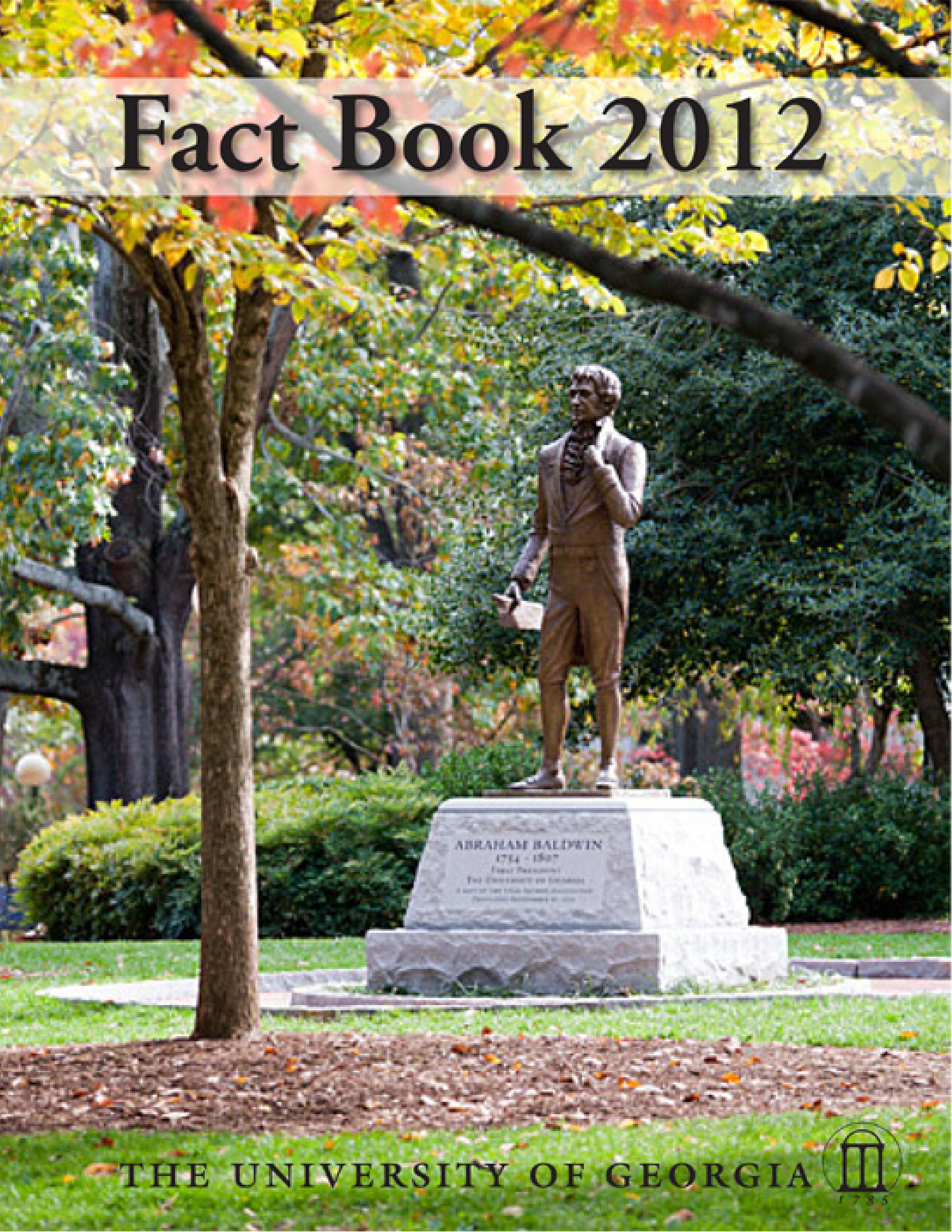

Abraham Baldwin, UGA's Founder and First President

Abraham Baldwin authored the University of Georgia Charter which when adopted by the Georgia General Assembly in 1785, made the University of Georgia America's first state chartered university and the birthplace of the American system of public higher education. A member of the Georgia State House, the Continental Congress and the U.S. Senate, Baldwin was a dedicated public servant and one of only two Georgia delegates to sign the U.S. Constitution in 1787. Baldwin's vision to make a quality post-secondary education affordable to the citizens of Georgia has impacted the growth and prosperity of the state in ways few could have imagined two centuries ago. The University of Georgia dedicated this statue of Abraham Baldwin in the fall of 2011. The statue is located on the university's North Campus in front of Old College.

General Information

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ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

History and Location: Chartered by the Georgia General Assembly on January 27, 1785, the University of Georgia is the nation's first state-chartered university. In 1872, the University of Georgia was designated the state's land-grant institution and in 1980 was accorded sea-grant college status. The University's main campus is located in Athens-Clarke County, Georgia, approximately 60 miles northeast of the state capital of Atlanta.

Academic Schools and Colleges: The University is comprised of seventeen schools and colleges: Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, Arts and Sciences, Business, Ecology, Education, Engineering, Environment and Design, Family and Consumer Sciences, Forestry and Natural Resources, Graduate School, Journalism and Mass Communication, Law, Pharmacy, Public Health, Public and International Affairs, Social Work, and Veterinary Medicine.

Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred: The University of Georgia is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges as well as a variety of discipline-specific accrediting agencies. Academic offerings include 23 bachelor's degrees in 139 major fields; 33 master's degrees in 135 major fields; the specialist in education degree in 18 major fields; 4 doctoral degrees in 94 major fields; and professional degrees in Law, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine. During the 2011-12 fiscal year, the University awarded 6,861 bachelor's degrees, 1,778 master's and specialist degrees, 453 doctoral degrees, and 450 professional degrees.

Faculty: Full-time professorial faculty for the fall 2012 totaled 1,735. 96% of the full-time faculty were tenured or tenure-track, and 97% hold the doctorate or other terminal degree. Average salaries for the fiscal year 2012 were \$107,800 for professors; \$79,200 for associate professors; and \$75,300 for assistant professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2012 enrollment totaled 34,519, which included 26,259 undergraduates, 6,606 graduate students, and 1,654 first professional students. 93% of undergraduates and 80% of graduate and professional students were enrolled on a full-time basis. The undergraduate student body was 43% male and 24% minority. 1,078 undergraduate and 1,355 graduate and professional students were from 121 foreign countries.

Admissions/Retention: 4,967 first-time freshmen enrolled for fall 2012. 48% of all admitted freshmen enrolled, and 27% of all freshman applicants enrolled. The average total SAT score for entering freshmen was 1244. 4,392 or 88% of new freshmen attended 457 Georgia high schools. On average, 93.9% of first-time full-time freshmen return for their sophomore year. 63% of all undergraduate transfer applicants were accepted, and 1,148 enrolled for fall 2012. 51% of accepted new graduate students enrolled in fall 2012.

Costs: Academic year 2012-13 tuition and fees totaled \$9,842 for new resident undergraduates and \$28,052 for new nonresident undergraduates. Academic year 2012-13 estimated cost of attendance for resident undergraduates totaled \$21,250. This amount included tuition and mandatory fees, books and supplies, room and board, and other expenses.

Finance: For fiscal year 2012, total revenues exceeded \$1.33 billion and included \$363 million from state appropriations. 19% of total operating expenditures were designated for instruction and 24% for research. Sponsored awards for fiscal year 2012 totaled \$234,883,526.

Physical Facilities: The University occupies and maintains over 20 million square feet of space. The main campus includes 458 buildings for a total of 15,967,395 square feet. Six major building projects were completed during 2012 for a total cost of over \$73 million. The University's fall 2012 land holdings totaled 40,109 acres in 30 Georgia counties.



THE MISSION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

The University of Georgia, a land-grant and sea-grant university with statewide commitments and responsibilities, is the state's oldest, most comprehensive and most diversified institution of higher education. Its motto, "to teach, to serve, and to inquire into the nature of things," reflects the University's integral and unique role in the conservation and enhancement of the state's and nation's intellectual, cultural, and environmental heritage.

The University of Georgia shares with the other research universities of the University System of Georgia the following core characteristics:

- a statewide responsibility and commitment to excellence and academic achievements having national and international recognition;
- a commitment to excellence in a teaching/learning environment dedicated to serve a diverse and well-prepared student body, to promote high levels of student achievement, and to provide appropriate academic support services;
- a commitment to excellence in research, scholarship, and creative endeavors that are focused on organized programs to create, maintain, and apply new knowledge and theories; that promote instructional quality and effectiveness; and that enhance institutionally relevant faculty qualifications;
- a commitment to excellence in public service, economic development, and technical assistance activities designed to address the strategic needs of the State of Georgia along with a comprehensive offering of continuing education designed to meet the needs of Georgia's citizens in life-long learning and professional education;
- a wide range of academic and professional programming at the baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral levels.

With its statewide mission and core characteristics, the University of Georgia endeavors to prepare the University community and the State for full participation in the global society of the twenty-first century. Through its programs and practices, it seeks to foster the understanding of and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened and educated citizenry. It further provides for cultural, ethnic, gender, and racial diversity in the faculty, staff, and student body. The University is committed to preparing the University community to appreciate the critical importance of a quality environment to an interdependent global society.

As a comprehensive land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Georgia offers baccalaureate, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees in the arts, humanities, social sciences, biological sciences, physical sciences, agricultural and environmental sciences, business, ecology, environmental design, family and consumer sciences, forest resources, journalism and mass communication, education, law, pharmacy, public health, social work, and veterinary medicine.

The University attracts students nationally and internationally as well as from within Georgia. It offers the state's broadest array of possibilities in graduate and professional education, and thus a large minority of the student body is post-baccalaureate. The predominantly Georgian undergraduate student body is a mix of highly qualified students originally admitted as freshmen and selected transfer students principally from other University System institutions.

With original scholarship, basic and applied research, and creative activities constituting an essential core from which to draw, the impact of the land-grant and sea-grant mission is reflected throughout the state. Cooperative extension, continuing education, public service, experiment stations, and technology transfer are all designed to enhance the well-being of the citizens of Georgia through their roles in economic, social, and community development.

As it has been historically, the University of Georgia is responsive to the evolution of the state's educational, social, and economic needs. It aspires through its strategic planning to even closer contact and interaction with public and private institutions throughout the state as well as with the citizens it serves.

THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA STRATEGIC PLAN

The University of Georgia's *Strategic Plan for the First Decade of the Twenty-First Century* was adopted in late 2000. Each of the major planning units, including all of the University's colleges and schools and major administrative units, adopted a strategic plan as part of that same process. Each plan guided the planning unit toward achievement of three overarching institutional goals for 2000-2010:

- Building the new learning environment
- Research investment
- Competing in a global economy

In 2004, as part of an effort to build on those unit-level strategic plans and fully operationalize the institutional strategic plan, a two-phased "Five-Year Program Planning" process was implemented. The overall goal of that process was to further improve integration of the unit plans with the University budget development and resource allocation process in a manner even more directly linked to institutional priorities. Each of the University's colleges and schools and major administrative units adopted five-year plans for the second half of the decade as part of that process.

As the period covered by the 2000-2010 Strategic Plan drew to a close, a committee was appointed to examine the strategic framework for the University's next decade and propose a new strategic plan, including measurable benchmarks for progress for each priority area. The new plan was submitted to the University Council in spring 2010 and approved. In 2012, a Strategic Plan "Champions" Committee reviewed the 2020 plan and aligned strategic priorities and their benchmarks more closely and developed goals more precisely. The 2020 Strategic Plan assures that the University's well-established system of planning, evaluation, and continuous improvement will continue to guide the current decade at the University.

Seven strategic directions are outlined in the *2020 University of Georgia Strategic Plan, Building on Excellence*.

- Building on Excellence in Undergraduate Education
- Enhancing Graduate and Professional Programs
- Investing in Proven and Emerging Areas of Research Excellence at UGA
- Serving the Citizens of the State of Georgia and Beyond
- Improving Faculty Recruitment, Retention and Development
- Improving and Maintaining Facilities and Infrastructure to Provide Excellence in Instruction, Research and Service
- Improving Stewardship of Natural Resources and Advancing Campus Sustainability.

The University of Georgia is now in the process of implementing this 2020 plan. This will include processes to regularly evaluate progress towards the plan's benchmarks, identify specific projects and initiatives designed to promote attainment of the new strategic directions, assure that strategic plans of all university units continue to drive the university towards its new strategic directions, and assure that the plan provides a sound basis for a capital campaign.

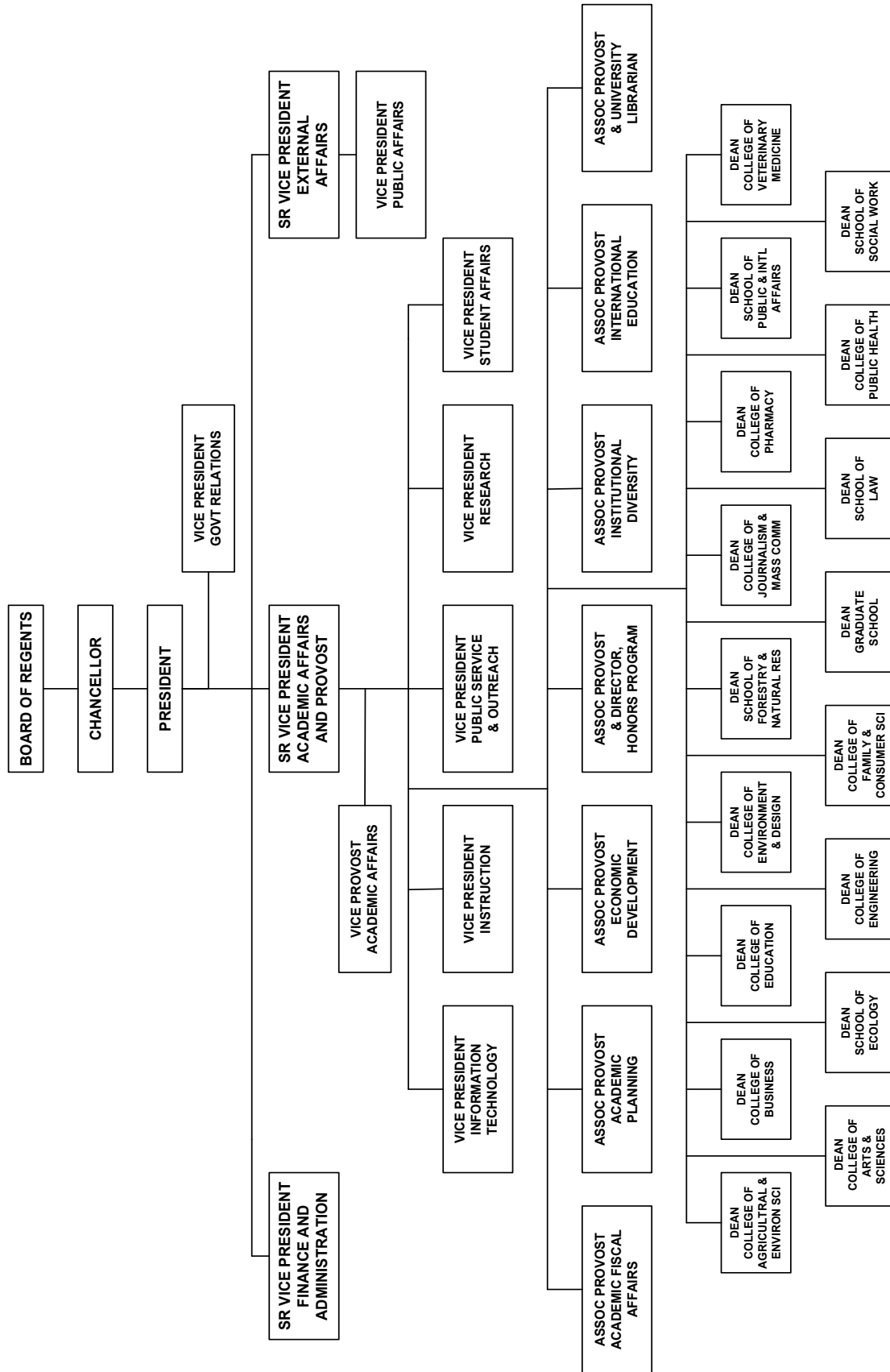

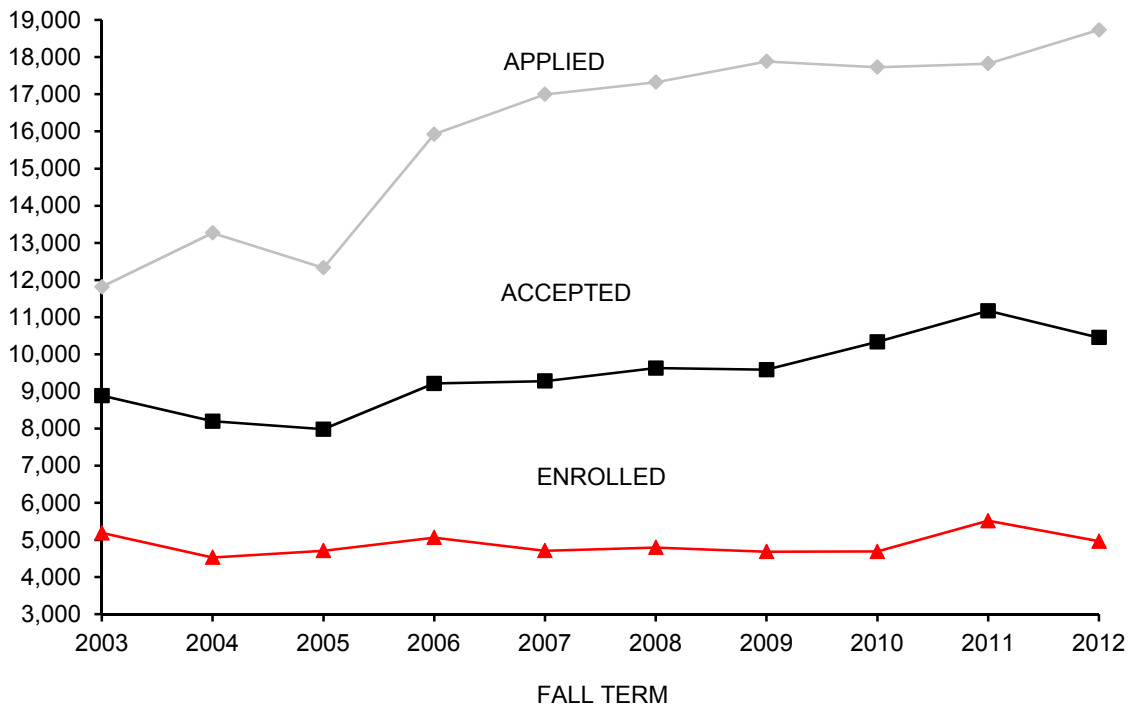

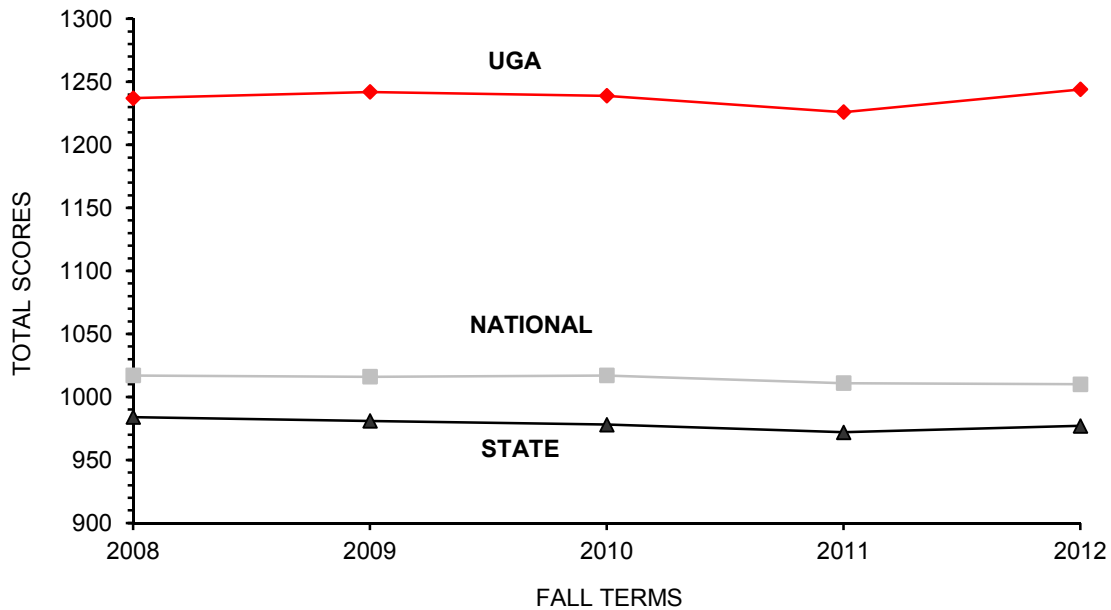

PREAMBLE OF THE CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

As it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly, a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild, uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the ignorance or inferiority of our own, and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attacks that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of the wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education, divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three, and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment.

THEREFORE the Representatives of the Freeman of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact, ordain & declare, and by these presents it is ENACTED, ORDAINED and DECLARED

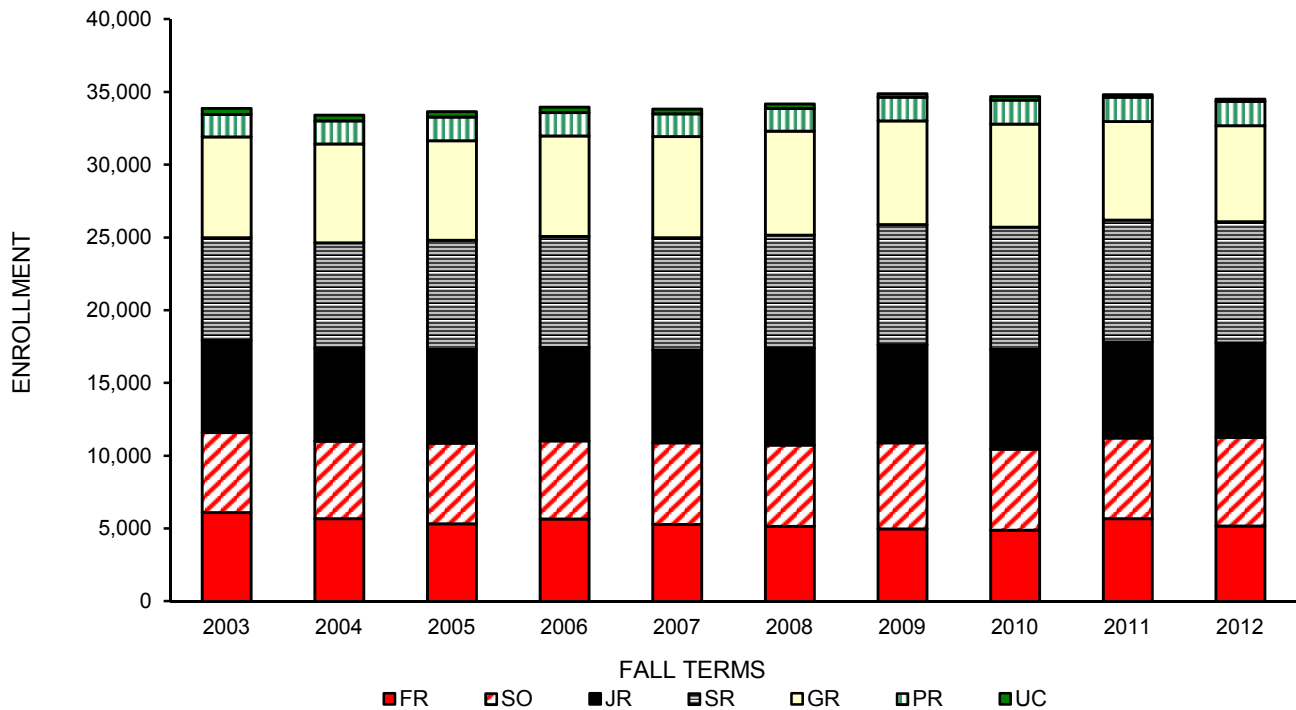

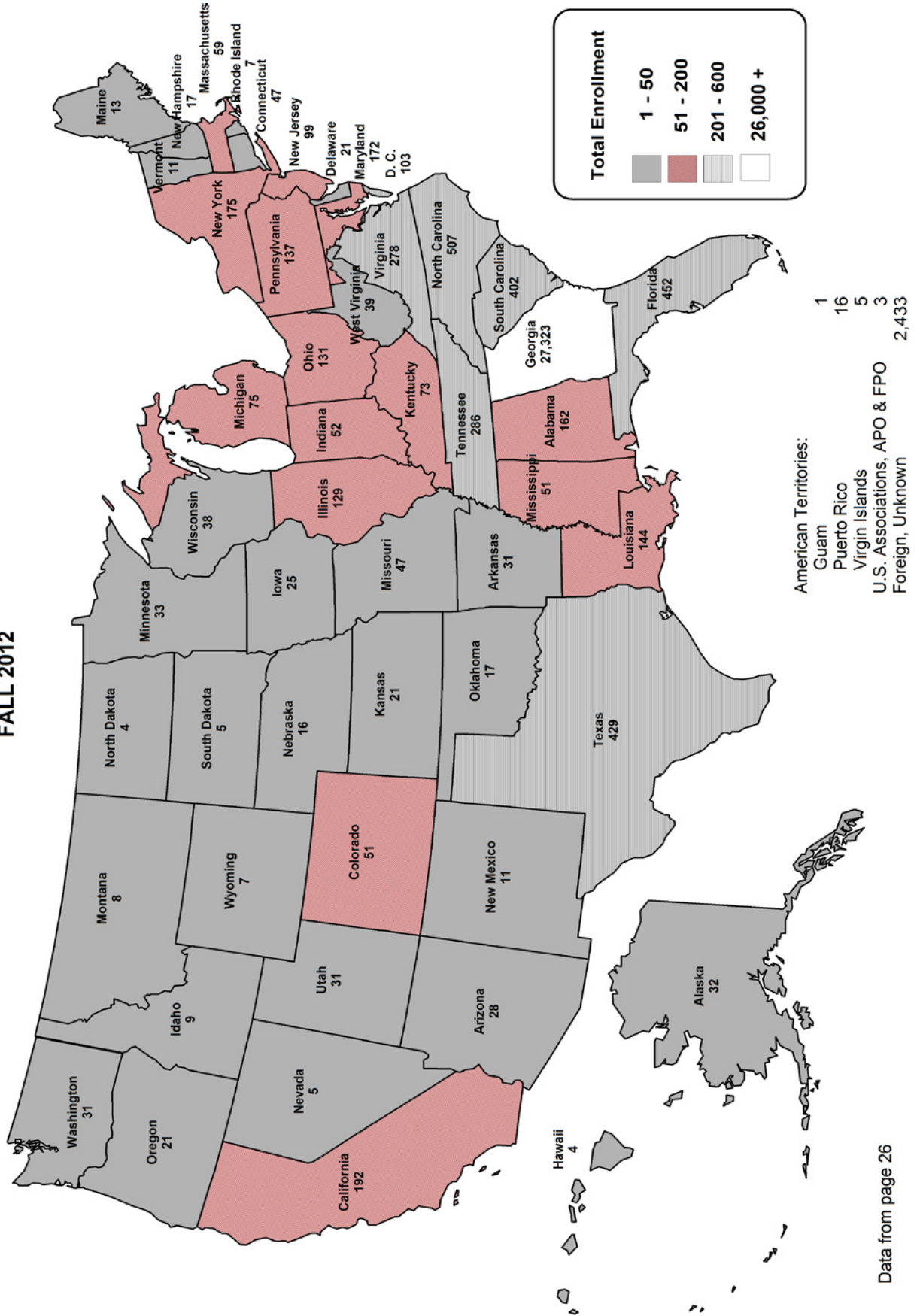

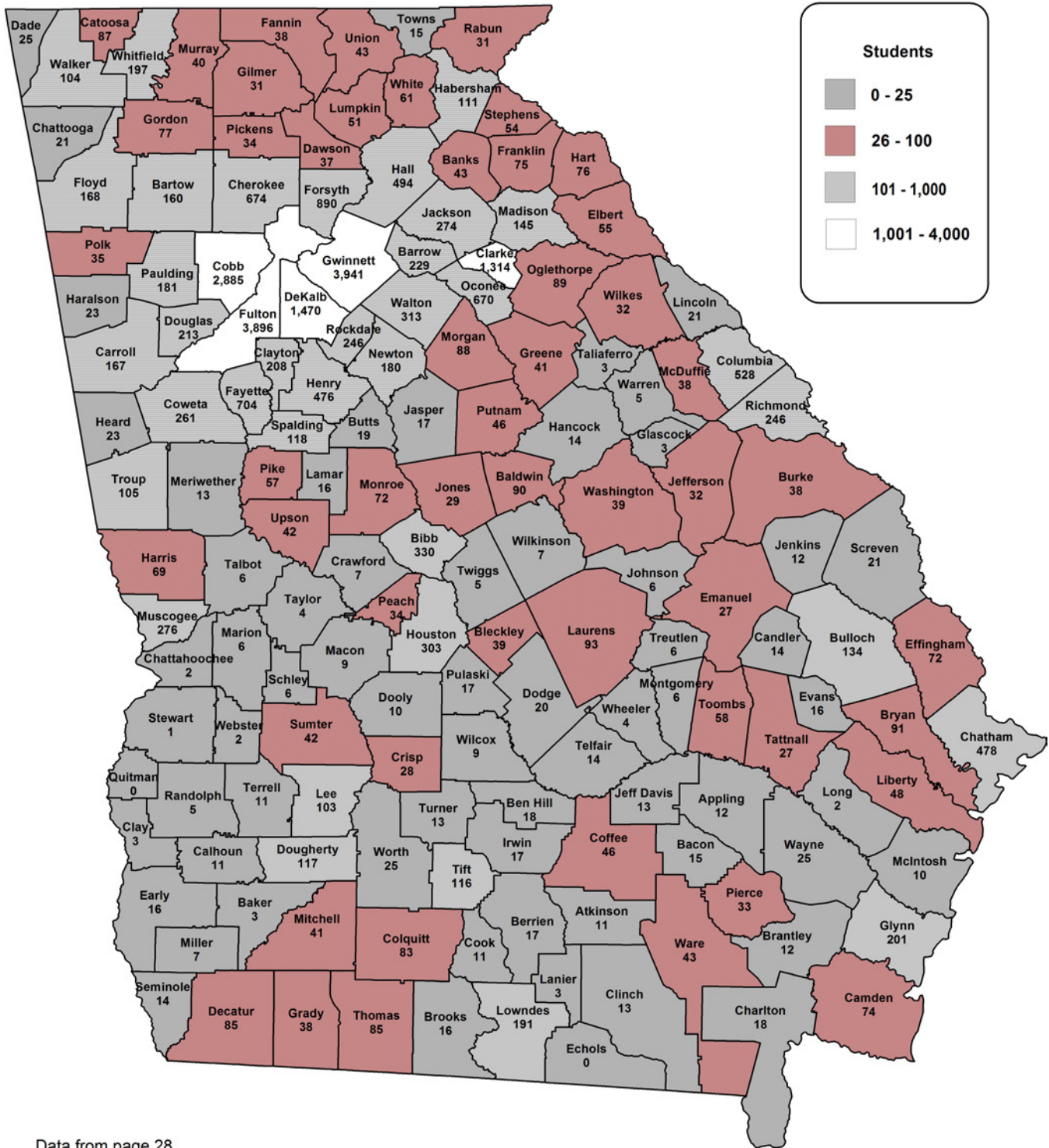

As it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly, a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild, uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the Ignorance or Inferiority of our own, and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attacks that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities which wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education, divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three, and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general, and complete establishment

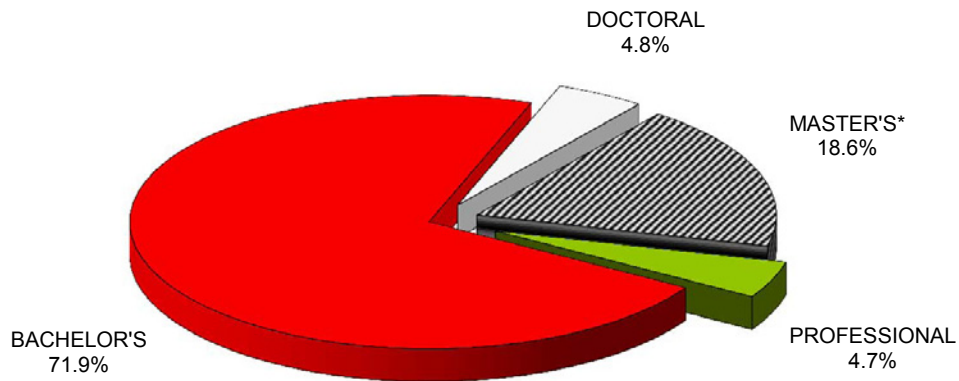

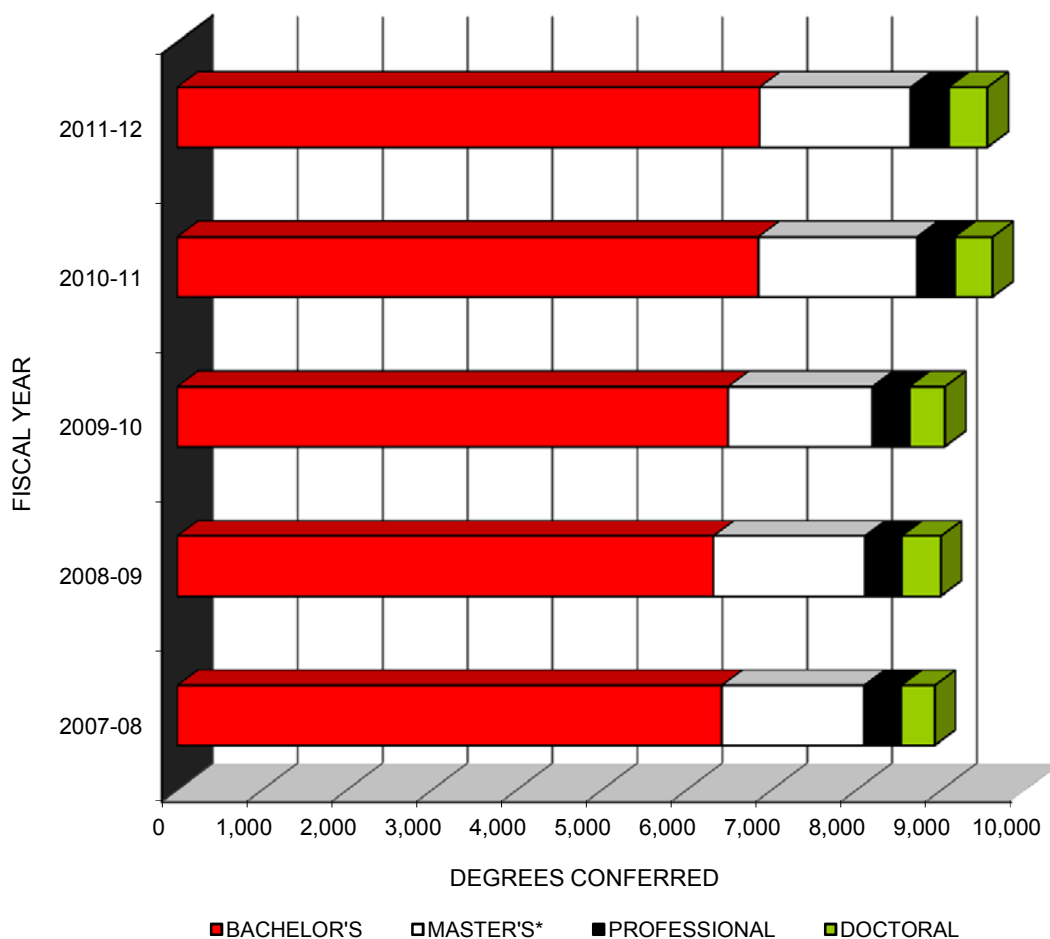

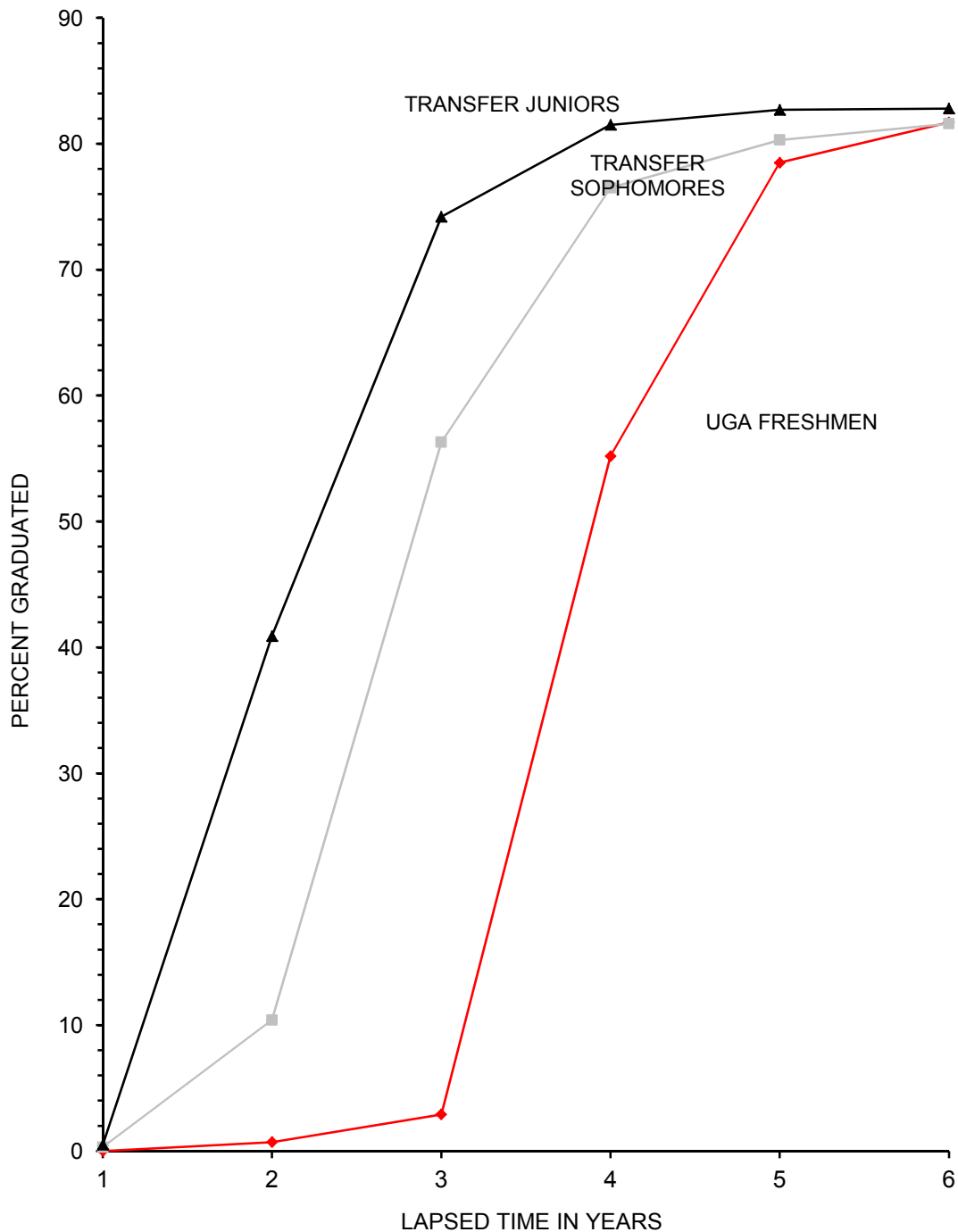

*A*s it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the Ignorance or Inferiority of our own and will always be the Cause of so great foreign affrontments that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of such wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment

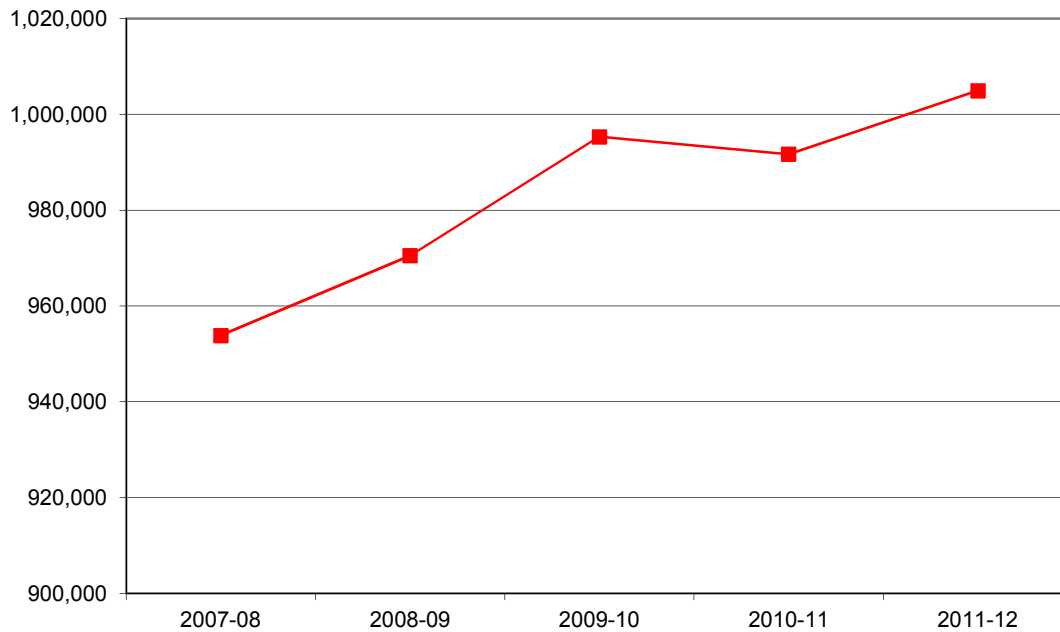

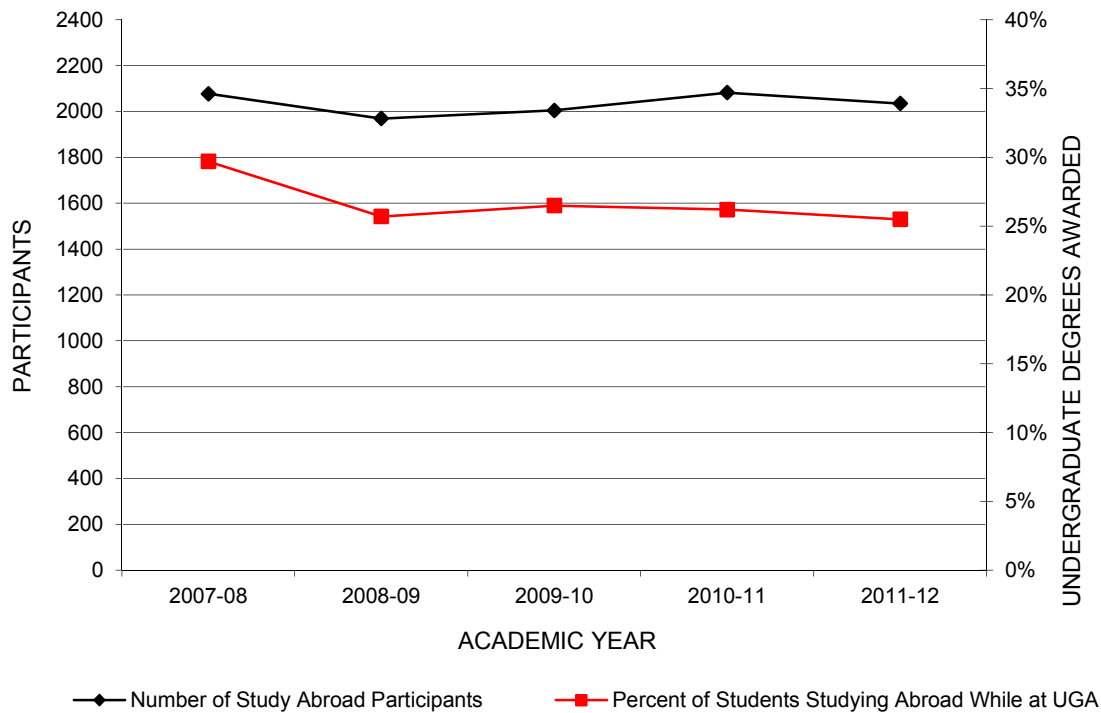

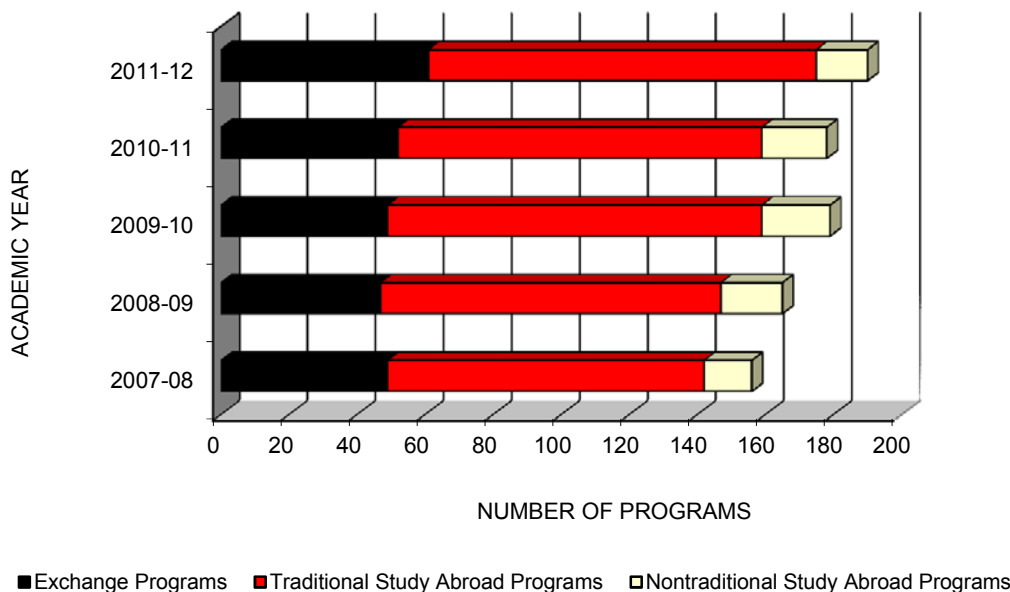

A S it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly, a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the ignorance or inferiority of our own, and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attachments that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities in such wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education, divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment

THEREFORE the Representatives of the Freemen of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact & declare and by these presents it is ENACTED ORDAINED and DECLARED

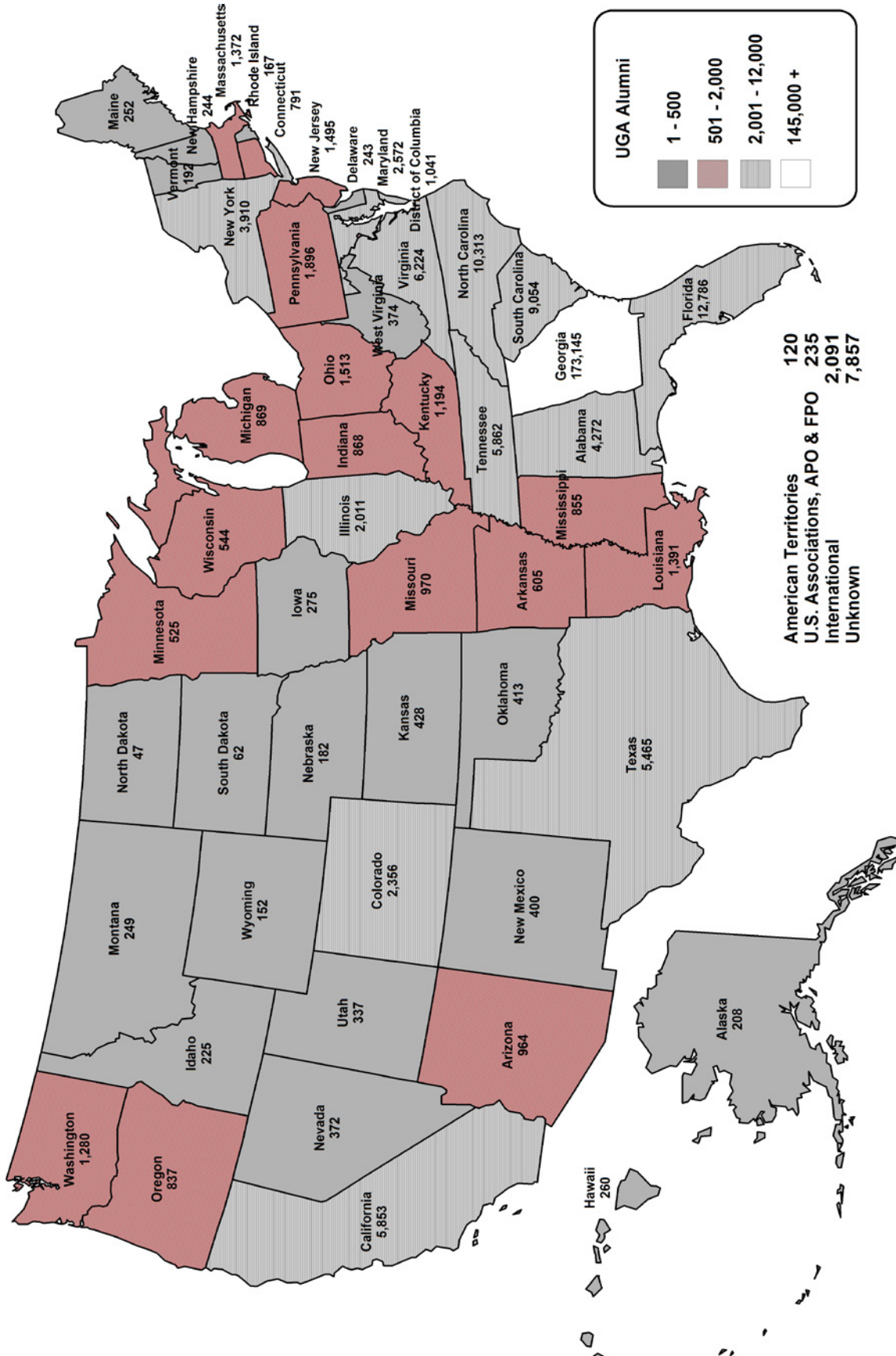

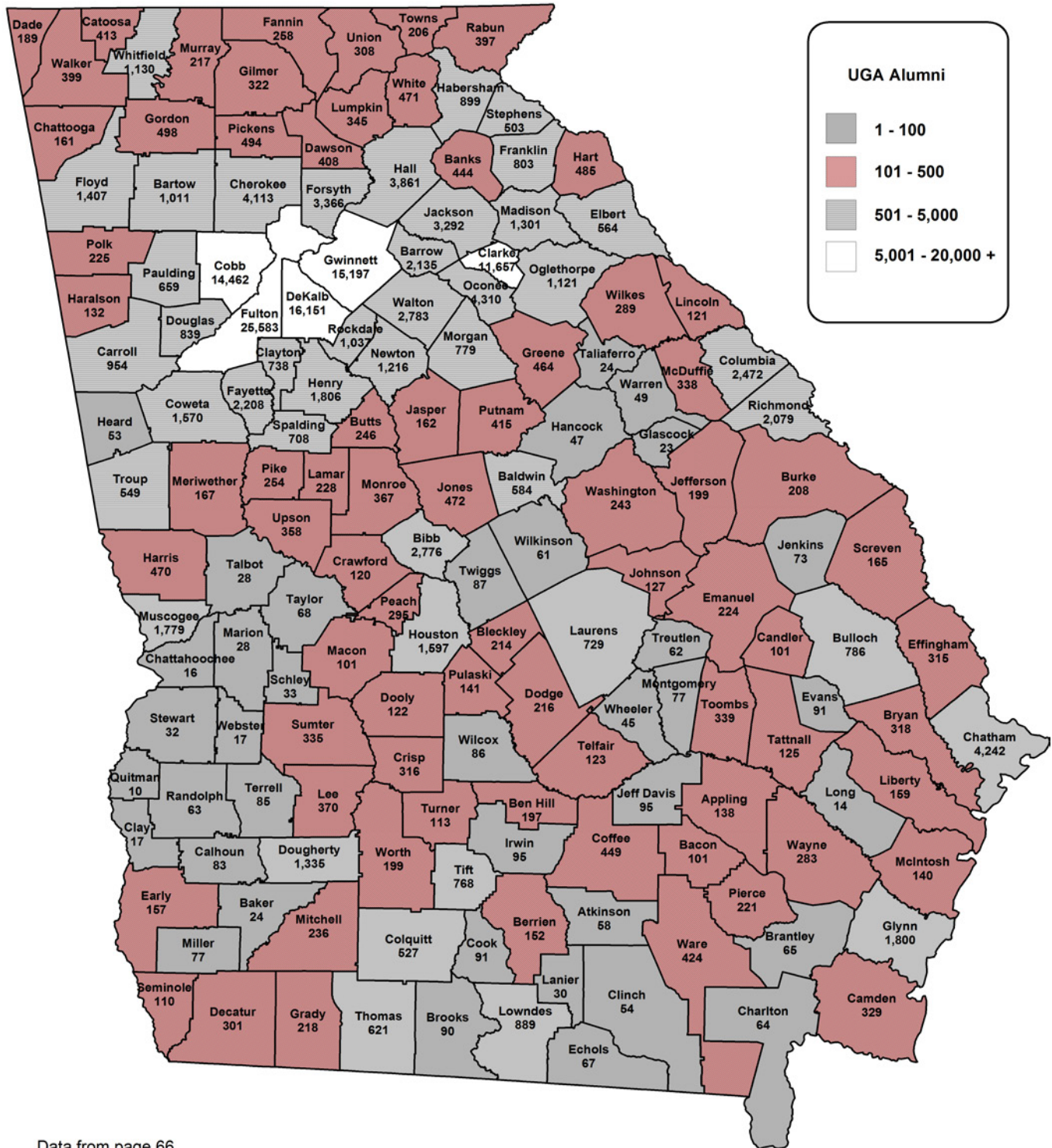

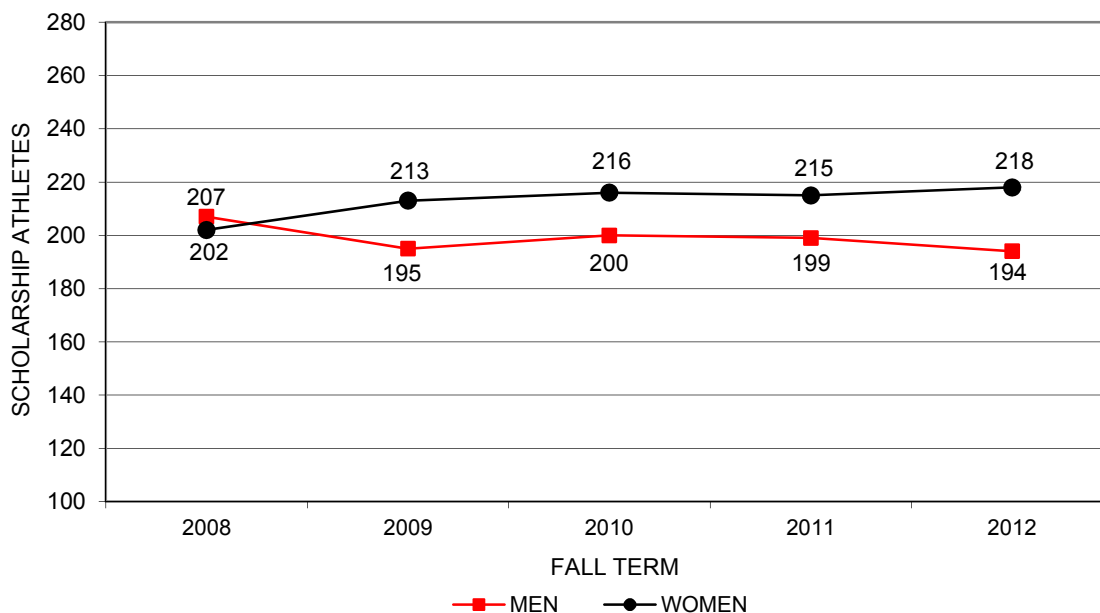

PREAMBLE OF THE CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

*A*s it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the Ignorance or Inferiority of our own and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attachments that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of such wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment

THEREFORE the Representatives of the Freemen of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact & declare and by these presents it is ENACTED ORDAINED and DECLARED

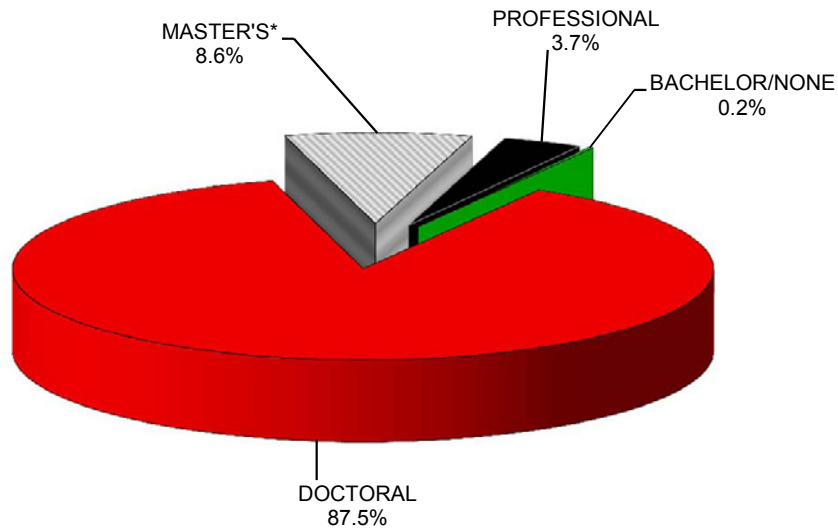

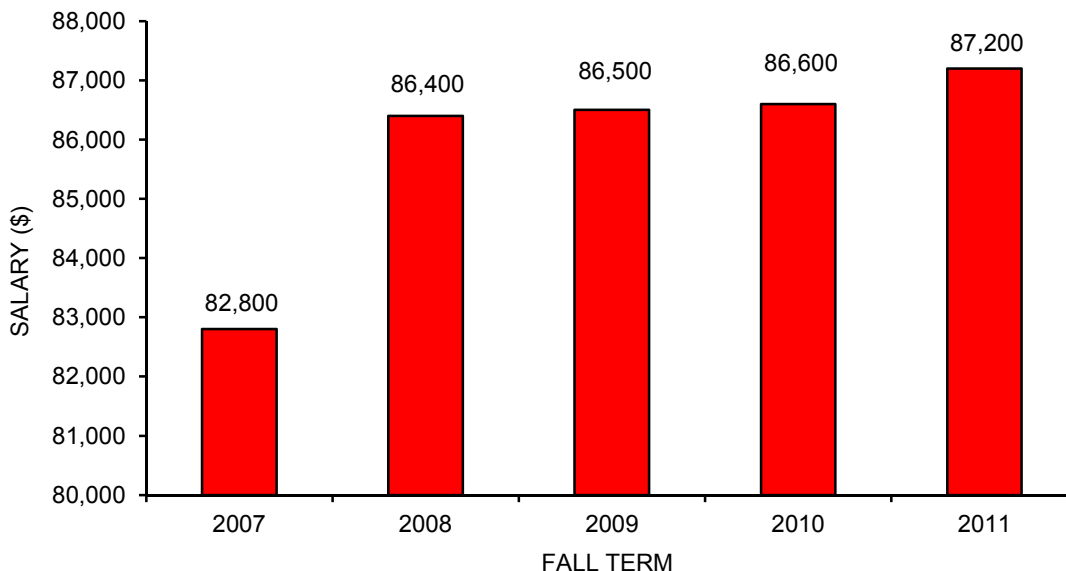

FALL TERMS 2007 - 2011**

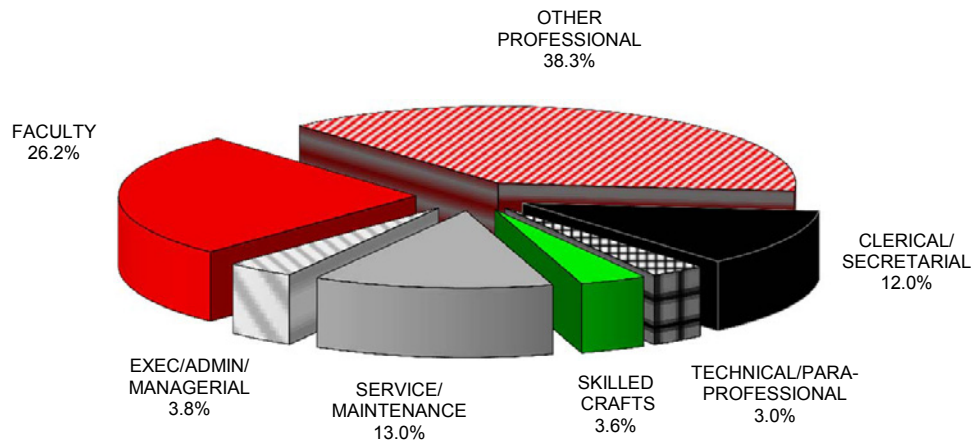

PREAMBLE OF THE CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

*A*s it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the Ignorance or Inferiority of our own and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attachments that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of such wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment

THEREFORE the Representatives of the Freemen of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact & declare and by these presents it is ENACTED ORDAINED and DECLARED

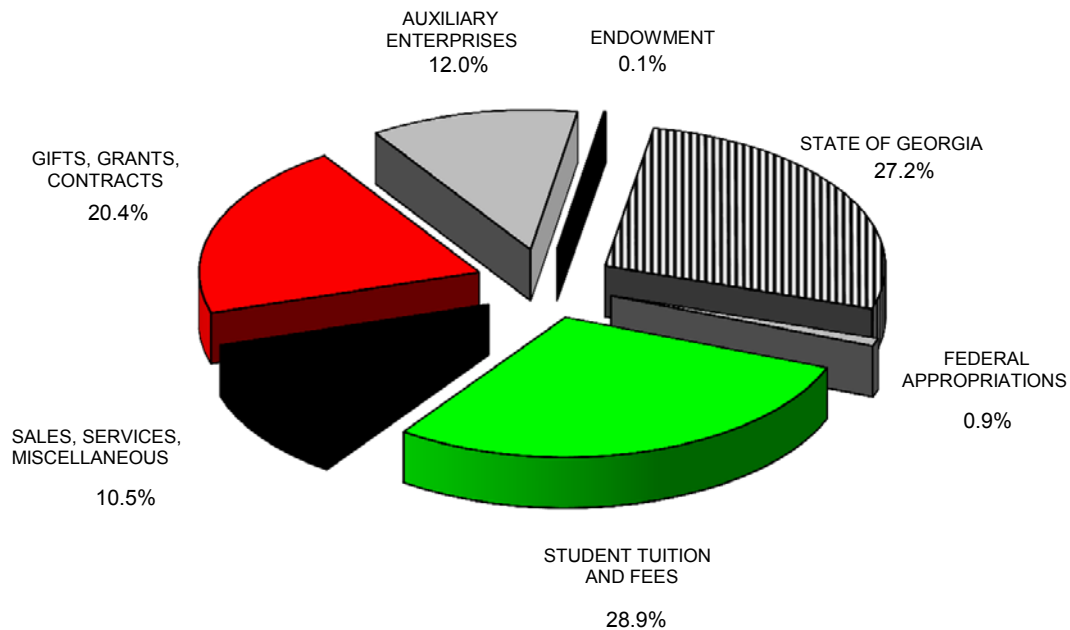

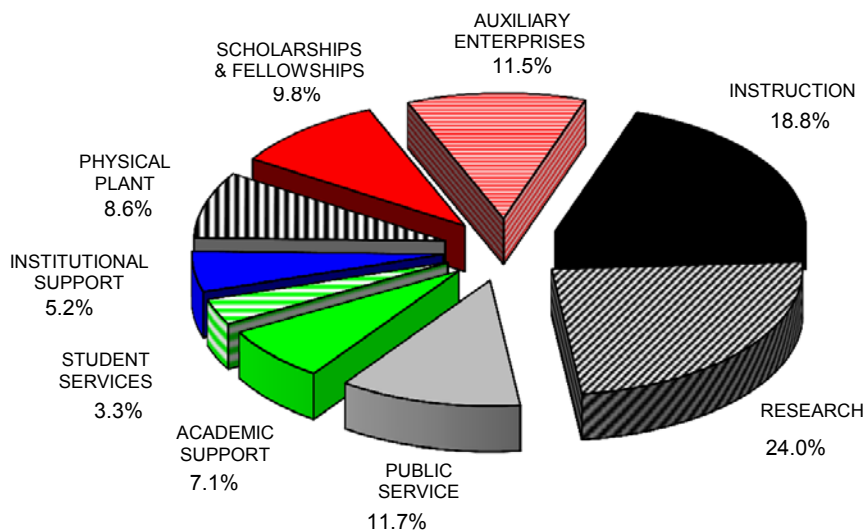

FISCAL YEAR 2011-12**

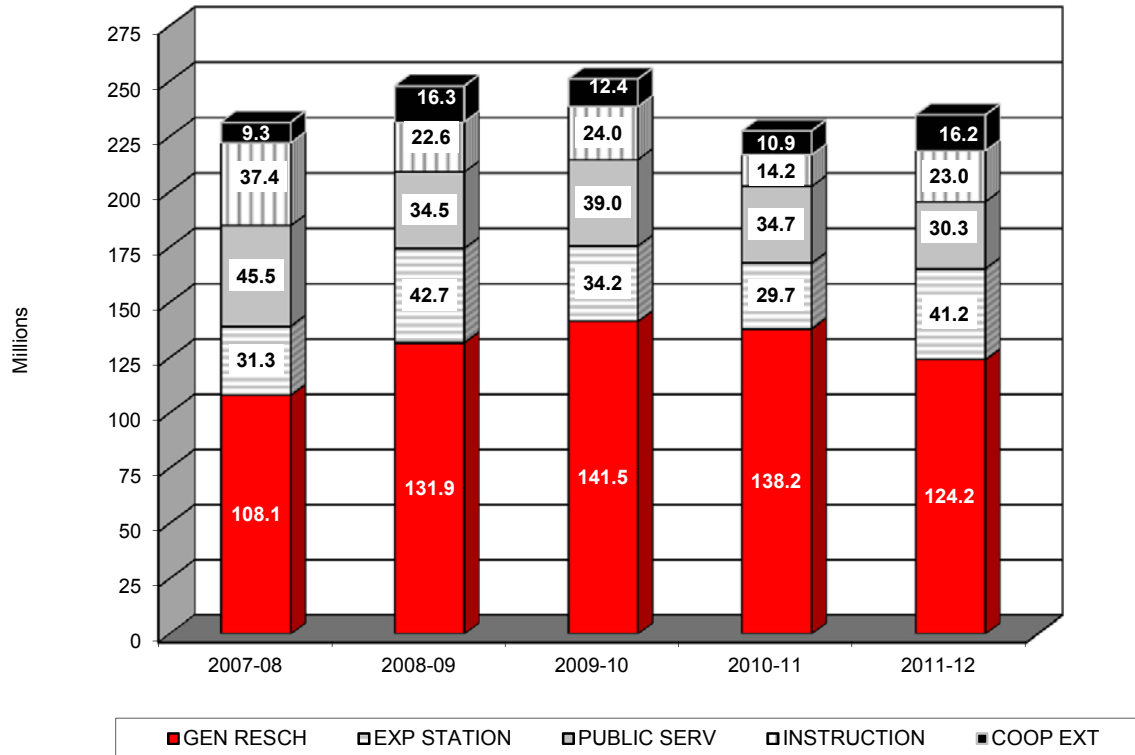

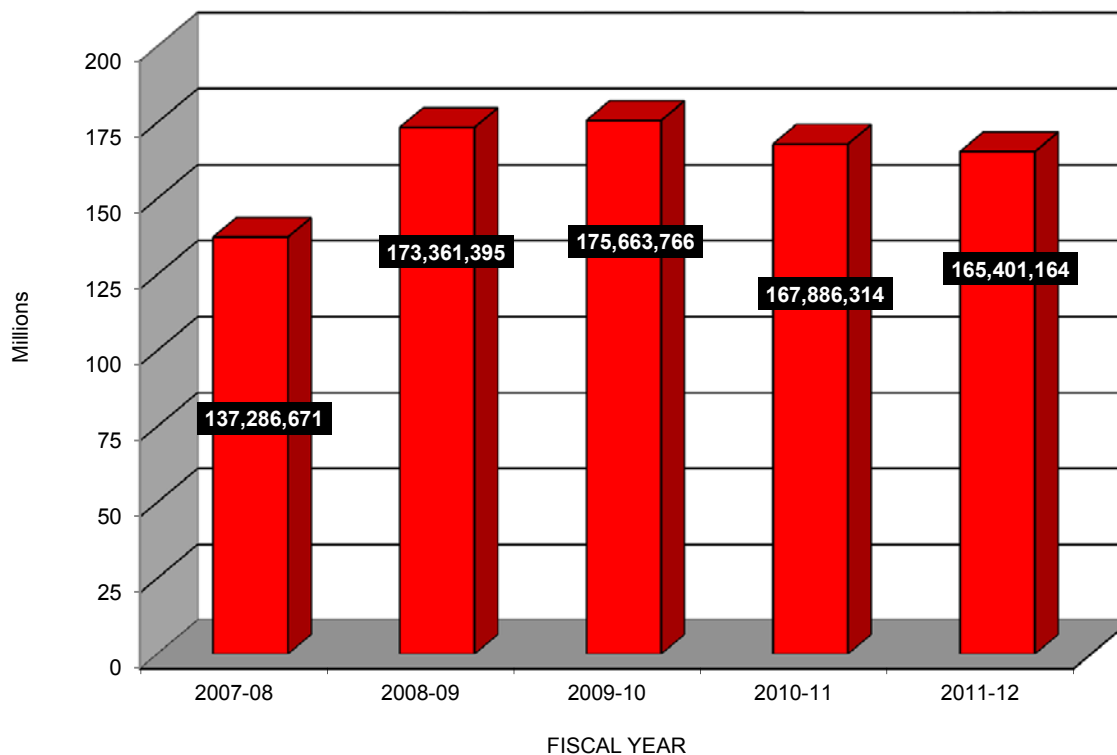

PREAMBLE OF THE CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

As it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity, and that the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land, their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly, a free government will be attended with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild, uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the Ignorance or Inferiority of our own, and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attachments that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of such wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purposes of internal education, divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three, and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general, and complete establishment.

THEREFORE His Representatives of the President of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact & declare, and by these presents it is ENACTED, ORDAINED and DECLARED.

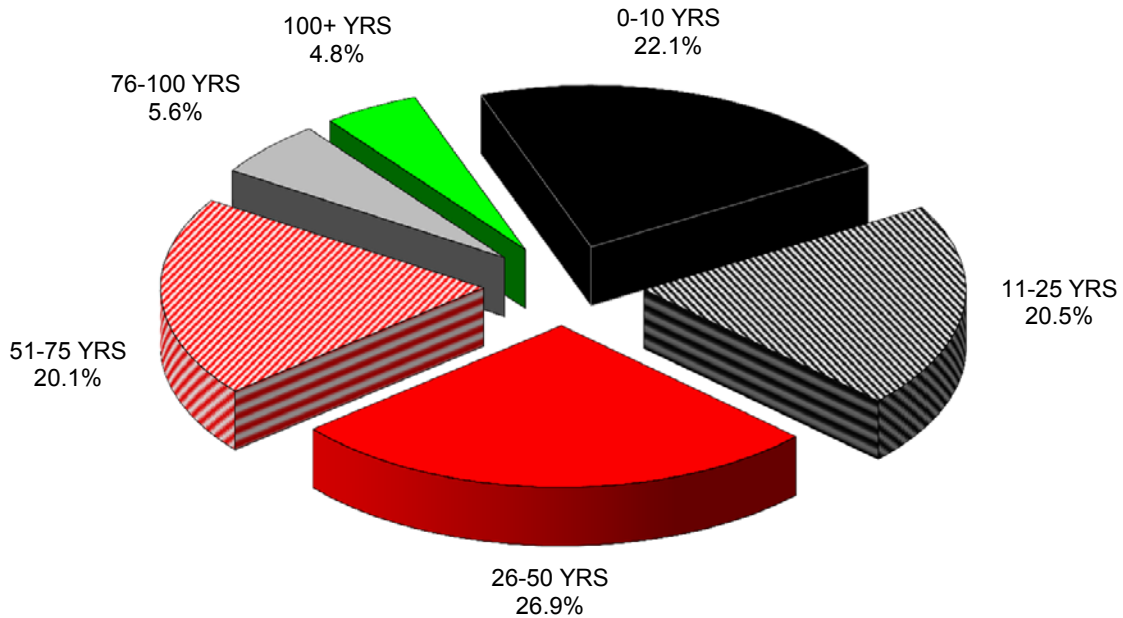

PREAMBLE OF THE CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

As it is the distinguishing happiness of free governments that civil Order should be the Result of choice and not necessity and the common wishes of the People become the Laws of the Land their public prosperity and even existence very much depends upon suitably forming the minds and morals of their Citizens. When the Minds of people are generally viciously disposed and unprincipled and their Conduct disorderly, a free government will lie under with greater Confusions and with Evils more horrid than the wild, uncultivated State of Nature. It can only be happy where the public principles and Opinions are properly

answer these purposes — is too humiliating an acknowledgment of the ignorance or inferiority of our own, and will always be the Cause of so great foreign attacks that upon principles of policy it is not admissible. This Country in the times of our common danger and distress found such Security in the principles and abilities of the wise regulations had before established in the minds of our countrymen that our present happiness joined to pleasing prospects should conspire to make us feel ourselves under the strongest obligation to form the youth the rising hope of our Land to render the like glorious & essential Services to our country. And whereas for the great purpose of internal education, divers allotments of land have at different times been made particularly by the Legislature at their Session in July One thousand seven hundred and eighty three, and February One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, all of which may be comprehended and made the basis of one general and complete establishment.

THEREFORE the Representatives of the Premier of the State of Georgia in general Assembly met this twenty seventh day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & eighty five enact, ordain & declare, and by these presents it is ENACTED, ORDAINED and DECLARED
