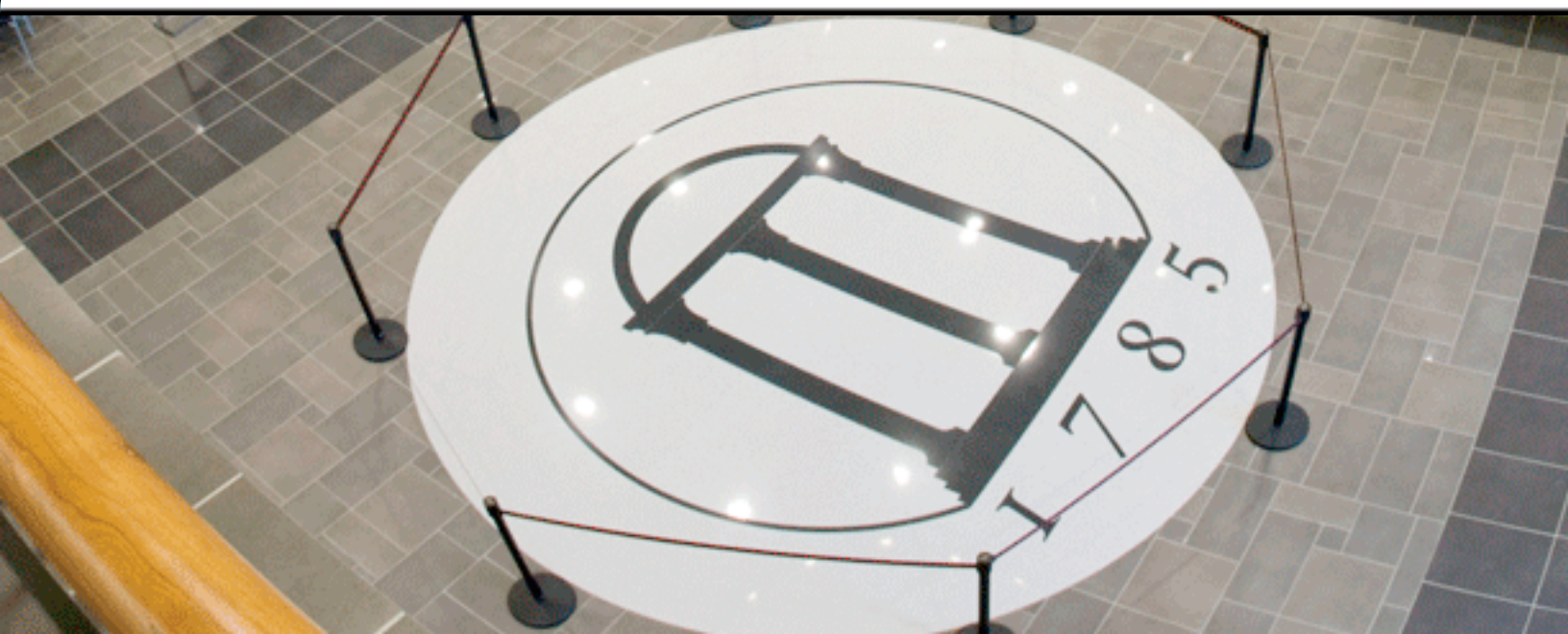

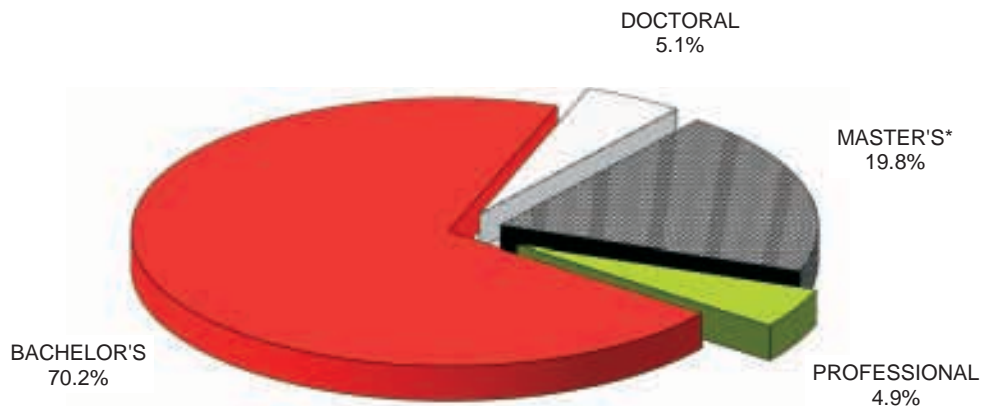

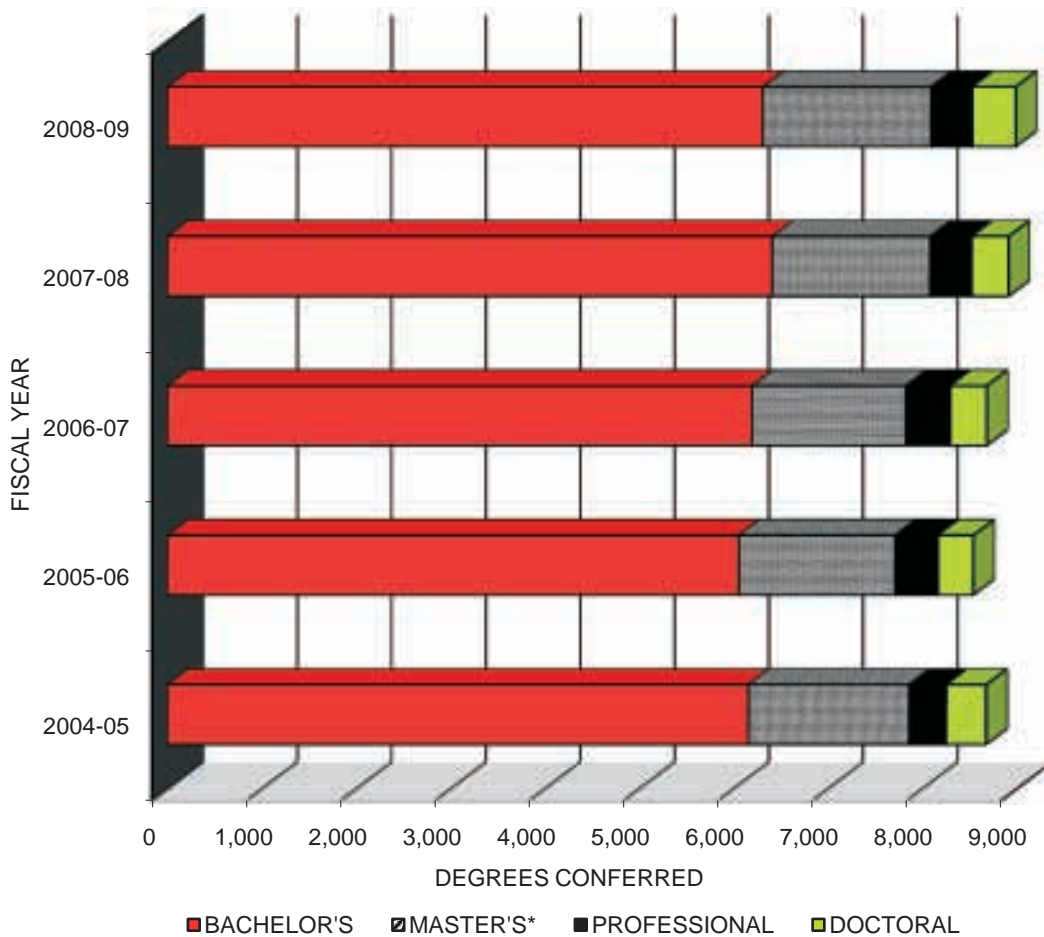

ENTERING COHORTS 1999-2008

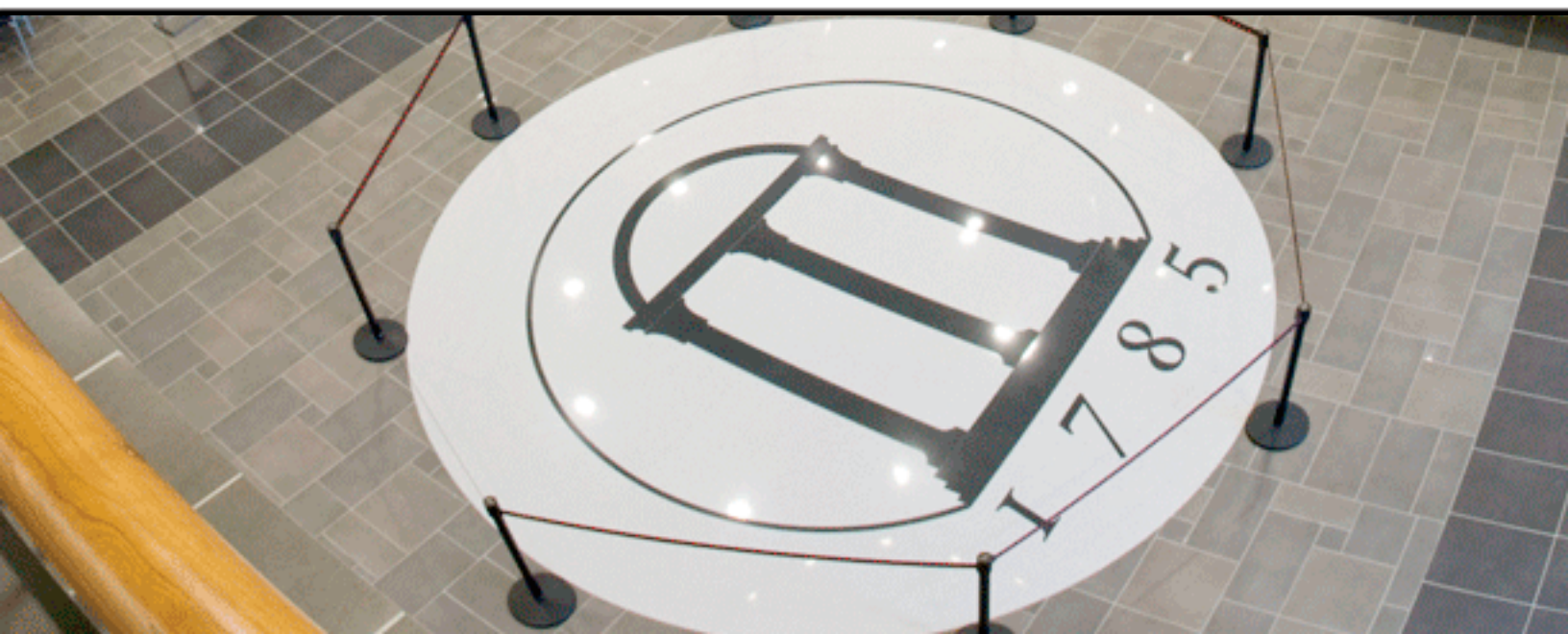

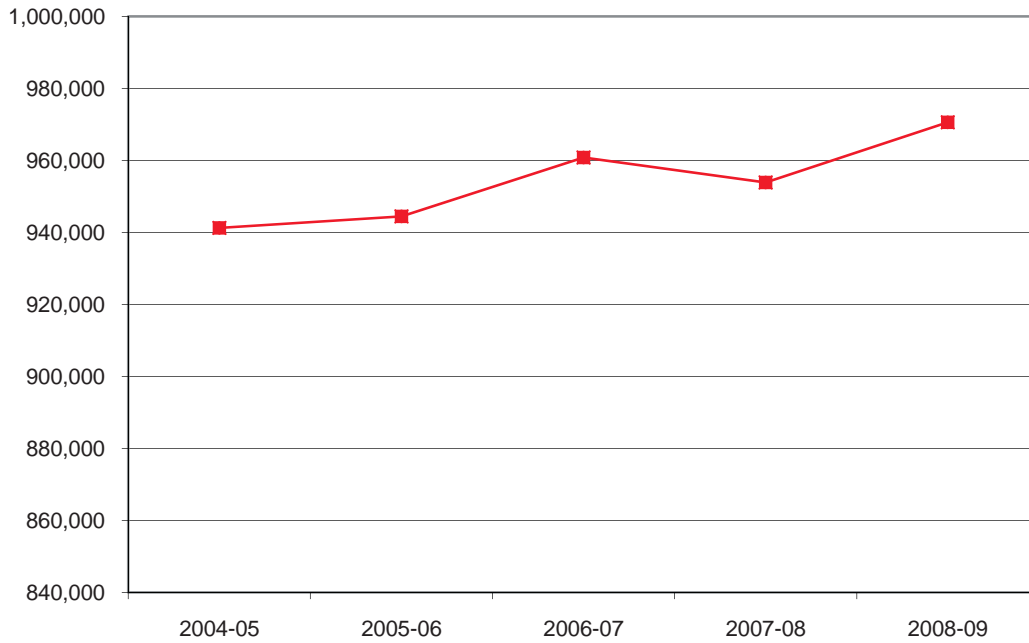

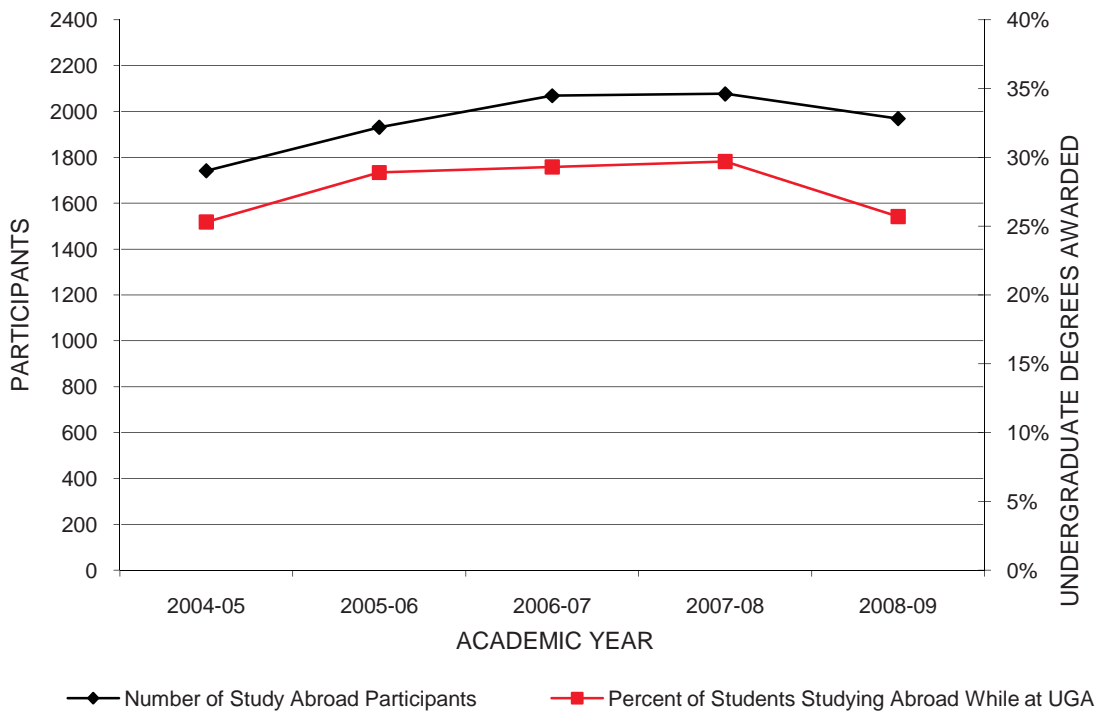

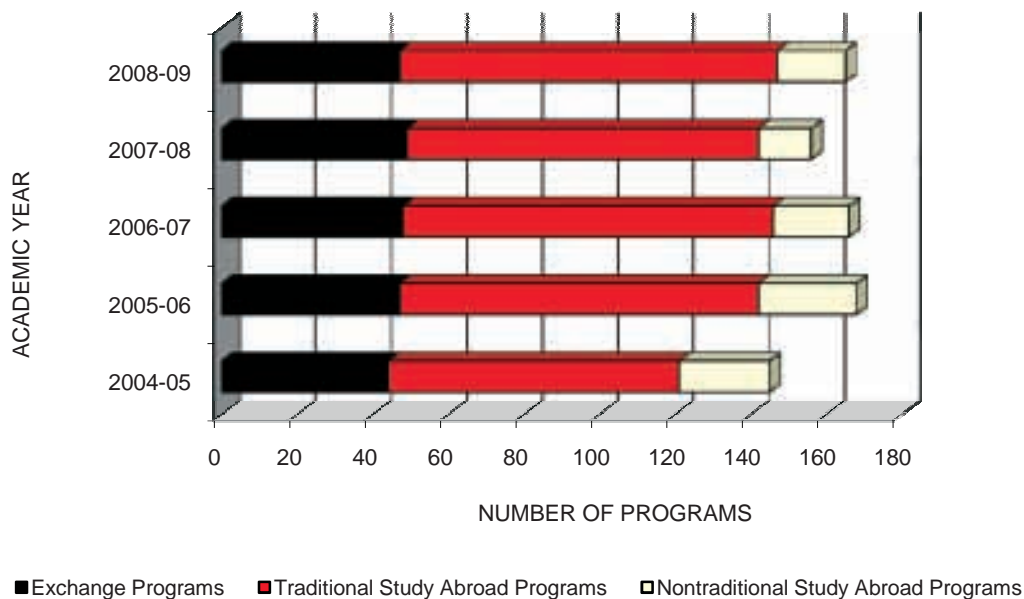

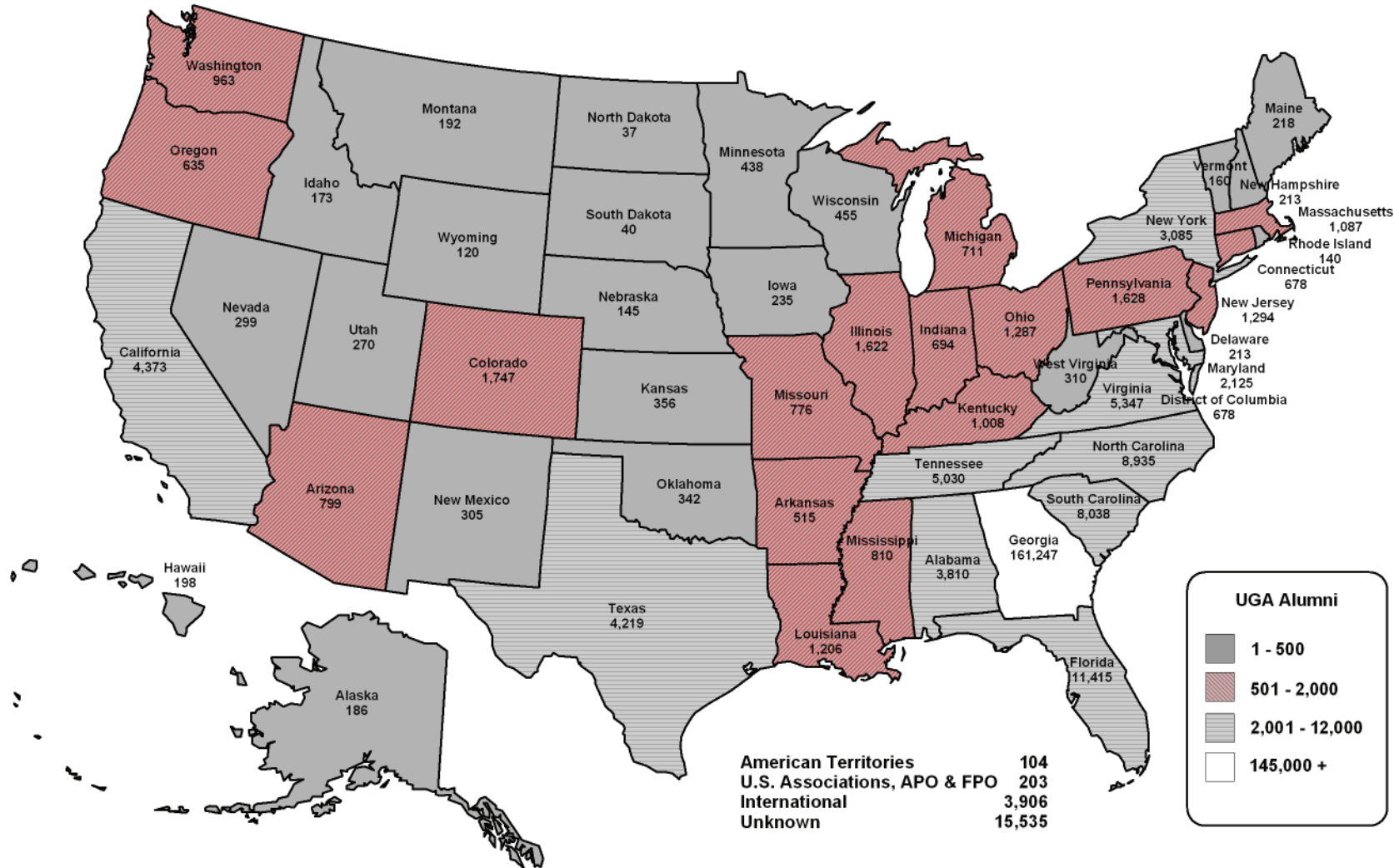

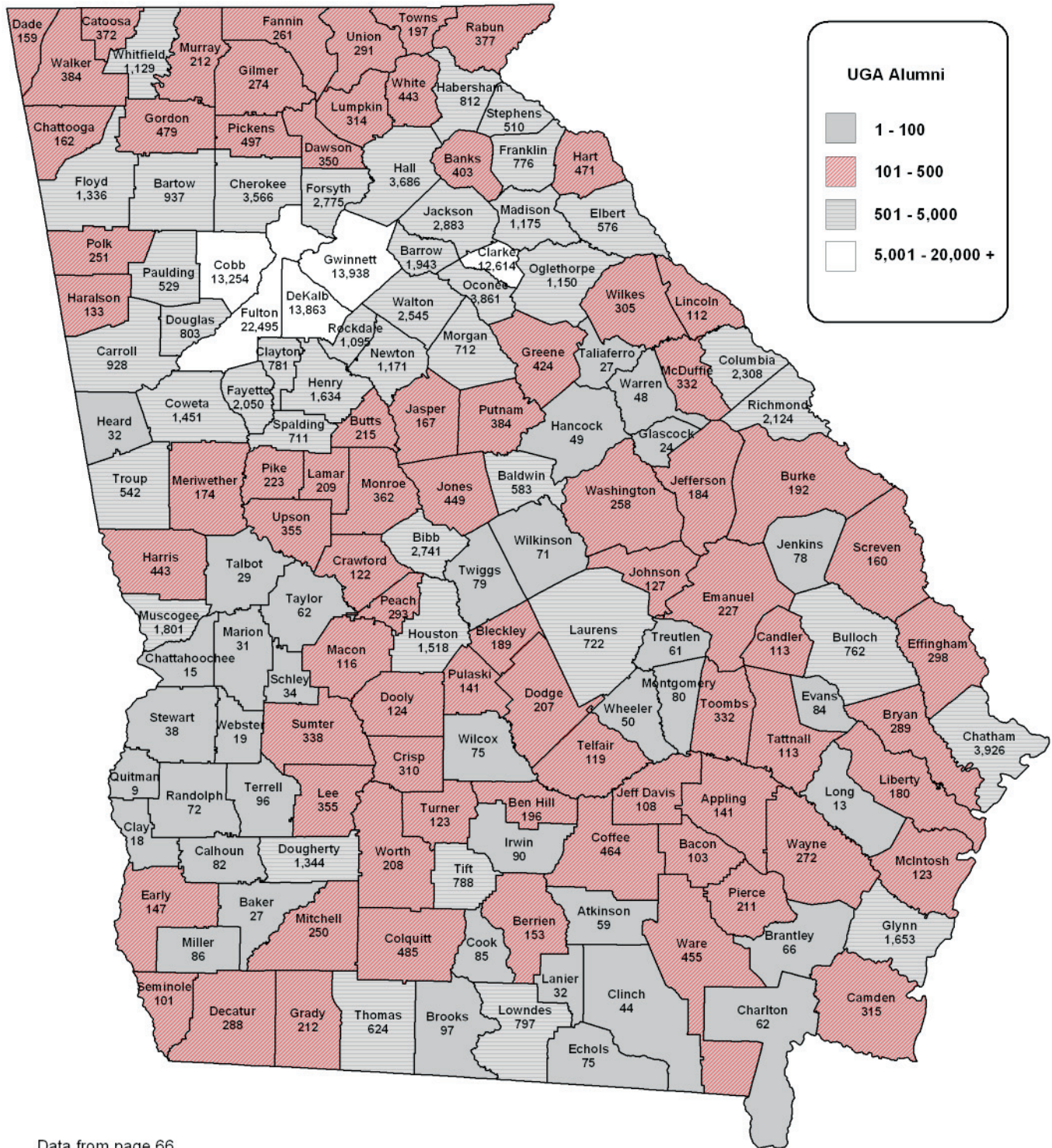

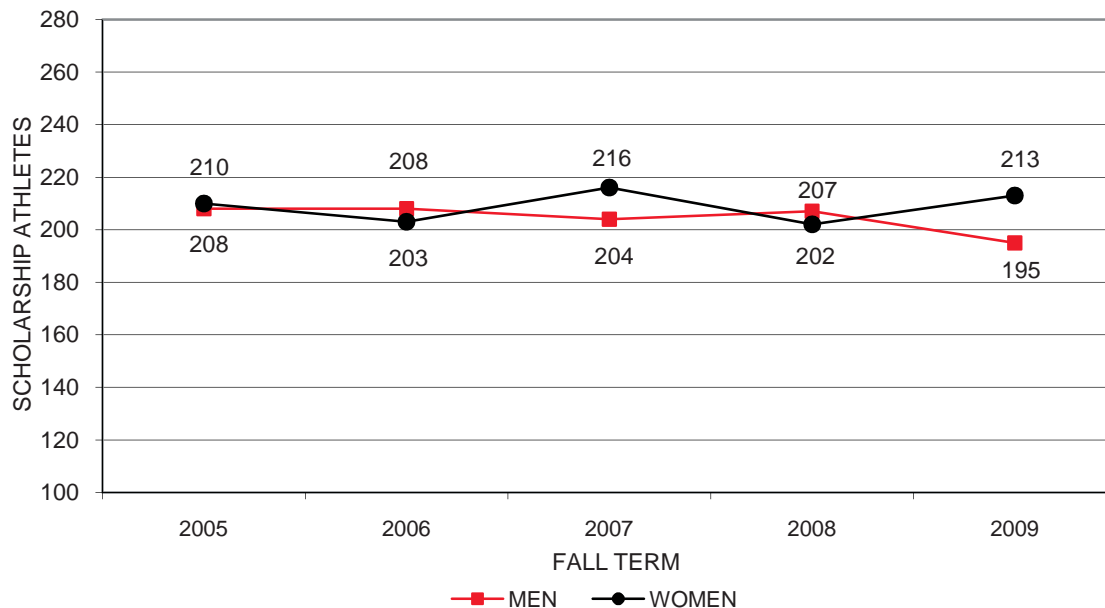

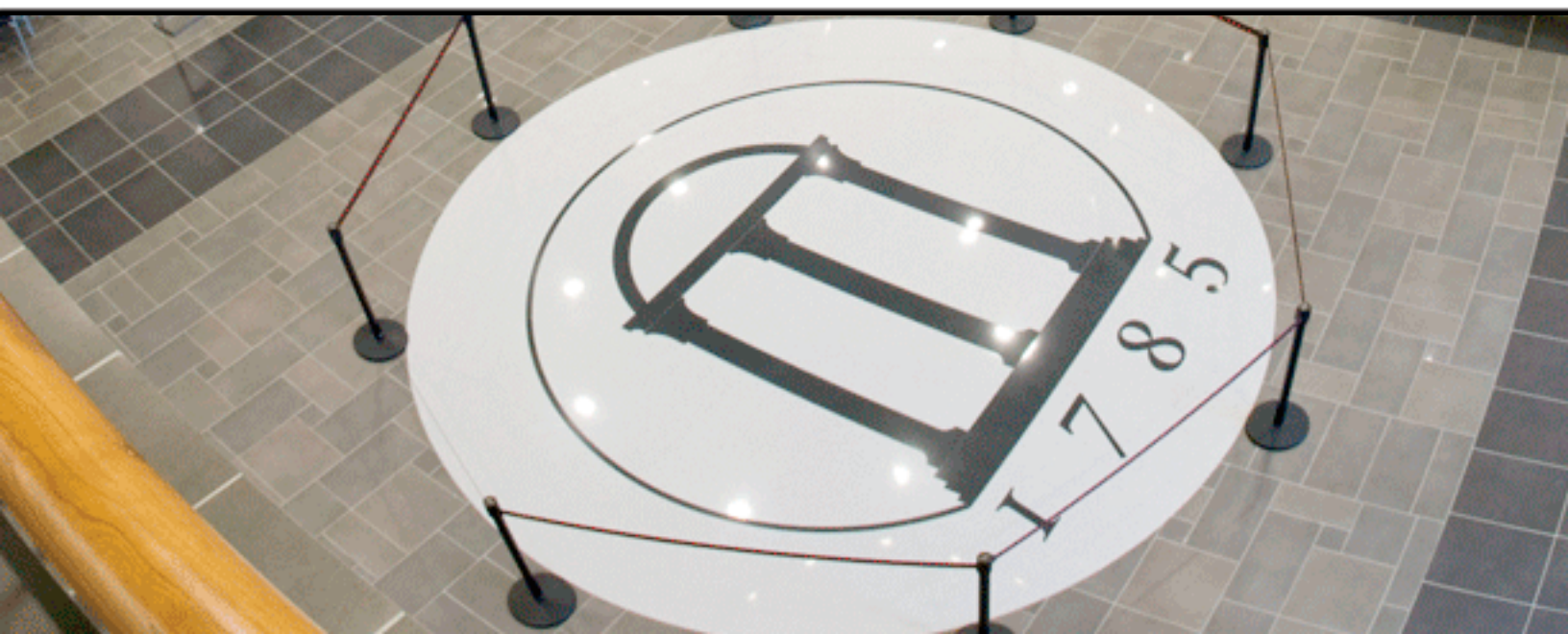

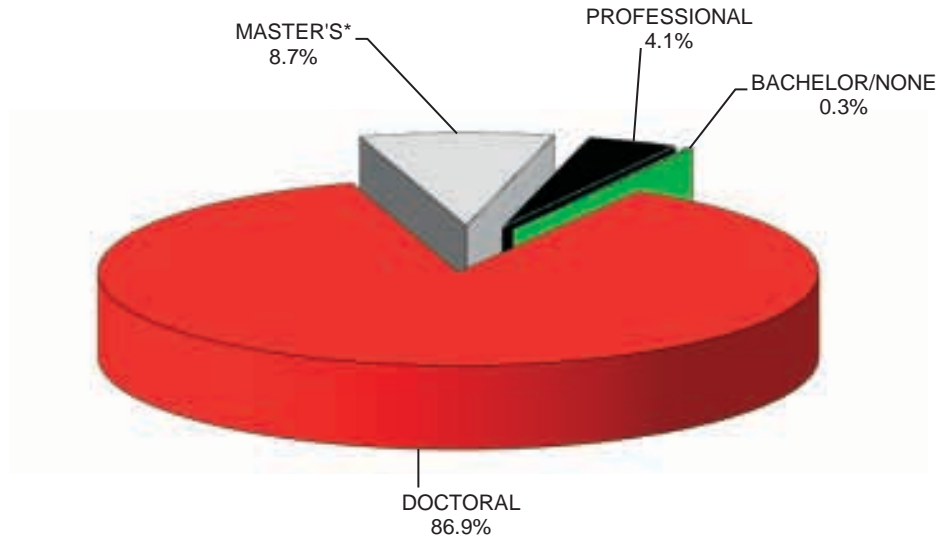

FALL TERMS 2004 - 2008**



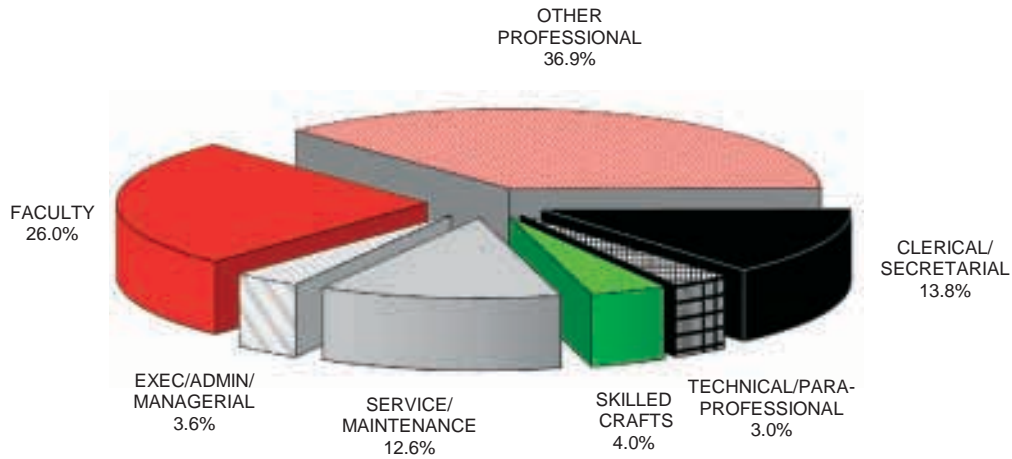

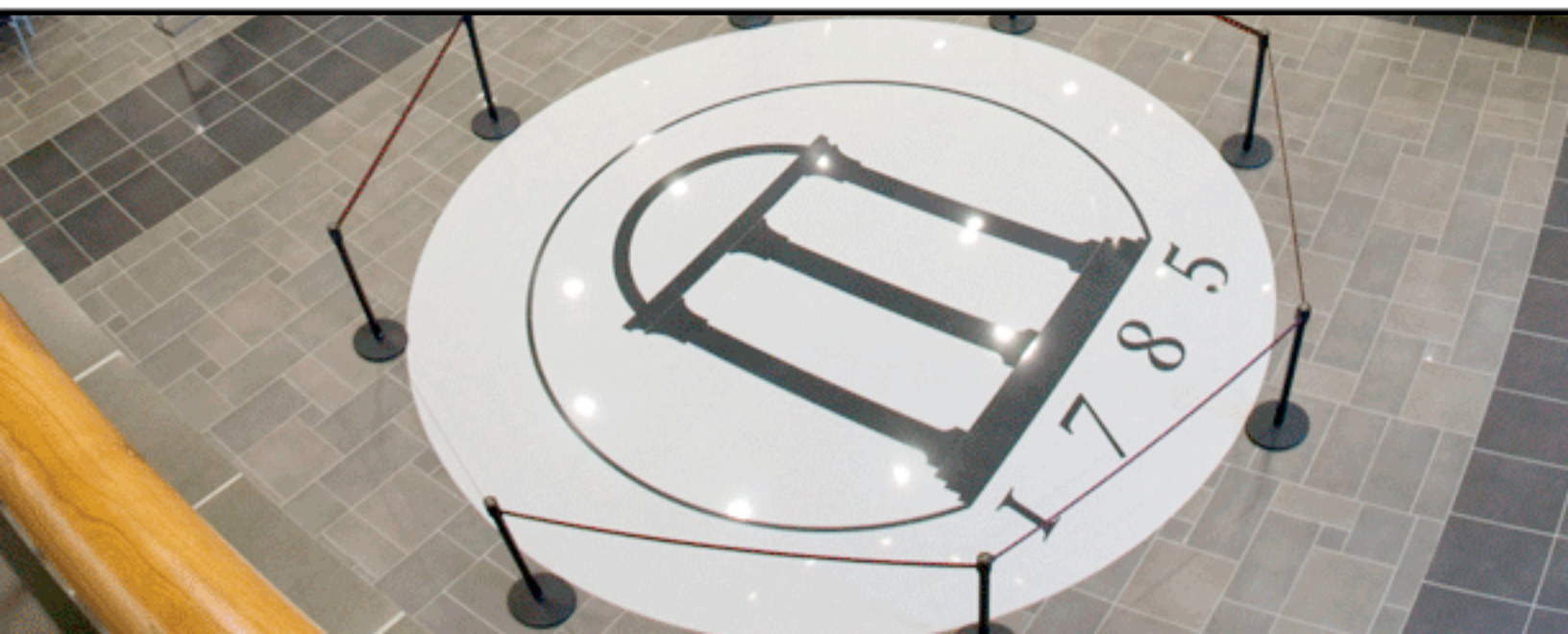

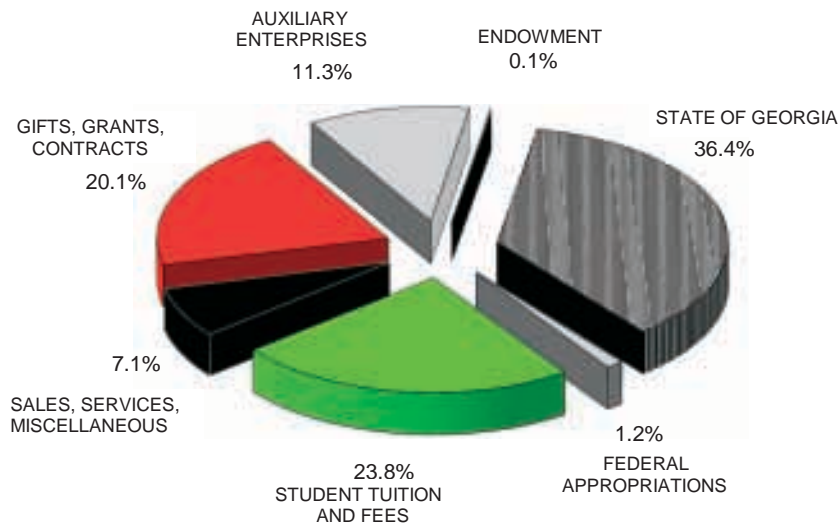

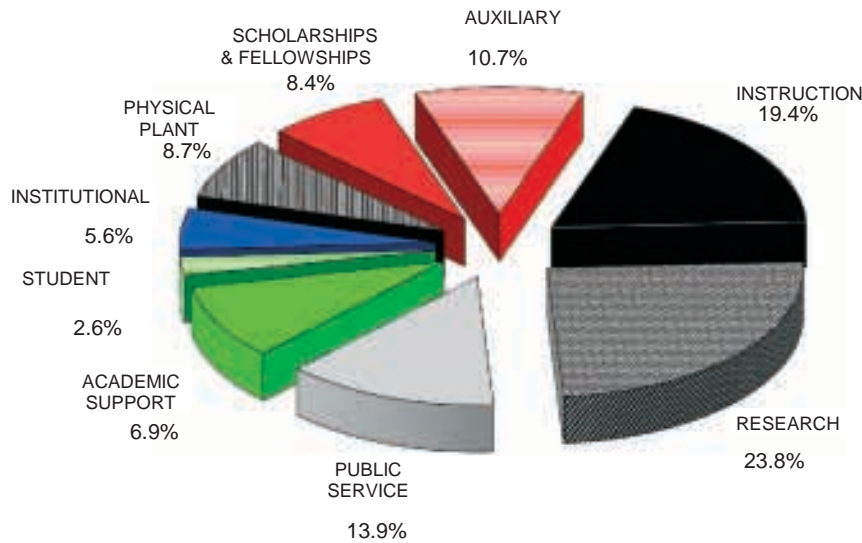

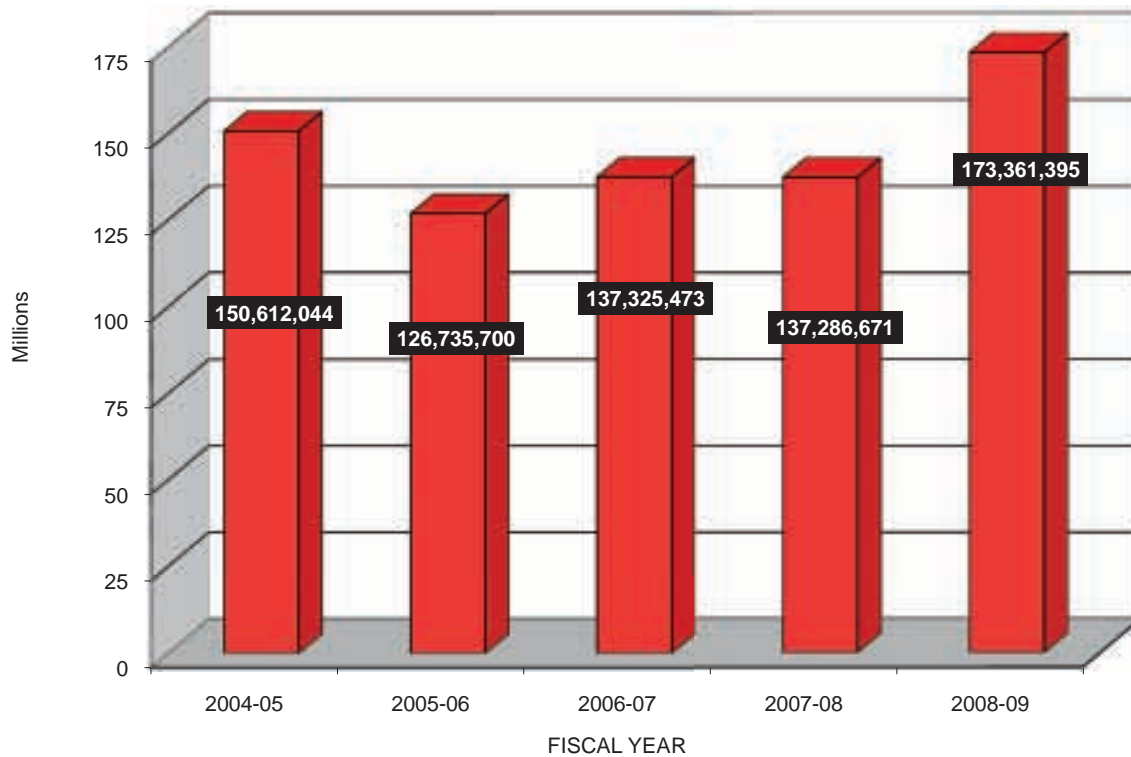

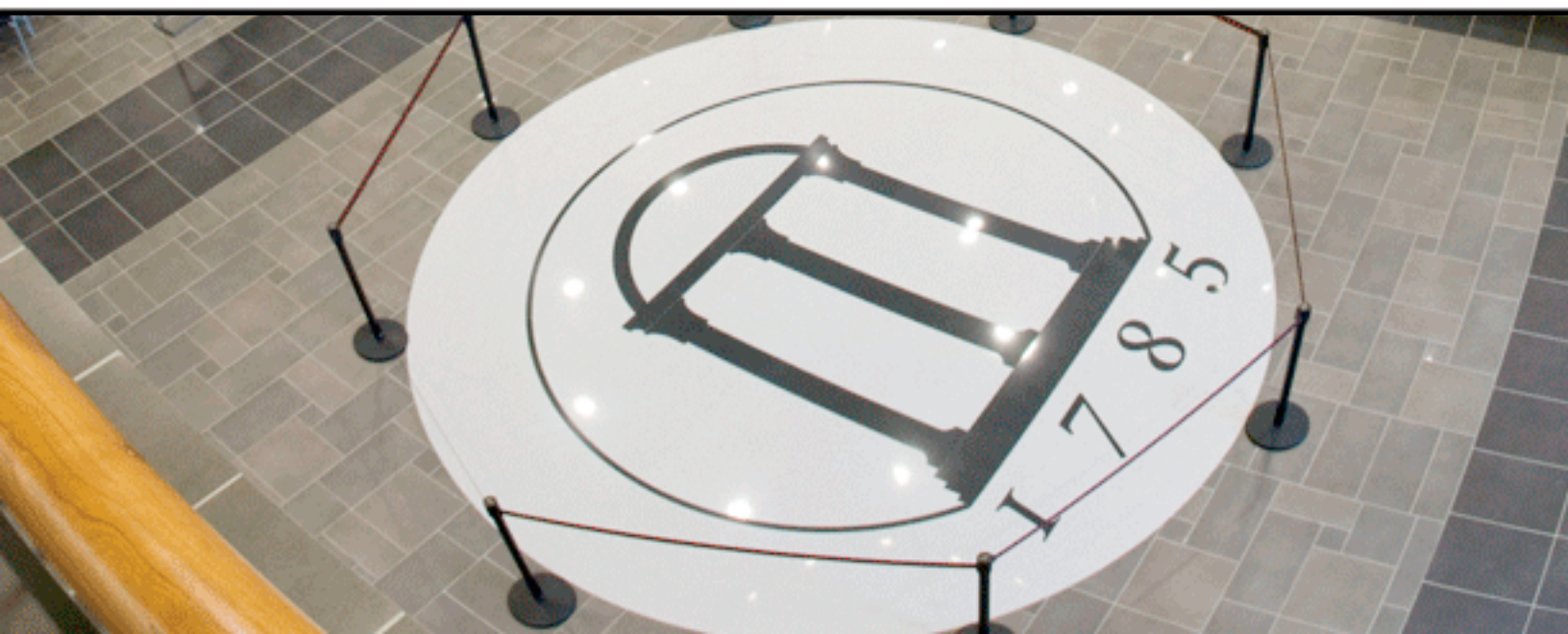

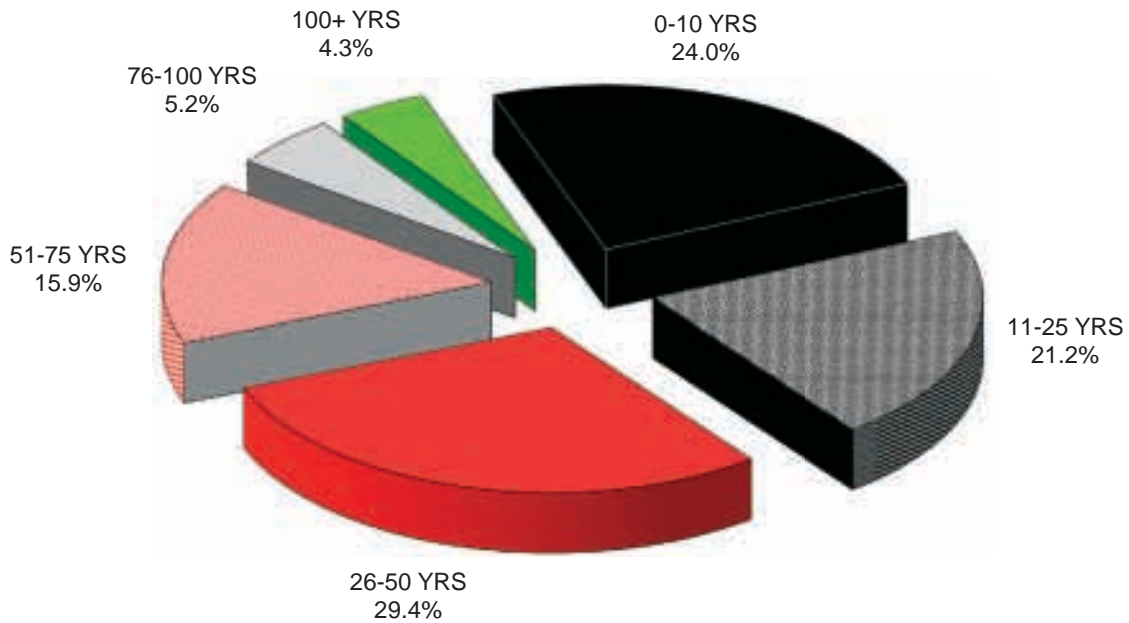

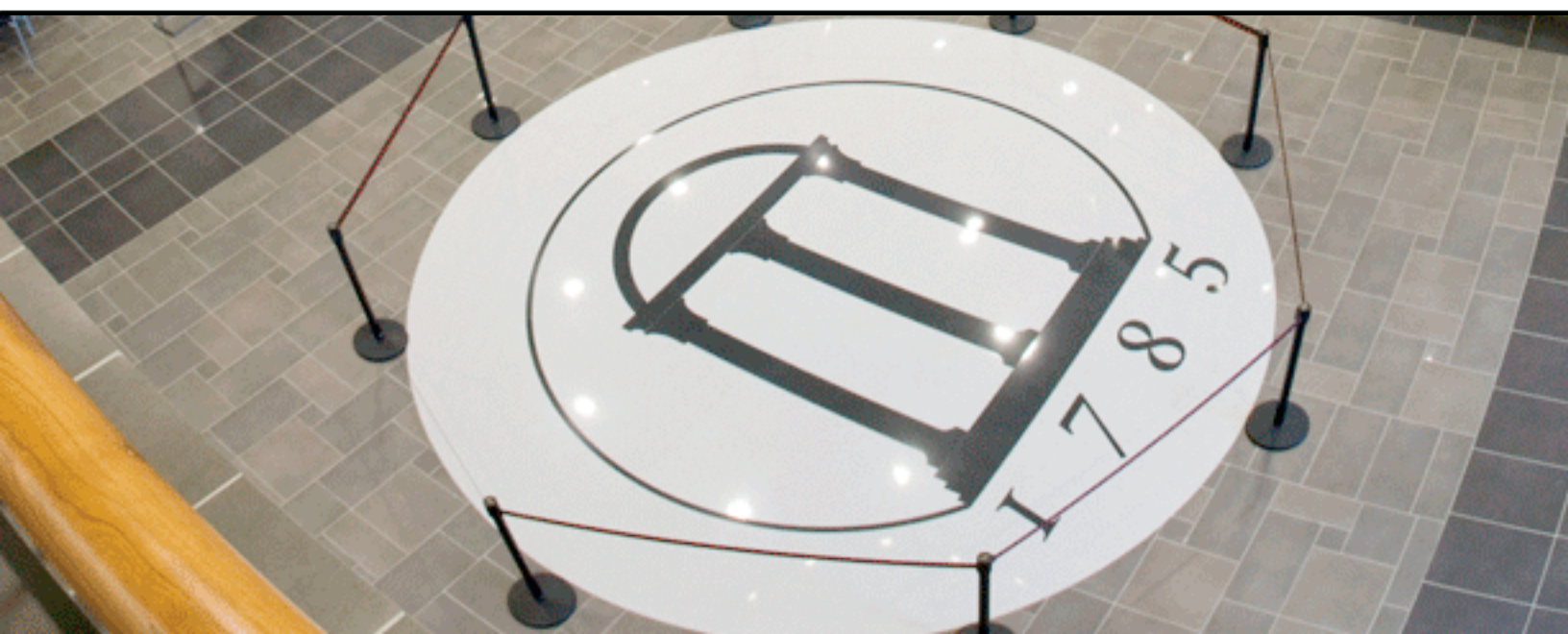
